June 5 – Career Services at Hastings College, Carissa Uhrmacher



Carissa has been with that office since October of 2020 as Associate Director. Kim Graviette is Director. They are located in the basement of the Admissions building. Two student workers assist.

Career Services manages all on-campus jobs, which are at minimum wage and cannot

be over 20 hours a week. The company operating the dining hall can also hire.

An Alumni Mentoring program began in 2020. In a student's third year they are matched with an alum in their interested career path.

"Handshake" is a nationwide platform that helps with job search. It monitors events, job openings, and can maintain a calendar for appointments. They offer job fairs in the spring and the fall, and do presentations in dorms and classrooms. The TruMotivate assessment helps students determine a career path by identifying what their skill levels are and what motivates them.

Interview practice is an important element of a job search. They can arrange meetings with employers and alumni, and use LinkedIn to find careers in other locations.

Additional services are:

- Professional development activities
- Internships and campus jobs
- Preparing and editing resumes and cover letters
- Career guidance and pre-professional training.
- Money management

June 12 – HPS Educator of the Year, Karen Valdes



Karen has been teaching 25 years. She has just returned from Tunisia in Africa where she taught English as a second language to college students and middle school children.

She was born in Guatemala City, Guatemala, a city of over 1 million people. Her mom met a farmer from Nebraska, so at

age 6 she moved to Nebraska where they lived 30 minutes from the closest town. Being away from the city was the first time she ever saw the sunset.

She shared many anecdotes about her transition to the American farm. She learned gardening from her stepfather and learned that every plant has its own requirements to grow. As do children. Her kindergarten teacher was instrumental in her appreciation of learning. She did not speak any English but felt loved by this teacher who took the time to nurture her. Teachers have the opportunity to prepare students to grow.

School lunches consisted of casseroles and canned vegetables. She was used to fresh food everyday in Guatemala. This taught her resilience and how to adapt.

Her kindergarten teacher still impacts her life today because of the compassion she showed. And because through her, she learned the power of education. She has now taught 3,394 students. Each one has played a small role in her life and been a shining light.

June 19 – City Council Update, Matt Fong

Matt said that he and wife Kaleena were both former members of Kiwanis. He has represented Hastings Ward 4 on the City Council since 2018. It encompasses roughly the Heartwell Park area. He serves as the liaison with HEDC and Hastings Public Library. He was on the library board for several years.

His full-time work is fundraising and outreach for the Crane Trust located in Wood River at the Alda interchange. He is also on the board of The Lark and active in the First Presbyterian Church. They have a 13-year-old daughter, Vivian.

Matt had a PowerPoint presentation where he reviewed the City of Hastings leadership and current hot topics the City Council is working on.

- Mark Funkey is City Administrator
- Derek Zeisler is manager of Hastings Utilities
- Jesse Oswald is City Attorney
- Lee Vrooman is Director of Engineering, which includes streets
- Roger Nash is Director of Finance

Recent leadership changes are:

- Kevin Kubo is the new Director of Development Services. He was previously the building inspector.
- Kelly Reisig is the new director of the Hastings Public Library. She is new to town and started that position on May 21.

Hot topics being discussed

He reported the <u>new Splash Pad at Libs Park</u> is now open. There is no charge to the public and is especially great for the young kids. The new stainless steel features will hold up better than the previous fiberglass ones. Drainage was also improved. American Rescue Plan Act funds were used to cover the \$260,000 cost.

<u>City Hall</u> - There has been a long ongoing discussion about what to do with this space and how to provide better functionality. It was originally built in 1962 as a bank.

Issues reported were a leaking roof, mold, asbestos, security challenges, and access limitations.

Completion of the renovation is anticipated early spring 2026. The new entry will be on the east side and will be ADA compliant. The cost of the renovation is \$7.1 million. It will house the Council chambers, finance, development services, and City administration as before.

Quiet Crossings - This was an approved use of the half cent sales tax. These allow trains to not have to blow their whistles constantly as they go through town. There are speakers at these crossings directed at the cars that are waiting.

Two crossings are completed and three more will be done this summer. The final two will be completed in the summer of 2026. All crossings have to be done before any of them can be utilized as such. There is a lot of coordination involved with the railroad.

<u>Highway 6 & Elm St. Project</u> - A five-lane proposal was approved by the City Council in 2016. A State proposal of a three-lane with roundabout modifica-tion was approved in April of 2023.



Bids will be solicited this fall with construction to be durina 2026-27 and completion hopefully by the end of 2027. It is hoped that the utilities portion will begin this summer at cost estimated of \$9.573.123. The total

project is \$30 million with 80% of the cost being covered by the NDOT. This project has been talked about for decades.

<u>Nitrates</u> - The county and the city need to continue paying attention to this issue. There has been a rising concern about nitrate and uranium levels in Hastings drinking water. High levels of these can cause serious medical problems, especially for infants.

A new Aquifer Storage and Restoration (ASR) well system is being utilized to resolve that problem. It involves pumping the high nitrate groundwater out of the aquifer, treating it, and then re-injecting it back into the aquifer.

<u>Board Term Limits</u> - This was proposed at the Council's first meeting in May. It is sometimes difficult to fill advisory boards etc. Matt feels that you shouldn't limit people who want to serve, and their history on the board or commission can be helpful.

[A Tribune article on Tuesday, June 24th, reported that the city council voted on Monday the 23rd, by 5-3 split vote, to approve the term limits ordinance that limits appointed members of municipal boards and commissions to two consecutive terms.]

LB 840 - Local Option Municipal Economic Development Act of 1991. This was discussed at the June work session. There was no immediate action taken on this matter.

This bill authorizes a city to appropriate tax dollars, including sales and property taxes, for economic development purposes. The funds authorized by this bill are being used by many municipalities.

Matt feels we are limiting ourselves by not participating in this available money. Its use must be approved by local voters and it can be structured however we would like. Every community using these funds is using it differently. It would be administered by the HEDC.

<u>Utilities Advisory Board</u> - There was discussion about dissolving this board which has a \$100 million budget. In one way or another it affects every household in Hastings.

Matt is personally not in favor of dissolving it. He feels it is good to have a group of community members to review revenues etc before coming to the City Council for action.

He encouraged Kiwanis members to use Engage Hastings, **engage.cityofhastings.org**, to learn about things happening in the city. It provides an opportunity for community input on issues being discussed and projects that matter to you.

Council meetings are held on the 2nd and 4th Mondays each month at 6:00 p.m. at the Hastings

Airport. Work sessions are the third Monday each month.

June 26 – Salvation Army Presentation



Rachel Irvine presented a Certificate of Appreciation to President Frank Koch for the club's participation in its December 2024 bell ringing fundraising event. We collected \$1,817.16 for the Salvation Army.

June 26 - Hastings Literacy Program, Jessica Johnson, Executive Director

Jessica has been in Hastings 8 years and has a background in public service. She took this position in July of 2022 when the previous executive director retired. She has observed that the volunteerism attitude in Hastings is fabulous.

The Literacy Program provides GED classes in basic math and reading, as well as ESL classes, at no charge. They operate on a semester schedule, which is helpful to the instructors for planning and also enhances their relationship with the students.

Some instructors come from CCC, but they rely heavily on over 50 volunteers from the community, Hastings College, and Americorps. The Americorps volunteers can provide a more personalized instruction because they come in with different educational backgrounds.

They offer classes Monday through Thursday in the morning and evening. Kiwanis member Kathy Schultz

volunteers as a math tutor in the mornings, working one-on-one with a student.

They had an unusually large number of graduates this past year with 22.

Funding to cover the CCC services comes from the Department of Education. There is no



other government funding. All of its other program needs comes from private donations, Give Hastings Day, and grants that are focused on adult literacy. They also apply for grants such as from Walmart, Hastings Community Foundation and Sunnyside.
