SKATEPARK NEWS

Committed to raise \$200,000 total ~ \$50,000 from the Club

Total Club Donations to date: \$9,338.50 (18.68%)
Total General Public Donations to date: \$5,723.73 (3.82%)



The County Commissioners approved our grant request for \$50,000 from the Convention and Visitors Bureau. This is a reimbursement grant payable half in January and half in July.

The final design of the skatepark is complete. The horseshoe bowl is 4-ft deep with two levels, and a pump track in the center. Items 2, 3, 4 and 5 on the legend are the beginner elements. You are free to use the drawings for promotion. We can get some to you.

PLEASE NOTE: This skatepark can be used by scooters, rollerblades, and BMX bikes, in addition to skateboards. Nothing that is motorized is permitted.

<u>July 10 – HPS 2025 Distinguished Senior Educator, Dave Johnson</u>



Dave was born in Omaha to parents who were both teachers. Most of their teaching careers were in Kearney. Dave and his sister both now also teach.

He developed a love of history and social studies and wanted to emulate his teachers and coaches. They are the best people he knows.

He attended Kearney State College, now UNK, and student

taught at Elm Creek. After graduation he was hired in Hayes Center. After only one year there he saw that Hastings had ads for three social studies teachers. It was a very competitive time when there were more teachers available in the hiring pool. As a new teacher, he didn't think he had much of a chance.

Dave is now in his 40th year at Hastings High School. In addition to social studies, he started as assistant basketball coach, then as assistant track coach. He is now head track coach.

He had no aspirations to be a coach, but he did want to teach in a small school and that seems to go with it. He feels that coaching has taught him to be a better teacher.

Coaching has given him an opportunity to know kids in a different way and relate to them in a different way. Coaching has helped him with patience and learning to work with different personalities.

Things he's learned:

- Show an interest in students outside of the classroom. He goes to as many activities as he can... sports, music, drama. The kids know you are there and are interested in them.
- Try to be positive. He was more negative when he started his career. For every negative comment, he tries to make three positive ones.

- Be consistent with students. You can't treat each student the same because they are not the same people. Just be courteous and respectful of each of them. It is not human nature to like everyone, and he tries to get that across to his students.
- Be available; stay around after school for the students who want help or advice. He is annoyed with teachers who immediately race out after the last bell.
- Parents want to see their children succeed. He
 has seen that parents have changed and
 households have changed over the last 40
 years. There is more stress on parents today
 who are not home as much as previously. When
 he contacts a parent about a struggling student
 or assignments not being turned in, most
 parents are very appreciative. They want to
 know how their child is doing and want to help
 them succeed.
- Let students know you care about them. Students don't care how much you know, they just want to know that you care.
- Be well versed in your subject. Students are impressed if they see that you know your stuff; they respect that. Many newer teachers rely on Google to help them answer student questions.
- Share personal experiences. Students like to know their teachers are human and see that they are real people. They like teachers to be open with them. It draws you closer to them.

The most beneficial aspect of his teaching career has been his relationship with students and fellow teachers ... not the actual teaching of his favorite subject.

<u>July 17 – Kiwanis International Youth Protection Training, Dave Kempf</u>

Youth Protection Training is required annually by Kiwanis International for anyone participating with Service Leadership Programs (SLPs). These are the sponsored youth programs from elementary K-Kids through college-level Circle K, and Aktion Club for adults with disabilities.

A 30-minute video was presented entitled "Policies in Practice" that outlined the objectives of the Youth Protection policies and how they must be implemented.

Those at today's meeting will be submitted as trained for this year.

Abuse can be in person or online. According to the World Health Organization in 2022, abuse occurs

worldwide for one in five girls and one and 13 boys, across all ages and socioeconomic levels, ethnicities, and big or small communities. It is important that all

adults in Kiwanis who work with youth understand the policies and desired culture necessary to protect the youth with whom we come in contact.

29% of abuse is by a family member, 60% by someone else the youth knows, and only 11% by strangers. Abuse erodes the trust youth have in adults, and can cause mood swings, loss of interest and activities, and acting out in sexual ways. They often feel it is their fault, causing them to feel sad, angry, guilty or confused.

Kiwanis Youth Protection Goals are to:

Protect youth from predators.

- Educate youth with skills and tools designed to inspire and engage future leaders to be their best
- Engage all Kiwanis members and empower them with best practices when working with youth.

More information can be found at www.kiwanis.org/youthprotection for those who did not attend today's meeting and wish to work with any SLPs. A background check is required. Guidelines are presented for chaperones, for preventing false allegations, social media and communications, and reporting troubling behavior, among other topics.

July 24 – Tour of Schnase 1906 District and Hastings Community Foundation Office, Dan Peters

About 18 Kiwanis members toured this new entrepreneurship facility at 620 W. 2nd Street. Dan has been the executive director of HCF since 2020 and is also on the board for the non-profit Schnase 1906 District.

The Hastings Community Foundation has existed over 35 years. It opened its new doors on June 2nd after previously being located in the Heritage Bank building.

These two entities share space in the Stein Building, which was built in 1906. Each organization has its own operational space, with shared office machine work space and lunch bar. There are several other gathering spaces throughout.

It was a \$2.5 million capital project, including purchase, renovation, and build out. The project finished on time, on budget, and fully funded.

They kept the original creaky wooden floors (now covered by carpet, but still creaky) and the staircase to the lower level. There are also many design elements throughout with a nod to the lion head sculptures that originally held up the awning outside. Some original

lavender window blocks were incorporated into the block windows facing 2nd Street.

There is a map of Hastings etched on the glass entryway doors. Hastings landmarks are etched on all other glass office doors.

The goal of the 1906 District is to help open new businesses in Hastings. It is available for anyone who wants to start or grow a business by supporting those entrepreneurs with beginning workspace at under market value.

Scott Snell, the entrepreneurship director at Central Community College, is the first office you come to. He provides guidance and services to help launch a business, and the 1906 District offers the workspace to facilitate that.

Though not open yet, the 1906 District portion will be available 24/7 by use of your phone to unlock the door. There are cameras throughout so they are always aware who is in the facility.

There are private offices, both micro size and standard, with short-term leases. The rate gradually

increases and they expect that you are in a position for your own location by 3 years.

The lower level offers flexible workspace with sit/stand desks. There is a podcasting studio equipped with high-quality audio and lighting equipment.

There are additional rooms where any business can host workshops, meetings, or trainings.

The HEDC and CRA are providing operational support for a limited time until revenue gets going. Funds for an endowment are being raised to cover ongoing building expenses in order that 100% of donations can be applied to the program.
