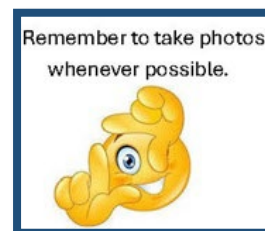

PANTHER INNOVATION

The Panther Innovation presentations at Lenoir City Intermediate/Middle School on May 13, 2026, were a testament to the dynamic energy of young minds engaged in STEM learning. This annual event showcased the students' ability to harness innovation, collaboration, creativity, and confidence in addressing real-world challenges. Each grade level participated in crafting projects that reflected their understanding and problem-solving skills, ultimately selecting the top groups to present their work to a distinguished panel of judges, including five members from the Tellico Village Kiwanis Club. These Kiwanians, known for their unwavering support of educational initiatives, volunteered eagerly to evaluate the students' projects, recognizing the importance of fostering a new generation of thinkers and leaders in STEM fields. The event not only celebrated the students' achievements but also reinforced the community's commitment to nurturing future innovators.

Below are the requirements students had to follow when creating their projects!

4th grade: Students embarked on an exciting project to produce stop-motion animations centered around a chosen animal. This multifaceted task began with the creation of a storyboard, where they meticulously planned the plot, characters, and key scenes. They delved into research about their animal's habitat, diet, and natural predators, ensuring authenticity in their storytelling. Using iPads, the students captured frame-by-frame movements to craft an engaging and dynamic video. They showcased their ingenuity by designing and constructing props, backgrounds, and characters from materials like cardboard, paper cutouts, and toy animals. Students shared their film, discussing the creative process and the challenges they faced, such as perfecting movement fluidity and synchronizing scenes.



7th grade: Students researched various disabilities to better understand the challenges individuals face in daily life. Using this knowledge, they brainstormed and developed an innovative solution to improve accessibility and ease everyday tasks for students with disabilities.

As part of the design process, students sketched their ideas, created prototypes using cardboard or 3D printing, and refined their designs based on feedback. They presented their project, explaining how their invention enhances inclusivity and improves the user experience.



5th grade: Students designed their own city by exploring essential elements that make a city both functional and sustainable. They investigated critical aspects of urban planning, including transportation systems, utilities, disaster preparedness, public services, and architecture. By understanding how cities are built and maintained, students applied their knowledge to plan and create a city of their own. They created a detailed presentation outlining their city's design, features, and innovations. They built a physical model of their city using LEGOs, bringing their designs to life in a hands-on, creative way. To further extend their understanding of disaster preparedness, a Public Service Announcement (PSA) using green screen technology was created. Students described a national disaster event and explained how their city was designed to respond, including evacuation plans, emergency services, and safety measures. This component allowed the students to communicate their ideas creatively while demonstrating their understanding of real-world challenges and solutions.

6th grade: Students researched a historical figure in the field of coding, focusing on their key contributions to computer science. They explored questions such as: What innovations or breakthroughs did this individual achieve? Did they create a programming language, develop an algorithm, or invent a computing device? What challenges or obstacles did they face along the way? Using their findings, students wrote a nonfiction narrative that tells the story of this figure's impact on the world of coding. To apply their knowledge, students engaged in hands-on coding challenges using Sphero robots, programming them to complete various tasks and navigate obstacles. The project combined research, creativity, and problem-solving, helping students develop a deeper understanding of coding and its real-world applications.

8th grade: Students researched a significant historical event, analyzing its key moments, impact, and relevance. They created a storyboard to outline the event's timeline, key figures, and vital details. To bring their project to life, students designed and built props representing key aspects of the event. Using WeVideo, they produced a 5-minute film, incorporating narration, images, video clips, and sound effects.

On Wednesday, May 13, 2026, the dynamic duo was at it again. They delivered 9 benches bringing the total benches to 123 in our A Bench for Caps Program!

The A Bench for Caps Program is environmentally conscious, repurposing non-recyclable plastic lids and bottle caps into benches and tables. Since its inception, the Tellico Village Kiwanis Club's A Bench for Caps Program has 28,000 pounds of non-recyclable plastic, showcasing an innovative approach to community building and environmental stewardship. That equates to over an incredible 2.5 million non-recyclable pieces of plastic caps and lids collected, equaling over 14 tons out of landfills.

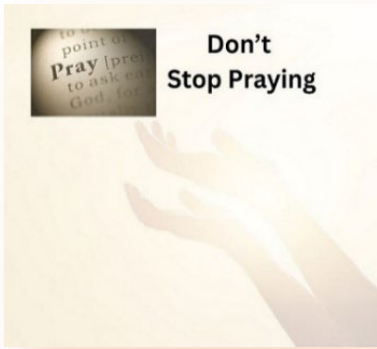
