Patsy Russell brings many hats to each meeting. Today she wore the hat of the Chair of the meeting introducing herself to update Imagination Library (IL). She reminded us that the vision of IL was to "foster a love for reading among preschool children and their families, to create excitement about books, and to feel the magic that books can create."

Since the main program began over 264 million books have been distributed, over three million are currently sent monthly. Tennessee is one of only 12 states having statewide programs but there are affiliates in all fifty states and many foreign countries.

The Blount County program, which recently distributed its one millionth book, is paid for by the Maryville Kiwanis Foundation and the Governor's Early Literacy Foundation. Our \$64,000 annual contribution is matched by the Governor's program to fund the nearly 5000 books that are sent each month to Blount County children. There are many community partners who also assist with the program.

In support of the IL vision, a child's first 1000 days, threee years, are considered critical for emergent literary vocabulary. Without those skills, over 2/3 of children cannot read at or above the 4^{th} grade level. As they age these children make up 70% of prison inmates and 85% of juveniles who interface with the court system.

Much still needs to be done as we strive to get to a 75% enrollment of eligible children. Signups are held frequently throughout our community by our IL Committee. People often think they are taking an opportunity away from a less fortunate child or that they can use the books from an older child. Each and every age birth to 5-year child in Blount is eligible and encouraged to participate.

April 15 Meeting Notes



Tom Antkow introduced Jasmine Satterfield as our speaker. She is the Community Outreach Director of Senior Care Partners of East Tennessee (SCPET). She proudly spoke of her and her husband's Blount County heritage, claiming she was somehow related to 75% of local residents. She and her husband, Greg, have added three children to the Blount County lineage.

SCPET originated in Maryville and has grown to eight physicians, 30 nurse practitioners, and other senior care professionals to encompass Blount, Monroe, and Knox counties. Their clinics bring geriatric care

to ambulatory seniors in an outpatient setting. In addition, they provide services to patients in assisted living facilities, rehab, and long-term care facilities.

In addition to routine health care for geriatric patients, they offer wound care, foot care including nail trimming, transitional care and specialty clinics. Patients that are transitioning from nursing facility to home are assisted in making that transition as smooth as possible.

There are a number of organizations that are coordinated with SCPET to provide senior care and outreach. These include the Senior Resource Network, a network of senior services available locally, the Rosalynn Carter Institute for Caregivers, and the Caregiver Superhero Society. On the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month in three locations, the Caregiver Café, a support group, meets with interested seniors.

The population served by this group continues to grow. This group has grown from one nurse practitioner and one geriatric physician to the size it is now, and it all began right here in Maryville. All of us will eventually if not already be seniors, and all will need services such as these.

Patsy Russell Layperson of the Year

On a trip to Budapest in 2017, I took this night photo while cruising on the Danube. This is not the place to discuss the specifics of ISO other than the higher the ISO, the less light necessary to take a quality photo. In film days and even in the early days of digital an ISO of 400 was about as high as it went. To not get into the weeds, this picture was taken at an ISO of 6400 and with new cameras you could go all the way to ISO 124,000 and beyond. To get a photo like this in the old days you would have to use a tripod and have a



stationary spot, not a moving boat, to take the picture from. In this picture I was able to hand-hold the camera and use a fast enough shutter speed that would avoid blurring. There are payoffs in quality but, nevertheless, it is amazing what the technology provides now that would have been impossible years ago.

Colors don't maintain themselves as well at the high ISO setting but the dramatic effect of the lighted buildings against the dark night background with some stars in the sky make up for the loss of color. As in all the photos composition remains important. An angled off center and the lights glimmering off the water picture with the river fading and narrowing into the background provide added dimension The cameras do a lot, but composition by the person holding the camera still makes a difference.
