November Meeting Notes

5 Holidays are near and relaged club activities are on the forefornt. Coming up first is our Annual Pancake Breakfast at Maryville High School on November 23. **Doug Craig** and **Debbie Jones** have provided the leadership in organizing this effort. We received an update today regarding Doug's serious medical issues which will keep him from being at the breakfast. **Howard Kerr** has graciously steeped into Doug's role along with Debbie and many of the individual task



leaders. Each thank Doug in his absence for all the work necessary to get us to to readiness. An abundance of prayers and expressions of

concern were expressed for the health issues that will take both **Doug Craig** and **Newsom Baker** out of participating in this year's breakfast.

The Christmas Angel Tree teams are in place and each of the five teams will allot \$140 for gifts to their individual "angel." Sign up for carolling our members confined to home was passed around today along with signup for the Salvation Army bell ring. Plans are being made for our annual Chirstmas party on December 17th.

Providing us an overview of the Sherriff's office Special Operations today was Roger Murphy. Roger is the Chaplain for the Blount County Sherriff's office and the Coordinator of the Blount County Special Operations Response Team. He is fondly remembered by all of Maryville Kiwanis for his 20 year participation in the Leadership Adventure Camp and at today's program was presented a camp-related T-shirt. Today's program highlighted the missing persons operations performed by the Team. Many



end in success but sometimes they are not so fortunate. Finding two persons recently who were eaten by bears was testimony to where their searches sometimes lead.

We are fortunate in our county to one of the best equipped and manned Rescue Teams in the state if not in the country. They have 3 boats with sonar and underwater cameras. Their two drones with heat-sensing cameras have been a great addition to finding missing persons Tracking dogs are also often used. Between 12 and 22 persons specializing in different areas of search and rescue are part of the Team.

In Tennessee, the sherriff's offices are in charge of most search and rescues. Our location provides some special challenges in that onefourth of our county is in the Great Smoky Mountain National Park.

Many of the searches are dementia related, simply lost, and punaways. Key behaviors of lost persons are known by extensive research and assist in finding missing persons, sometimes right in their own homes or very close by. High definition maps of the areas are available and nearly always utilzed in the search process. When not actually performing a search, there is intense efforts to maintain currency in search and rescue techniques. Quick response is integral to their success. They take every call seriously and always assume that they will find the person quickly and alive.



November Meeting Notes

1 Phis was a special meeting that we have each year to honor our Kiwanis veterans as well as all veterans who have offered their service to our great country.

Our president, **Jerry Heiny**, gave an overview of the 2024-25 fiscal year budget. Administrative expenses totaled \$46,930 with a revenue of \$49,235. The Foundation received \$109,950 in revenue with expenses of \$107,215. There is also \$13,137 in the Amtryke fund. A full breakdown of the budget is available from the club secretary, **Heather Larson**.

With the Henry's moving, the position of Key Club advisor was open. **Tom Antkow** graciously offered to fill this position. **Bill Henry** has left a very well-oraganized and active Key Club for Tom to take over.

It is slways a special day when our club honors the veterans. Serving our country provides an added incentive to serve others and a perfect entry into Kiwanis. There is no person better that **Robert Russell** to bring us a message honoring our Kiwanis veterans and all veterans everywhere. Robert served first in the Army and then in the Navy. His focus today centered around his Navy servicein Vietnam, especially the Fall of Saigon.

The "fall" occurred on April 29-30, 1975 when North Vietnamese forsces captured Saigon, the then-capital of South Vietnam. In those two days, thousands of American and South Vietnamese citizens were evacuated in a largescale helicopter operation known as Operation Frequent Wind (OFW). All services were involved with the USS Hancock and USS Midway being key to the Naval portion of OFW. The extent of this evacuation was captured vividly with media pictures of overcrowded boats, babies passed over barbed wire, and Hueys being pushed off deck into the water to make room for additional helicopter landings. One of these experiences was the Captain of the USS Midway clearing the deck so a Vietnamese



Air Force officer, his family, and two dozen evacuees could land their helicopter. Over 3000 evacuees were brought to the USS Midway on Air Force helicopters. The USS Hancock evacuated 2300 Vietnamese refugees.

The refugees were processed and housed at Grande Island in he Phillipines which also served as an on-base resort for US military and civilians stationed throughout the Phillipines. Flying the American flag on the landing craft shuttle service for the refugees provided the clearance to land the boats onto the Phillipine island.

It was obvious throughout his presentation, the passion and respect that Robert has for the US military. He served honorably along with all veterans and unfortunately was not received well when they returned from Vietnam. Robert expressed the wish shared by all veterans that the shameful disrespect of our military forces shown when they returned from Vietnam, will

never again occur. One of the ways of honoring our veterans is the "Quilts of Valor" of which 3 attending are recipients,


