






TROUT IN THE CLASSROOM IS BACK



Lending Library: This program brings the school library to the kindergarten classes at Lenoir City Elementary School. Once a week, on Thursdays during the school year, a cart stocked with library books is placed outside each classroom door (one cart for each classroom). Each member is assigned to a cart, serving as the "librarian." Prior to the school start each child is permitted to search for a book, take the library card out of the pocket and hand it to the member who then records name and date of the child. The child's teacher will them provide a folder totake home. The folder contains suggestions for the parent as they read the book to their child.














GetYourSelfie2School! Campaign continues






















LET'S KEEP NORTH MIDDLE SCHOOL KIDS WARM THIS WINTER




Kiwanis Club of Loudon County Food Drive, Nov. 23rd, 2024

Several Tellico Village Kiwanians were there volunteering and purchasing items in support this event initiated by the Kiwanis Club of Loudon County.




Quarterly Commodities Food Delivery


