July 1 Meeting Notes

The name, Clayton Homes, is well-known to most anyone who has lived even a short time-period in this community. While many know it is a company that builds quality and attainable homes, most may not know that it employs 15,000 hone-building members throughout the country and many more in their home-selling group, for over 20,000 employees nation-wide.



To maintain such a large workforce, Clayton, founded in 1956, has devised the Clayton Wellbeing program to develop and implement well-

being programs for their Team Members. The Senior Wellbeing Strategist for this bold program is Vanessa Spiller, whom we were privileged to have as the presenter of this day's program.

A program of which they are particularly proud is the Clayton Impact Program which has provided over 100,000 volunteer hours to non-profits country-wide at an investment of over \$2.7 million. Of current day employees, 71% have actively participated in these volunteer programs. In Blount County alone the 1340 Team Members have volunteered 7500 hours.

A healthy workforce is an integral part of this initiative. Starting with a fitness center, they have expanded to include programs on connection and relationships, energy and food quality, prosperity and financial well-being, and self-care and restoration.

The vision of a company that calls Blount County its home is manifested in their growth to a nationwide company. Enabling that growth is a true investment in the well-being of their employees. Their investment includes not only their employees but the communities and programs they support, including our own Imagination Library initiative.

July 15 Meeting Notes

Jonathon Smith spoke to us today in his new role as CEO of Prisma Health, Blount Memorial Hospital. He has been with Blount Memorial since 2013, transitioned to Interim CEO in 2023 and then CEO in December 2024 with the acquisition by Prisma Health. He emphasized how the leadership of the hospital remained basically intact under the new ownership of Prisma Health.

Most will recall the front-page headlines for weeks when Blount
Memorial was baring their financial difficulties and potential
acquisitions were being discussed. Indeed, concern whether Blount Memorial would even survive
this difficulty was very real.

Out of this, came a dedicated group of individuals, including Kiwanian Dr. Steve Kiefer, who reviewed the options and, in the process, made the hospital stronger and more financially stable. Prisma Health saw the value of our local hospital and expanded from their South Carolina footprint to their first Tennessee location here in Maryville. As part of their confidence in Blount Memorial they are investing over \$275 million here.

Primarily in South Carolina, Prisma employs 32,000 and has 3600 employed providers. Already in the works are upgrades of the Emergency Room, converting the entire computer system to the more efficient and modernized EPIC system, along with new ultrasound and mammography equipment. With these upgrades and infusion of capital Blount Memorial has been rated 4-star by a nationally recognized system and been deemed a Chest Pain Center by the American College of Cardiology.

As these improvements take place, revenues, inpatient discharges, and outpatient visits have increased with number of mortalities due to sepsis and number of days awaiting an appointment. For those who have waited seemingly forever for a doctor appointment, their very aggressive goal of a 3-day way is felt within their reach. While hospitals are considered places for sick care, the Prisma Health Initiative is determined to make health promotion their goal.

Hospitals touch nearly everyone and the presence of one of the industry heavyweights promises to make our community best prepared to meet the health needs of now and the future. We all welcome them to our community.


Pete and Wanda Davis, Linda Ullom, and Marie Rousch attended the July 17 Aktion Club


