March 4 Meeting Notes



With all the activity that is evident on or local roads and highways, the presentation by Dexter Justice, the Region 1 Director of Project Management for the Tennessee Department of Transportation., was much anticipated. You can't travel from here to Knoxville without encountering obvious heavy equipment and construction. Delays are sometimes amazing, but how they do it while maintaining a heavy traffic flow is just as much a feat as the actual construction itself.

Dexter admitted that this was not only very costly but takes a very long time. Many will wonder whether they will live to see its completion. Unfortunately, as much work as is being done, it still appears the full completion is still many years away.

He reminded us of all the complexity that goes into the just the 1.6 miles around the University of Tennessee Medical Center. The budget for that portion alone is \$187 million dollars, the largest single project in the history of Tennessee. With the hospital being the regions only Level 1 Trauma center, it was critical in the planning to always maintain access to the hospital. New interchanges while maintaining the least disruptive configuration of traffic to and from the hospital were necessary. This included the removal and replacement of existing parking, use of retaining walls, collaboration with all utilities to move existing lines, stream relocation to assist with drainage, and the removal of an immense amount of rock to make way for the expanded roadway.

The work in the UT area alone was duplicated all along the corridor to various extents depending on the landscape and traffic patterns. The relocated Alcoa Highway to the east of the airport will provide for a more commercial area around the airport while at the same time improving access to and from the airport. Pedestrian greenways for walking and biking are also included in the planning. This and much more is still part of the 10-year plan going forward.

It is a little overwhelming to understand that we are still years away from completion. It is also reassuring that our state remains mindful of budgets and is good stewards of our money, not doing anything unless the money is available to accomplish it.

March 18 Weeting Notes

Last meeting we got to look at reginal infrastructure development with the Tennessee Department of Transportation. This week we got to look at projects in the City of Maryville. Talks such as these are just one of the benefits of being in Kiwanis that we all must appreciate.

The assistant city manager for the City of Maryville, Kevin Stoltenberg gave us an update on recent developments in our city. Kevin is a licensed Professional Engineer and has experience in site development, roadway design, and traffic engineering.

His presentation highlighted numerous projects within the city from five current and two future road projects to school and utility projects



to the new downtown hotel. He indicated that some proposed projects have been permanently shelved by the state's 10-year plan, eliminating over 600 projects to concentrate on meeting revenue availability. The current road projects within the city are locally funded, some with federal assistance. Even though the Montvale Road widening project was removed by the state, the city has plans to improve the traffic pattern on Montvale

He commented on high accident areas such as the Broadway and Old Niles Ferry intersection receiving some signaling at an all-local cost of \$1.8 million. Turning left onto West Broadway from Lamar Alexander is a nightmare at most times of the day. A second left turn lane will be added with signaling changes and widening of West Broadway to accommodate extra lanes. This will cost \$6.5 million, with 20% local and 80% from a federal grant. Another \$6.1 million will be spent on extending Foothills Mall Drive. The Maryville to Townsend Greenway Trail will be completed for \$3.9 million. Future plans are for the US 411/129 interchange to undergo a major renovation for \$23.7 million.

Several park projects were discussed including fixing 22 of the 26 bridges on the Greenway Trails and improvements at Sandy Springs and Amerine Parks and Streambank. Bicentennial Bridge and Pavilion and Everett Park have also undergone significant improvements.

Maryville High School is undergoing a major transformation to accommodate the addition of the 9th grade back to the High School and at the same time increase available space at the Junior High, Middle, and elementary schools. The total cost for parking lot improvements, addition of the classroom wing, and renovation of the auditorium is \$48 million with an additional \$820,000 for kitchen equipment in a new kitchen.

Our wastewater plant treats 11 million gallons/day some from well outside the city. Improvements in the efficiency of this plant are underway. All this activity has required the building of a new Operations Center at the cost of \$9.1 million.

The new downtown Holiday Inn will have 98 rooms on four stories above a 2-level parking garage. Sixty-one of the 120 parking spaces will be leased for public parking and the city is funding half the cost of the garage

Most of those attending were exhausted by the time all the projects were discussed. We have a forward-looking city who are dedicated to making this one of the best places to live in the USA.

These photos were taken by **Pete Davis** showing his appreciation for zooming in or getting close up for pictures. The one above was shot with a Nikon D7100 zooming in while still preserving picture quality and focusing. Also noticeable is the bokeh effect which is the blurring occurring behind the squirrel. Making the opening (aperture) larger makes for a shallow depth of field where only the squirrel and the tree are in focus.



In the picture of the pinecone buds above you see a similar effect without having to zoom. This was taken with a Sony Mavica which is now discontinued but obviously can still take good pictures. Most photographers would say the skill of good pictures is the eye behind the camera rather than the newness of the equipment.

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Tim Thurston took these pictures with his Nikon Z8 camera on a recent visit to West Point to visit his first-year (plebe) Cadet grandson. To be only 60 miles or so from New York City, West Point is in a sparsely populated section of the state. Adding to its beauty is the adjacent Hudson River (above), which curves around at the edge of the campus. Interestingly it was at this curve that a large chain was drawn across the river to prevent the British from getting further upstream during the American Revolutionary War, permitting cannons on both sides of the river to attack ships attempting passage.



This picture shows some of the cannons used to protect the then-fort at West Point. In the picture above post-processing (done on a computer) permits some enhancement of the fog. The picture below is as shot with little enhancement. Some purists would say that post-processing is a form of cheating to make the picture better than it actually is. The ease of programs such as Lightroom and Photoshop make, for me, that part of picture taking as enjoyable as taking the picture itself.

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Both of these photos were taken by **Tom Coulter** on a 2018 trip to Kenya, and they were made with a Nikon D750 camera with a Nikon 70-200/f2.8 lens.

The boy looking out the window is one of the orphans at the Connect With A Child orphanage/school in Nairobi Kenya. About 400 students, from pre-kindergarten to high school ages, reside there.

The photo of the motorcycle was made in Siaya, Kenya. Connect With A Child has a high school there. Most of the roads there are dirt and are very bumpy. It is not unusual to see motorcycles like this with three or four, and sometimes five, passengers. The bikes are relatively small and under-powered. Riding one of those in the US would be risky!
