Kiwanis Youth Protection

This is a presentation required annually by KI for every club, and especially important for new members.

Patsy began by reminding us that All adults working with youth under the age of 18 at any Kiwanis event are required to read/understand, agree to and abide by these policies.

Chaperones, Service Leadership Club Advisors, etc. required to have background check; Secretary Larson reminds members of upcoming expiration/renewal dates.

Patsy emphasized 'The Rule of Three' and its importance: NEVER be alone with a child/youth. Always have another child or adult with you. Be aware of the necessity to be proactive so no situation results in an accusation regarding inappropriate behavior. Also emphasized was the importance of avoiding alcohol, tobacco, etc. at any event produced for the benefit of youth.

Another area of importance is to NEVER share your personal information with youth, to NEVER have a relationship with them online, etc., and to be sure to get permission if posting a photo of youth from a Kiwanis event.

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Taking pictures is something that now, literally everyone with a cell phone is interested in. Hardly do you go anywhere where snapping a quick photo is something that is not considered routine. Even taking pictures of yourself might have been considered vain in the past but is now seen as usual. A photographer might have drawn a shocked face when telling they had 100 or 200,000 photos. Now our kids often have taken that many.

We enjoyed last month the beautiful photos that Tom Coulter took on his medical mission. Like



Tom, I have enjoyed taking all kinds of pictures over the year since hand-held cameras have been available. In my late teens I dabbled with darkrooms, but the real fun began in the age of affordable single lens reflex camera. That has now evolved to mirrorless cameras which are becoming the standard and more affordable. The processing of photos on your own computer with programs like Photoshop has revolutionized the old darkroom into endless ways of managing your photos.

For this edition of the Kourier I will include some of my favorite pics from over the years and share some thoughts

What grandparent is not proud of their grandkids! My granddaughter Mya graduates this year from Bearden this spring and will attend UT in the Fall. She has had a great academic and sports career and capturing her in action has been particularly fun for me.

With digital cameras we can take video and more interestingly for me, action shots which capture the moment by being able to take 10, 30, 60 or even more frames per second of the same quality that you would get taking them one at a time. In addition, the improved

electronic sensors make taking pictures indoors without flash and maintain excellent quality. Fine tuning after the shoot makes it possible to crop to include the final content that you wish.

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Visiting Kiawah was something we did many times during my practice years. Composition is a large part of photography. I like this photo because of the kids bending forward like their father while mom is proudly upright with a hand on the back. This was an early pic of my oldest son, Tim's, family that I kept posted in my dictation area my entire practice time.

This was also taken at Kiawah just last year. With the new mirrorless cameras, you can focus at distance right on the eyeball of a person or animal. In the morning and evening these pelicans are flying constantly giving plenty of opportunity to practice your camera skills.





The beauty of color that is part of a sunrise is so nicely captured by the camera. You can take this picture at 3minute increments and get totally different color schemes and you can add filters to the lens or even in post processing to bring out different colors. Including a single bird gives another element of interest and then the building in the foreground adds a perspective and a sense of reality.

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Tom Talks

A valued member of our club, Tom Antkow, writes often on the editorial page of <u>The Daily Times</u>. Tom also recently assumed the position of club representative to the Maryville High School Key Club. This is one of his recent letters published in the Daily Times this month.

Welcome to 2025. The more things that change the more they stay the same.

One thing that hasn't changed in our county or the rest of the Country. Drivers are still horrible! As is the case in most parts of the U.S. folks believe that they are the best drivers on the planet. That is usually in the eye of the beholder. Just ask any spouse, partner or passenger. Most passengers with a driver's license prefer not to be a passenger.

Operating farm equipment is quite different than driving on the roadways. Heavy machinery does not really qualify as a multi-passenger motor vehicle. Ever seen rush hour traffic or red-light runners blasting down the corn rows attempting to avoid cows? Does not exist as far as I know.

I've spent the past 50 years as a driving instructor, trainer, classroom educator, in-car high school driver-ed teacher, State driver's license examiner, evaluator, driver rehab specialist, and public speaker, and even hosted a radio show about driving. Now, I'm spending my remaining days in private practice assessing whether senior drivers are still fit to operate a motor vehicle.

I thought I had seen and heard it all about being behind the wheel. I'm still surprised every day I venture out on the road. In my opinion, there are three "primary personalities" for drivers: Distracted, Reactive and Defensive. The "defensive" part means they usually take "offense" when anyone has the audacity to critique the way they drive. Not that they are driving "defensively" to safeguard themselves or others from harm on the roads.

Some food for thought. How is it possible that the most common type of crash is a rear-end collision? Driver educators call it, "butt sniffing?" Why do most crashes happen at intersections engineered to control the flow of traffic mechanically, without human beings screwing things up?

I have lived in six states. Tennessee is my seventh. I have driven through countless more. Without a doubt. The most common thing I hear when folks find out I have a driver education background or that my expertise is traffic safety. "Those dang out-of-state newcomers are the worst, most discourteous drivers on the planet! I wish they would go back to where they came from and take their bad habits with them."

Here are my New Year wishes for all occupiers of the roadways. Let us resolve to signal BEFORE we brake. Turn signals and brake lights are not just for you. Create more space between yourselves and the drivers in front of you. Space is good. "Butt sniffing" is bad. Social distancing works better for driving than for Covid. Slow down to less than 10 mph above the posted speed. Keep your eyes above the steering wheel. Not on your lap, cell phone, or lunch. Wait until you get home to talk on the phone, read, or send that text. You won't die if you don't take that call or answer that dang text when you are not moving. If you decide not to do most of the above, you could end up in intensive care or die.

Finally. "Courtesy is, as courtesy does." Unfortunately, I just heard that most New Year resolutions only last about a month. Happy motoring!
