#### November 7 – Our Place After School Care, Amanda Nielsen

Amanda Nielsen is a part-time executive assistant for this program that serves special needs teens ages 13 through 20. She has been with them for one year. The public school system cannot serve these youth beyond a certain point.

It was started by Adeline Johnson, who is the executive director and founder, back in 2018 in the basement of a church. They needed somewhere for their own daughter to continue training, and realized there were others who needed the same opportunity. The program offers help with academics, safety knowledge, social skills, and life skills.

Our Place After School Care receives very little State funding due to state regulations. They receive some support through grant writing, but there are very few grants available. Donations are very important to their continued mission.

They opened a store called the Freedom Factory in 2022. Some items are made by the teens and others are

consigned. They learn to count change, work with the public, food safety, and cooking skills. The store is located at 1117 East South Street, in the ESU 9 building across the highway from the Barrel Bar.

They would like to find a new location since this building is not fully handicap accessible; they do have



some wheelchair bound participants. They would also like to obtain a van, with a wheelchair lift, to transport the teens. It would open up many more opportunities for them.

#### November 14 – The Possibility Project, George Cook



George lieutenant is governor for Kiwanis Division Lincoln-Waverly-21, the Hickman area. He is a volunteer for the Nebraska-Iowa District Children's Fund and is designated as "Champion" for the new initiative called The

#### Possibility Project.

It is designed to help solve the urgent need for more funding resources to address the needs of kids and communities worldwide. The goal is to reach more than 10 million children by raising \$25 million over the next 5 years.

In the past, Kiwanians have raised \$105 million to help eradicate iodine deficiency disorder worldwide. For the Eliminate project, our Hastings Club raised \$72,750

of the \$119 million total to combat maternal and neonatal tetanus. Both of these were Kiwanis Children's Fund campaigns in partnership with UNICEF.

Support is currently needed for these focus impact areas:

- Health and nutrition
- Education and literacy
- Youth leadership development

It only takes \$2.25 to positively impact the life of one child. It is estimated the average cost of necessities in the first year of a baby's life is \$15,000. One in seven children live in a household where there is not enough food to eat. One in three low-income families do not own any books. If a child is not proficient in Reading by the end of grade 3, they will have difficulties in later grades and the rest of their life.

The Possibility Project has been developed to amplify the impact of <u>local club</u> service projects. It is the first in Kiwanis International history focused on raising money specifically to help kids through Kiwanis clubs' local service projects. More grant funding will be available to

# November 21 – Area Substance & Alcohol Abuse Prevention Coalition (ASAAP), Rhonda Hiebert

Rhonda is project coordinator and joined the program this past August. ASAAP serves Adams, Clay, Nuckolls, and Webster counties. It began in the 1980's under the guidance of Norma Spady. She was the founder of the Hastings Area Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse.

They are trying to bring awareness to adults that drugs process at different rates as we age. We must also be alert that kids use different terms to refer to drugs that we may be familiar with. For example, the street names for Valium/Diazepam are eggs, jellies, moggies or vallies. Other drugs may be referred to as downers, candy, lunch money, footballs, french fries, ladders, roofies. Substance abuse begins mostly in the middle school age.

Vaping is more addictive than cigarettes. When inhaled, the high levels of nicotine hit the bloodstream and brain more quickly. The average amount of nicotine in one device equals 1-2 packs of cigarettes. Other ingredients can include formaldehyde, lead, acetone, nickel, arsenic, naphthalene and dozens of other nasty things. Some ingredients in vaping products can explode; that's why they are not allowed on planes.

Vaping instruments can be disguised as asthma inhalers, lipstick, keychains, markers, and cell phone cases, among others.

Typically a student

caught vaping would be suspended from school. ASAAP is pushing an alternative to that by offering life skills training and addiction recovery. Some retailers are not helping the situation because they display tobacco and vaping products alongside candy. That gets kids used to seeing them at an early age.

When ASAAP speaks at schools, they have goggles that can be adjusted to different levels of alcohol consumption to demonstrate to students how it affects their reflexes, walking, etc.

There is a lending library with materials about drug and alcohol abuse, as well as materials for AA and NA. They are giving every new teacher in the four-county area material on mindfulness to remind them that they are appreciated. It also has tips on how to deal with the stress of teaching.
