Adopt-a-Class TN was established by Karen Hamerslag in 2017.

Her dedication, drive and commitment has propelled this grassroots movement forward. Loudon Elementary was the first school "Adopted." In 2018, Steekee Elementary was added; and Vonore Elementary became the third school the spring of 2020 to be supported "Adopted" by the club. Their membership began with 14 volunteers and is now at 140.

The attainment of 501(c)(3) status, grant procurements, website development, Facebook usage, and charity networking have given Adopt-a-Class community recognition. Successful fundraisers, including the unique student designed greeting cards and bake sales, have increased program capabilities.

Classroom Volunteer Program: Classroom volunteers work directly with children, at the 3 adopted schools, as tutors, either individually or in small groups. Each volunteer is matched with a teacher and a classroom. This allows the volunteers to get to know the children and feel pride in their progress.

Volunteer at Home Program: Was established during the pandemic to allow volunteer participation without health risks, and has continued. Teachers submit requests for projects, Volunteer-at-Home members are contacted for availability and interest. Adopt-a-Class leaders collect the materials and instructions from the school, and deliver the materials to participants. After completion, volunteers return completed projects to the school.

Donation Program: This program provides school supplies to children and faculty at each of their adopted schools. Teachers submit requests for supplies needed. Adopt-A-Class TN purchases the items. They spend \$9,000 annually to fill the requests.

Back to School Drive: This event is held prior to the school year beginning. Residents are asked to contribute supplies such as paper, crayons, glue sticks, etc.

Donation Bins: There are several Donation Bins within Tellico Village where school supply items can be dropped off year-round.

The Literacy Program: Began in 2021 with subscriptions to Highlights Magazine to all second graders. The program has grown to include Highlights Magazines for all third graders. Scholastic Storyworks Magazine for fourth graders, and Scholastic Super STEM Magazine for fifth graders has been added.

Family Engagement Program: This program began in 2022 and provides resources for home learning. Mathematics and STEM Support Program was launched in 2023.

Weekend Food 4 kids

The morning of April 5th, 2924 turned out to be a challenge for a few of our Kiwanis members.

They arrived ready to pack nutritious snacks for the Weekend Food 4 Kids Project at Loudon Elementary School. However, they were met with a large pallet delivered by Second Harvest.

They had to open the pallet, break it down, unpack it, sort the items, and placed them onto the shelves in the storage room.

There were no bags, which are used to pack the snacks, and distributed confidentially to 168 students. Ray Mouse went to Food Lion, who donated more than enough bags.

They then put together 168 individual bags, each containing 4 different nutritious snacks. The bags were labeled by student and classroom. Bags were loaded onto carts for each classroom and delivered to the teachers.

Our volunteers took it all in stride. We applaud you for your commitment and dedication. Thank you!

Kiwanians, Angie and Lou Antico, stopped by the event. (Lou was on camera duty and is missing from the photo.)
















The uniforms were tailed by the girls themselves with the help of materials their teachers provided. It was red-white clothes, which later turned out to be the iconic costume of the Candy Stripers. They initially participated in the Junior Hostesses program, which was designed to familiarize girls with the social service side of the medical field. With the immediate success and popularity of this program, Candy Stripers started helping in different parts of the country and became elemental to the hospitals in the USA. Candy Stripers played a significant role during World War II, actively volunteering in military hospitals to take care of the injured soldiers




Our Chaplain Program is off to a great start! We have several volunteers that have said yes to the call!
