We will recognize Maddie at our June 3rd club meeting. Ben and Bailey will attend our June 17th meeting. **Patsy Russell** and I were invited to the ECCA senior awards breakfast recently. Patsy was out of town and could not attend, but I was able to represent our club and present a scholarship



certificate to Ben. I also had a chance to speak to Ben and his mother after the event. Several awards were given to the seniors, and I was truly impressed by the accomplishments of these young people. If this is any indication, our community and nation will be in good hands.

As you know we are no longer doing the Leadership Camp. It had a good twenty year run under the capable direction of **Randy Allen** and **Patsy Russell.** \$10,000 of the \$20,000 donation from the Ed Harmon estate which was earmarked for the Leadership Camp can be used for alternate projects benefiting children if we notify the bank handling the estate. **Wanda Davis** chaired an ad hoc committee consisting of **Blake Mansfield, Carl VanHoozier, and Patsy Russell.** That committee recommended three projects which were approved by the Board of Directors.

The *first* is a pool party for Foster Children on July 12 at Springbrook Pool from 6:30 to 9:00pm. We will also be distributing snacks.

The *second* project chaired by **Wanda Davis** is hygiene closets at 4 county middle schools. This would be an ongoing project.

The *third* project would also be ongoing and explores ways to help homeless children in conjunction with Family Promise. This involves a Children's Corner bookcase filled with kid-appropriate books and Cubbies built for kid's coats, shoes, and school things. We could also consider hosting one of the dinners for a homeless family at a Family Promise location.

This is just a summary of these projects, and more information will be disseminated later. Wanda and her committee are to be commended for their hard work.

I hope everyone had an enjoyable and restful Memorial weekend when we remember and honor the brave men and women who sacrificed their lives for the freedom we enjoy today.

May 6 Meeting Notes







The meeting could not have started off better that a beautiful dessert brought by **Linda Ullom** in honor of **Patsy Russell** being named as Layperson of the Year. Jerry announced the selection of three recipients of \$1000 each to high school senior, Maddie Gravitte and Bailey Melenson from Maryville High and Ben Wigget from Eagleton CCA. These will be presented at the June meetings.

The program for today was presented by three men who all enjoy photography, and all share the same exact camera, the Nikon Z8. Each of these 3 have been long time members of this club.

Tim Thurston led off the presentation with a discussion of taking pictures in the RAW format. Several comparisons were made with RAW vs. JPEG with one of the main contrasts being that RAW allows for a much greater ability to manage the final picture. RAW captures do not capture the dimension that the human eye can but can capture much more color even in the bright and dark areas. Originally these pictures took up lots of disk space – and they still do – but disk space is now inexpensively available and that is not the same concern. The processing of images from RAW also takes more time and artificial intelligence has expanded this ability exponentially. For those with a little bit of computer savvy, the processing of the picture is as much fun as the taking.

Showing several photos from his world travels, **Tom Coulter** showed how he has made these trips permanent memories. Included in his presentation were beautiful pictures from Africa, Jerusalem, Sedona, New Mexico and Kentucky. Also, he recalled his visit to Pensacola where the Blue Angels practice with some stunning photos of this flying team. With pictures, he finds it much easier to show others where he has been.

Giving several tips on how to take better pictures, **Pete Davis** displayed and shared his skills that he has developed over the years. His first love is the full-sized camera that has evolved over the years from film to digital, from one lens to many, and now from camera to phone. Pete shared some simple tips on how to hold the phone when being used as a camera and cautioned about zooming in with your fingers making the final product much less quality. There are many ways to save photos digitally but always have a backup and try to have an organizing structure that permits you to easily find the pictures later.


His discussion today centered on Four Lessons learned from Four Men of History:

Lesson 1: *Don't take everything personally.* He told the story of how Andrew Jackson provoked a dual threat which never materialized. Later though, Jackson died from a wound acquired in a duel. He just took things too personally at times and paid for it with his life.

Lesson 2: Seek Wise Advice. Charles Guiteau after a somewhat unremarkable career as a failed evangelist, lawyer, and insurance salesman decided that he played a pivotal role in the election of James Garfield. He expected to be rewarded with a consulship but instead was banished from bothering Garfield. Claiming it was God's will, he assassinated Garfield and subsequently was hanged.

Lesson 3: *Bootstrap your Way into Life* George Washington began a life of privilege which was ended by his inheritance resulting in eventual bankruptcy. He had to pivot, became a successful surveyor, joined the militia, met and married Martha, and, as they say, the rest is history.

Lesson 4: *Pray for Stronger Backs.* On October 14, 1912, Theodore Roosevelt was campaigning in Milwaukee and shot by John Shrank to prevent him from running for a third term after a first term begun by McKinley's assassination. His steel eyeglass case and a 50-page copy of his speech slowed the bullet which still ended up lodged in his chest. He spoke for another hour before asking for medical attention. His first elected term began after he assumed the presidency from the assassinated McKinley. He didn't run the next time but came back four years later to win again.

Hints for Shooting Portraits

When shooting portraits be sure to check your lighting so that there are no harsh shadows. In this shot taken in the fall at Cade's Cove, the lighting on both our faces was natural without flash; the sun was above and in front of us and slightly to the right. I shot it on a tripod at 1/500 second exposure time, f5.6 f stop, 48 mm wide angle focal length so that I could get the mountains in the background slightly out of focus. I was even able to get Wanda to smile. It's one of my favorite shots of us.
