PENNSYLVNIA DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING BOARD MEETING MINUTES April 13, 2019

The fourth meeting of the 2018-19 Pennsylvania District Board of Trustees was held on April 13, 2019. Governor Phil Weber presided. The following board members were present at the meeting: Governor Phil Weber, Governor-elect Mike Haven, Immediate Past Governor Judy Raub, Trustees Roger Janes, John Mazurowski (on speakerphone), Matt Wise, Ben Osterhout, Mike Coolbaugh, Sarah Zulueta and Executive Director Kevin Thomas. Trustee Alice Arnold was in attendance later in the meeting. Guests included Past Governor, Public Relations and Audit Chair Bob Raub, Division 15 Lt. Governor and Builders Club Chair Tiffany Callaio, Past Trustee Judy Janes, and District Administrative Assistant Michelle March.

The minutes from the January 19, 2019 board meeting were considered for approval. See P1-P2 for the minutes as presented. The minutes were approved as presented.

The consent agenda was considered. Prior to the meeting, it was requested that the Immediate Past Governor's and Executive Director's reports be pulled from the consent the agenda for discussion and possible approval later in the meeting. All other items on the consent agenda were approved by proper motion, second and vote. See P3–P23 for the items approved.

Membership and New Club Building was discussed. Trustee and Membership co-chair Matt Wise led the discussion. Extensive discussion took place on membership growth and the proper approach to take on membership growth and establishing new Clubs. See P24—P31.

The Foundation report was emailed to board members for review by Foundation President Kristina Badali; see P32–P33. The board is still waiting on a formal response from the Foundation about the Unclaimed Properties proposal. Executive Director Kevin Thomas recommended, after talking with Kiwanis International By-laws and Policies Chair Diane O'Brien, that a policy be adopted so that any proposed changes to the Foundation by-laws be approved by the District board first. Governor Phil Weber proposed that Kevin create a draft of the new policy to be presented to the board on the next conference call. There was continued discussion regarding the allocation of money collected from defunct Club foundations.

There was a discussion regarding the Foundation Nominating Committee. There are currently 5 vacancies on the upcoming Foundation board. Governor Phil will work with Governor-Elect Mike Haven and Immediate-Past Governor Judy Raub, and the Past Governor's Association to find additional Nominating Committee members. Governor Phil appointed Judy Raub to Chair to Foundation nominating committee in accordance with District policies and procedures which are on P34—P35.

The board reviewed the Finance report, as submitted by Committee Chair Paul Kasoff. It was noted that this report was issued without the review or approval of the Finance Committee, and therefore could not be represented as the "Committee Report," only that of the Chair. There was discussion about Paul Kasoff's request to step down from the position of Committee Chair. Governor Phil Weber proposed to have someone fill the role temporarily until the end of the administrative year. Trustee Roger Janes volunteered to temporarily fill the role of Committee Chair. Trustee Ben Osterhout volunteered to serve on the Finance Committee to keep the number of committee members at 5. Ben moved that the operating budget and account balances be noted as received. The motion was seconded and approved. See P36—P43 for the Finance Committee report, the account balance report and the budget report.

The 2019 Holiday Party was discussed. See P44 for the Holiday Party Financial report. Kevin suggested that a note be sent to Stef Stamatopoulos for her generous donation of the money that was rebated to her from the event hall.

The Kiwanis Kash Raffle was discussed. All Clubs have received their letter and allotted number of tickets either at the Midwinter conference or via mail.

Trustee Sarah Zulueta provided an update on the purse hook fundraiser; see P45 for an update. It was noted that emphasis needs to be made that this is a District fundraiser. Governor Phil Weber mentioned being approached by a Kiwanian with another fundraiser idea. It was decided that all fundraising ideas should be forwarded to either Sarah Zulueta or the District office.

The Kiwanis Day at Citizens Bank Park with the Philadelphia Phillies on June 22nd was discussed. To date, 63 tickets have been sold.

The incident regarding the traffic accident at the Washington Crossing-Yardley Club was discussed. The families of the three injured children have retained counsel, and the District was so notified by their counsel. Any questions posed by the media or other parties should be directed to Public Relations Chair Bob Raub in the form of a written inquiry. A claim has been established with the Kiwanis International Insurance carrier.

A discussion was had regarding the Audit report; see P46. The results from the 2017-18 year have been added to the report. The IRS form 990 has been filed. Audit Chair Bob Raub requested that the board proceed to put out an RFP for audit and Form 990 preparations. Trustee Ben Osterhout moved that the RFP ask for quotes to see what prices would be for an audit and 990 prep, versus a financial review and 990 prep. Motion was seconded and approved.

An update was provided on Clubs that have not paid 2018-19 dues. At the time of the meeting, only Johnstown and Kingston had not paid.

An update was provided on the new District Website, which is now up and operational.

Executive Director Kevin Thomas requested that the board meeting go into Executive Session and asked that all non-board members excuse themselves until the requested Executive Session was completed. The closed discussion focused on incidences of bullying taking place within the District. A committee consisting of Matt Wise, Mike Coolbaugh and Mary Dolan (of the Kiwanis Club of Elizabethtown) was appointed to come up with a District policy on bullying to define what constitutes bullying and what action will follow where cases of bullying are reported.

Immediate-Past Governor Judy Raub's report, which was removed from the consent agenda, was reviewed and discussed by the board. The report was accepted after review and discussion. See P47-P48.

The Executive Director's report, which was removed from the consent agenda, was reviewed by the board. The report was accepted. See P49-P52.

A discussion was had regarding improving training for District Leadership. Mike Haven, Jen Vare, and Sarah Zulueta will put together a program to be discussed by the board at a later date.

The various open District Leadership positions, primarily Lt. Governors, were reviewed. See P53.

A discussion was had regarding re-aligning certain Divisions to better balance Lt. Governor workload; see P54. Governor Phil has discussed this with Trustee Mike Coolbaugh and Lt. Governors Young Chang (Div 18) and Jen Vare (Div 19) [Note there is no Lt. Governor for Div 17]. After checking the District Policies, a motion was made to waive Article 3, Section C, paragraph 2, sub-paragraph 5 (deadline date of March 1) for this proposal. The motion was seconded and approved. Governor Phil Weber and Governor-Elect Mike Haven will work on getting notifications out to the Clubs in Divisions 17, 18 and 19.

An update was provided regarding Lt. Governor training for the 2019 – 20 class. The training will take place at the Genetti Hotel in Williamsport on Saturday June 15th. A discussion was held on whether the invitation to the training should be extended to Lt. Governor-Elects for the 2020 – 21 class, if they are so identified. The Board agreed to make this extension, citing how it is policy to invite co-Lt. Governors. It was suggested that the Trustee training be held the evening before the Lt. Governor training, at the Genetti Hotel on Friday, June 14th, at 6 pm.

A report was provided on the 2019 Midwinter Conference. See P55-P63.

The future of the Midwinter Conference was discussed. The board reviewed the comments and results of the Mid-Winter evaluation surveys and the report of the Committee tasked with proposing the future direction of Mid-Winter. Trustee Ben Osterhout made a motion that the board accept a proposal from the Penn Stater to host the Mid-Winter Conference for 2020; the motion was seconded and approved. A suggestion was made and accepted to change the name from Midwinter Conference to Mid-Year Conference. Executive Director Kevin Thomas made a motion that the Steering Committee study the alternative Gala suggested in their report and come back with a more detailed plan at the September board meeting, which could be used for budgeting and program purposes. Both motions were individually seconded and approved. The report of the steering committee is P65–P66.

Kevin Thomas made a motion that a committee of three Trustees evaluate the Fall Regional meetings in terms of agenda and efficacy of the Governor's visits and deliver the committee's recommendations to the board at the July meeting. Governor Phil Weber, Governor-Elect Mike Haven, Public Relations and Audit Chair Bob Raub, and Trustees Matt Wise, Mike Coolbaugh, and Ben Osterhout volunteered to serve on the committee. Motion was seconded and approved.

The 2019 District Convention in Williamsport was reviewed by Governor-elect and Convention Chair Mike Haven and discussed by the board. Governor Phil Weber set a Board meeting via conference call on Monday, May 13th at 8:30 pm to approve the convention budget and program. See P66–P67.

The 2019 International Convention on Orlando, FL was discussed by the board. Executive Director Kevin Thomas moved that the board endorse Peter Mancuso of the New York District for Kiwanis International Vice President and that that the board endorse Gary Cooper from the Carolinas District for Kiwanis International Trustee. The motion was seconded and approved, with Trustee Ben Osterhout abstaining.

A discussion was had regarding the upcoming by-laws amendments that will be presented at the 2019 Kiwanis International Convention; see P68–P82. A motion was made that the board support Amendment #1 (Non Discrimination) and Shawn Smith's proposed amendment to that proposed amendment to make the amendment language more inclusive. The motion was seconded and approved, with Trustee Ben Osterhout abstaining. A motion was made that the board oppose Amendment #2 (allowing abstentions when voting for multiple vacancies). The motion was seconded and approved, with Trustee Ben Osterhout abstaining. Governor Phil Weber asked for a motion on Amendment #3 (mandating a gap year). No motion was made. Kevin Thomas moved that the board oppose Amendment #4 (setting aside 1 International Trustee position for a Kiwanian under the age of 50). The motion was seconded and approved, with Trustee Ben Osterhout abstaining. Another motion was made to oppose Amendment #5 (Family discount for International dues). The motion was seconded and approved, with Trustee Ben Osterhout abstaining.

The board discussed a District social gathering at the 2019 International Convention; see the report (P83–P84) compiled by Sarah Zulueta. Executive Director Kevin Thomas moved to proceed with the 'happy hour' suggestion, with the provision that is was financially self-supporting and proved no financial risk to the District itself. The motion was seconded and approved.

Kevin submitted a report on Early Childhood Development that showed the current guide distribution. See P85–P90.

There was discussion about becoming an organizational supporter for Strong Start PA. Immediate-Past Governor Judy Raub suggested that the board review the supplied documents and have a discussion at the July board meeting. This suggestion was accepted.

A discussion was held regarding distributing materials for the PA Department of Treasury's Education Savings Account Program. Trustee Alice Arnold moved that the District help distribute materials regarding this program through its networks. Motion was seconded and approved, with Trustee Matt Wise abstaining. See P91–P92 for more information on this program.

Governor Phil Weber asked that any other Foundation discussion be tabled until the next regular meeting.

A discussion was had regarding the American Red Cross: Sound the Alarm program. Since this information is coming through Kiwanis International itself, Executive Director Kevin Thomas moved that the District share this information with the Clubs. The motion was seconded and approved. See P93-P94.

Proposed dates for the 2019-20 Board Meetings were discussed. After consideration, Trustee Ben Osterhout suggested that the proposed April board meeting be moved to the Sunday following the 2020 Midwinter Conference. This suggestion was accepted by the board. Accordingly, the board will meet in these four dates during the 2019-20 year: September 28, 2019; January 18, 2020; March 22, 2020 and July 18, 2020.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned.

PENNSYLVNIA DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING BOARD MEETING MINUTES January 19, 2019

The third meeting of the 2018-19 Pennsylvania District Board of Trustees was held on January 19, 2019. Because of inclement weather conditions, the meeting was conducted via a go to meeting platform. Governor Phil Weber presided. The following board members were present on the call/meeting: Governor Phil Weber, Governor-elect Mike Haven, Immediate Past Governor Judy Raub, Trustees Roger Janes, John Mazurowski, Matt Wise, Ben Osterhout, Mike Coolbaugh, Sarah Zulueta and Executive Director Kevin Thomas. Guests included Finance Chair and Foundation Vice-President Paul Kasoff, Past Governor, Public Relations and Audit Chair Bob Raub, Past Governor, Education Chair & Past Governor Jennifer Vare, K-Kids Administrator, Audit Committee member and Region VII Trustee-elect Lillian Mataja and Aktion Club Co-Administrator, Lt. Governor and Region II Trustee-elect, Barbara Byers.

The minutes from the September 22, 2018 and November 1, 2018 board meetings were considered for approval. See P1-P4 for the minutes as presented. Both sets of minutes were approved as presented.

The consent agenda was considered. See P5-P32. Prior to the meeting, it was requested that the Governor's, Executive Director's and Public Relations Chair's reports be pulled from the consent the agenda for discussion and possible approval later in the meeting. All other items on the consent agenda were approved by proper motion, second and vote.

The audit committee report was presented by committee chair Bob Raub. See P33-P34. The report was accepted by the board.

The finance committee report was presented by committee chair Paul Kasoff. See P35. Trustee Matt Wise asked what the committee is doing in relation to policy and procedure changes as recommended by our accounting firm, RKL. Mr. Kasoff made a commitment to review all those recommendations and provide a report to the board. The account balances and 2018-19 Budget report were reviewed by the board and are P36-P39. The finance committee, account balances and budget report were all accepted by the board.

Frank lati from the accounting firm of RKL joined the call to discuss the 2017-18 audit. See P43-P60. Mr. lati spent time with the board discussing and reviewing the report, answering questions and discussing concerns. After the review and discussion, the board approved the draft copy of the audit report and instructed Mr. lati to finalize the document.

The District's 2017-18 IRS Form 990 was reviewed by the board. See P62-P86. After review, the board approved the form for submission with a change to the number of board members from 10 to 11.

Unclaimed property was discussed. Immediate Past Governor Judy Raub discussed plans to make claims for additional property that has turned up. The Foundation monies were discussed and any possible action on that was deferred to the April meeting. See P87-P91.

It was reported that because of inclement weather, the Holiday Party was cancelled. To date, six refunds have been requested of the people registered and that had paid. Three people that had not paid will be submitting their payment. The hall where the party was being held permitted cancellation and will refund the amount paid to Stef Stamatopoulos less \$100.00 and Stef will be donating that refund to the party fund. The baskets which were to be auctioned will be auctioned at the Midwinter Conference. The timing of the Holiday Party was discussed and the Holiday Party committee will be discussing this.

The District Kiwanis Kash Raffle was discussed and plans updated for 2019. It was agreed that clubs would all be provided tickets again and that as many club packets as possible would be given out at Midwinter.

The Kiwanis Day at Citizens Bank Park with the Philadelphia Phillies was discussed. The game will be June 22nd. Efforts to revitalize interest in the game were discussed. Sarah Zulueta will be reaching out to game chair Earl Wolfe about changing the flyer used to promote the game in order to boost sales.

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The Kiwanis Family Pin fundraiser concept was brought up. Jen Vare will be reaching to Kelly Shaup to determine where this effort stands.

An update was provided on the purse hook fundraiser. See P92. An updated promotional flyer will be developed and sales will be conducted at Midwinter.

Membership and New Club Building was discussed. See P93-P100. Trustee and Membership co-chair Matt Wise led the discussion. Extensive discussion took place on membership growth and the proper approach to take on membership growth. There was discussion on the Board membership retreat which will take place on January 26th.

Governor Phil Weber's report, which was removed from the consent agenda, was reviewed and discussed by the board. See P101-P105. The report was accepted after review and discussion.

The Executive Director's report, which was removed from the consent agenda, was reviewed by the board. See P105-108. Of the various recommendations, the following was determined: Sarah Zulueta will work with Kevin Thomas and Michelle to establish Google Drives for various District Documents; the intern recommendation will be developed by Ben Osterhout and Kevin Thomas; Kevin Thomas will further explore the Key Club EIN number retirement/closing. The report was accepted.

The Public Relations report was reviewed. See P109. The incident referenced there in was discussed and reviewed by the board. The Public Relations report was accepted.

The various open District Leadership positions were reviewed. See P 110.

The position of District Advocate was considered. See P111. Action was deferred on this until the April meeting.

The 2019 Midwinter Conference was considered. Attendance and sponsorship totals were reviewed. It was decided that we will be presenting the 2017-18 Distinguished Club Awards at the Conference and Judy Raub and Kevin Thomas will organize this. It was, also, decided to again have a signature project contest and present those awards at Midwinter. The contest judging committee will be Judy Raub (chair), Bob Raub and John Mazurowski.

The future of the Midwinter Conference was discussed. After discussion, it was decided that the committee looking at this issue would develop a survey to be sent to all members regarding their views and attendance on all of the various conferences and conventions and report the results of that survey to the board at the April meeting.

The 2019 District Convention in Williamsport was discussed by the board.

If any Regions are planning Spring meetings, it was requested that the dates, times and locations of those meetings be reported to Kevin Thomas.

The board approved the concept of a Kiwanis Night at PNC Park with the Pittsburgh Pirates provided that there was no Financial risk to the District.

The board approved the purchase of the Hero In Service awards since that inventory has been depleted.

The recent emphasis of Kiwanis International on its trademark enforcement was discussed by the District Board.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned.

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District Public Relations Coordinator Report to the District Board

April 13, 2019

Activities of the PR Coordinator remain somewhat slow. Clubs continue to do what that have done paying little attention to the emphasis being placed on branding. Just this past month there were three instances where the obsolete "bird-cage" logo as still being used. In two instances, the bird-cage was on club flyers and posters advertising an event and a third case, the bird cage was on a customer plaque presented to a community member for outstanding service. Clubs need to be challenged not to use obsolete materials whenever economically possible.

I met with Governor Elect Mike to discuss on-going plans for the PR Coordinator position because of the training that will be offered at ICON. I expressed my desire to be replaced in this position and despite efforts to identify someone to replace me, I expressed to Governor Elect Mike that I would continue to serve until such time as a replacement could be named. I agreed to represent the district at the position training the day prior to convention starting.

As previously reported, over the holiday season, a district club event held in a public park resulted in a vehicle striking three children. This event was properly handled by the club involved and np perceivable public visibility occurred. However, the incident remains active having received recent correspondence regarding potential claims.

A good deal of time was spent reading and evaluating entries in the District Signature Project contest. I participated as a member of the judging committee and was somewhat surprised to see little evidence that these "signature projects" were Kiwanis projects. Clubs should remember that enhancing the Kiwanis image is part of the overall Kiwanis strategic plan and promoting what we do so that we become known for the specific involvement in our community is a direct result of what we do. While we are not motivated for credit, we might receive in raising funds or doing a service project, we should want to be known for doing an event. Community members should know that their local Kiwanis Club makes this specific thing happen for the improvement in the lives of children.

- Unclaimed Property and Tax Exempt Status The Foundation continues to collaborate with the Pennsylvania Kiwanis Board and District Office to claim unclaimed property for clubs that previously had a Foundation. We appreciate the recent discussion and decision for the funds recovered by the District to date from defunct club foundation be forwarded to the Foundation. We thank Immediate Past Governor Judy Raub for continuing to lead this effort for the District and Foundation as well as other individuals who have worked with this effort. The Foundation also has submitted paper-work to file for tax exempt status. We are awaiting to hear back from the government with our approval and/or next steps.

The Foundation needs the support of all Pennsylvania Kiwanis members. The Foundation cannot continue to provide program support without financial resources. Please encourage clubs and members to make the Pennsylvania Kiwanis Foundation a philanthropic priority.

DISTRICT FOUNDATION NOMINATING COMMITTEE

District Bylaws, Article V, Section 2, Paragraph C:

District Foundation Nominating. The District Foundation Nominating Committee shall consist of at least one member from the District Board of Trustees, one member of the Pennsylvania Kiwanis Foundation Board of Directors and at least three (3) additional members. The District Foundation Nominating Committee shall select a slate of candidates to serve a three (3) year term as directors on the Pennsylvania Kiwanis Foundation Board and to be submitted for election at the annual meeting of the District Foundation.

District Policy Code:

PROCEDURE FOR THE PENNSYLVANIA DISTRICT FOUNDATION NOMINATING COMMMITTEE

- a. The following will serve as a guideline for the appointment and operation/conduct of the District Foundation Nominating Committee.
 - By not later than March 1st of the administrative year, the District Governor shall have appointed the District Foundation Nominating Committee in accordance with Article VII, Section 3, paragraph (h) of the District Bylaws and provide them with instruction on the duties of the committee.
 - ii. In accordance with Article VIII, Section 20, the District Foundation Nominating Committee shall select a slate of candidates to serve a three (3) year term as directors on the Pennsylvania Kiwanis Foundation Board and to be submitted for election at the annual meeting of the District Foundation.
 - iii. The Nominating Committee shall hold at least one meeting of all members of the committee to discuss its responsibilities and develop a plan to meet those responsibilities.
 - iv. The Nominating Committee shall select at least one candidate for every term which will be expiring at the end of the administrative year and for any other vacancies on the Foundation Board of Directors.
 - v. The Nominating committee will contact all potential nominees to the Foundation Board of Directors and get their assurance that they will serve and meet all responsibilities, if elected. The committee will not submit the names of anyone who has not been contacted and/or has not agreed to serve and meet all responsibilities. The committee should extend the courtesy of contacting all members of the Board whose terms are expiring and ask them whether they wish to be nominated for another term.
 - vi. The Chairman of the nominating committee will insure that all members

- of the committee shall receive the names of all Kiwanians whose names will be submitted for nomination. A majority of the committee must approve the list of nominees.
- vii. Not less than 45 days prior to the start of the annual District Convention, the Chairman of the Committee shall report the names of all candidates approved by the committee to the District Governor and President of the District Foundation.
- viii. The Foundation President or his/her designated representative will prepare a ballot showing the names of all Kiwanians submitted by the nominating committee. The ballot should list all candidates in alphabetical order and incumbents should be noted.
- ix. All members of the nominating committee will remain impartial and will not endorse or campaign for any of the nominees the committee develops.



Finance Committee Report to the Board 04.13.2019

District Audit Committee Report to the District Board

April 13, 2019

At the last District Board meeting in January, Frank lati from RKL presented the findings of the audit team for their audit of the Kiwanis year October 1, 2017 – September 30, 2018. In addition, he presented the IRS Form 990 that was due to be file on or before February 15, 2019.

As we recall, the board accepted and approved both the audit and IRS Form 990 as submitted by RKL and steps were taken to electronically file the IRS Form 990 return. RKL reported during the first part of February that the electronic filing system failed to accept our IRS 990 tax return and that we would have to manually submit the return. Kevin was provided with the hard copy of the IRS Form 990 with instructions to send it certified mail in order to track receipt and he confirmed that it was sent on February 11, 2019.

Because we never really got together in January, we have requested hard copies of the audit be provided the committee and possibly we will have them in time for the board meeting. I hope that the Executive Director's report includes assertions that the IRS Form 990 was mailed as stated.

The next steps for the audit committee is to prepare and send out RFP letters for the next audit and IRS Form 990 preparation. As directed by the board, the committee recognizes the desire to include CPA firms outside the Harrisburg and central PA area as costs may vary due to geography. However, we have no knowledge or idea of which CPA firms to try to engage. The committee requests that board members who may have experience with and contact information for other firms that they wish us to include, please let the committee know by May 1, 2019 so that a potential bidder's list can be prepared and appropriate letters mailed to these firms. The Elizabethtown Kiwanis Foundation uses a more local firm that prepares the 990 for slightly less than \$1,000 and we should include this firm on the list.

With approval of the District Board, the committee is prepared to ask for responses from other CPA firms for the board to consider at its next board meeting so that a notice to proceed could be offered to the successful firm and work could commence shortly after the close of the Kiwanis year 2018 -2019.

Immediate-Past Governor's Board Report for April 13, 2019 meeting

Dear fellow board members:

The January in-person board meeting was canceled due to the weather, which also caused the canceling of our District holiday party fundraiser. In January, I was instrumental in working with the Southern Lancaster club for their chartering celebration as well as attending the District Membership Meeting with Chris Martz leading this day's training.

From the Board "GoToMeeting" that was held on January 19th, I stepped up to serve on the Signature Project Review committee along with Bob Raub and John Mazurowski. We had 12 projects submitted but 2 of them were not eligible as the initial criteria was not met (the projects hadn't occurred yet). All projects were scored independently, the committee discussed them in detail and then averaged. The top 3 Kiwanis Clubs were Allentown, Bald Eagle Nittany Valley and Sheraden. The Kiwanis Club of Allentown was selected as our First-Place winner. They were "secretly" notified so they could submit their project to KI by their deadline. Sadly, we heard that they did place in the top 10 projects that were submitted. During the discussions on the scoring rubric with the committee, our data guru, John Mazurowski, created a new rubric and we would like to use this moving forward as it is a more thorough collection to meet Kiwanis International Strategic Plan, which tags all the parts of this Signature Project's criteria / questions; and can certainly be used moving forward. The Signature Projects were highlighted at mid-winter and the top 3 announced. I was asked to do a "workshop/forum" on this topic as well as service projects in general, which I did. It was lightly attended but there were good questions and interaction.

Also, during our Mid-Winter lunch session, I was honored to present the 2017-2018 Distinguished Clubs. There were 54 clubs in total that received this distinction. There were also 6 Lt. Governors who received the Distinguished Lt. Governor award.

During this time, I was asked by Governor Phil on his behalf, to attend Circle-K Convention as well as Key Club Convention. Which I did. I participated in both in whatever capacity I was needed and helpful, to include being the representative for the PA Kiwanis Foundation for both, as no other Foundation board member was attending.

As an ex-officio member of the Foundation Board, I attended their March meeting on Sunday after our Mid-Winter. If time permits, I would like this topic to have some discussion during our April Board Meeting. There are several vacancies on the current Board and the best I can tell there is no one stepping up to serve the Foundation as President for the upcoming year. At this meeting I did agree to work on recovering some "unclaimed property" that is clearly marked "Foundation." There is one such claim to be made – the Kiwanis Foundation of Phila Inc. – it appears that the last transaction date was February 25, 1978. I have begun the claiming process for this entity. To the best of my knowledge there has been no reply from the state, in connection with the Graham Company claim that I believe was processed.

As far as the District unclaimed requests, which were processed in January, we are either awaiting a request for additional information or the money. Either way there is nothing further to be claimed at this point.

Our District Finance Committee has seemed to have fallen asleep or died. We have had not meetings, discussions or anything to track where we are to what the audit from RKL has suggested. We spent a lot of money on this audit process to get us in line and to try and turn our financial ship around. The Board and the Audit Committee has given us some direction and yet we do not move. In my opinion, it is time for this committee to be revamped and redirected, based on the audit findings, direct changes and suggestions. There is a saying that I am quite fond of and it goes something like this: you can't expect different results if you continue to do the same things.

Also, during this time, I have attended a few 2020 District Convention planning meetings. We don't seem to be moving there either, but then again, we still have a bit of time.

My sympathies go out to the family and friends of the number of Kiwanians we have lost over these past few months. Our District, our Regions, our Divisions, our Clubs will surely feel their loss.

My closing line from my last report still holds true, so I will use it again.

I love our District. I love what we do as a Kiwanis organization. I love the relationships I have made along the way.

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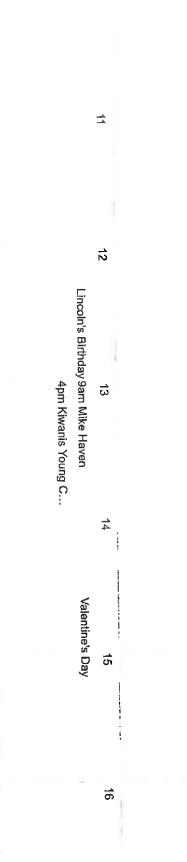
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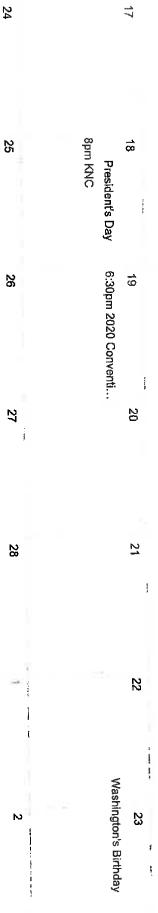

To The Board:

I think it is clear that an objective review of the current allocation of clubs among Divisions within the District needs to be done. Last year, we merged two divisions in western PA.

There are two ways to approach: a wholesale District once and done, or case-by-case. I favor the latter as we can produce sound reasoning for each proposed merger or reallocation, rather than give the impression of upsetting the apple cart.

Mike Haven, Mike Coolbaugh, Young Chang, Jen Vare and I have reviewed the following as a possible next step. It is presented for our discussion at the 4/13/19 Board Meeting.

PROPOSAL FOR MERGING DIVISIONS 17 & 18

Background:

- Division 18 currently has 4 active clubs (* indicates membership below Charter Strength): Upper Perkiomen*, Emmaus, Allentown Northeast, Allentown.
- Division 17 currently has 6 active clubs: Easton, Easton Suburban*, Nazareth*, Palmer Township, Pocono-Daybreak, Stroudsburg.
- The total membership (as of 4/1/19) in Division 18 is 100, in Division 17 it is 177, or a combined membership of 277.
- With the exception of the Upper Perkiomen, (Montgomery County) Pocono Daybreak and Stroudsburg Clubs (Monroe County), the rest are located in the contiguous areas of Lehigh and Northampton Counties.
- Division 17 has lacked a Lt. Governor for a number of years.

Proposal:

- Merge the existing Divisions 17 and 18 into one contiguous Division 17.
- Transfer the Upper Perkiomen Club (12 members) to Division 19.

Discussion:

- The resulting number of clubs in the (new) Division 17 would be 9, with a total membership of 265. This is more in line with numbers in other Divisions.
- The Upper Perkiomen Club is a sound Kiwanis Club, from their community and Youth service activities, but deliberately shuns any activities with other clubs in their division, region, or District activities. They are below charter strength with only 12 members. They should be indifferent to a change in reporting. Moving them to Division 19 (which includes nearby clubs of Upper Bucks and Pottsville) seems to be a better geographic fit. The number of clubs in Division 19 would increase from 6 to 7.
- The locations of all clubs in the new Division 17 are well-connected with major highways and primary state roads. The driving time from the furthest two clubs (Emmaus → Stroudsburg) is about an hour or less.
- Under current bylaw requirements for the position of Lt. Governor, clubs in current Division 18
 have been more successful in recruiting leadership.
- We reduce the number of Lt. Governors by 1, potentially reducing overhead costs.

Steering Committee for Kiwanis Conferences and Conventions

The committee consisted of the following members: Jennifer Vare (chair), Judy Raub, Megan Kuffa, Phyllis Palm and Russ Wynn

1)After reviewing the materials from the previous committee and board's thoughts we discussed and thought it was important to hear specifically from the membership about their willingness to attend local as well as across the state events.

2)Charts & the comments showing responses from the members who took the survey were previously sent to the board. Please note, throughout the process of reading if a specific comment seemed relative to a district committee, leadership, area or region we forwarded those responses as able.

3)At Midwinter the committee met in person to review the findings of the survey.

Committee Comments:

- 1. We found it interesting that some people had never attended, would never attend, but also gave their opinion on what we should be doing.
- There seems to be a belief that events outside of the club are predominantly for officers and not of value to members. We need to work to overcome that misconception or we will continue to "recycle" officers in Kiwanis and not develop new leaders.
- 3. Redundancy of topics being covered was mentioned by several responses
- 4. Cost. We noticed it on so many of the different categories, but then a bunch of people also included it in their own comments, as well. If the value in the event is not there, why are they spending the money? Well, the answer is, they aren't, and therein lies the problem.
- 5. Time. Ditto to what was said above, but change out money for time. If what they are hearing and learning is not worth time away from their families or even club events, they are not going to attend. We need to find ways to make events worth their while!
- 6. There were a few responses that spoke about how Midwinter was supposed to end shortly after the Trustee system came into effect. We asked Kevin Thomas about this and took his comments into consideration as well. See below comments from Kevin's email response:
 - o "Almost from the inception, most of the Regional meetings never materialized into what was envisioned; this included from the way they were organized, promoted and conducted to the attendance and participation levels."
 - o "When it came time to make the decision to no longer do Midwinters and do only regional meetings, the boards, on consecutive years, did not feel confident that regional meetings actually represented a sufficient replacement for Midwinter."
 - o "When it was suggested that perhaps this could be accomplished if all Regional meetings used the same standard agenda, the idea was rejected because 'each region has its own needs and preferred methods of operation'. Without standardization including both programming and operation, I would suggest quality control and messaging are difficult if not impossible."
 - o "So the following compromise was made. We would continue with Midwinter. We would only have fall regional meeting as "mandatory" on the part of the trustees and make the spring regional meeting, which was mandatory, optional."

Committee Recommendations:

- 1. There will be **NO** Midwinter in 2020
- 2. In 2019, the 7 Fall Regional meetings all be coordinated with the same agenda & topics.
 - o This would be coordinated by the incoming Governor and incoming board members immediately following the June (2019) training session.
 - o Regions that like to add on additional time or agenda topics to their regional may do so AFTER the consensus agenda.
 - o Attractive Kiwanis branded save the dates go to <u>ALL</u> members in each region before District Convention; sent out by the District Office
 - By September 1st of each year location and starting time is determined and added to a Kiwanis branded invitation and is sent to <u>ALL</u> members with RSVPs going to the Regional Trustee; sent out by the District Office
 - LTGS & Trustees are encouraged to promote and push attendance via social media, emails, calls, etc as has always been done in the past
 - o A follow up survey will be sent to all attendees through the district office
- 3. At the January, 2020 Board Meeting there will be a review of surveys, successes and weaknesses to determine if the Fall Regional meetings should continue in this way through the future.
- 4. 2020 Spring Regional Events/meetings would be at the discretion of the Trustees & LTGs in each Region
- 5. In 2020, a no financial risk, Children's Gala be held in the spring
 - o A committee will be appointed by the Board to spearhead event
 - This current steering committee would be interested in being the inaugural committee if assigned
 - The gala would be coordinated and promoted by committee
 - Tasked to find a location, procedures, marketing, etc.
 - All locations, pricing, etc would be booked and approved with Board approval
- 6. After the 2020 Gala, at the summer Board Meeting a decision would be made to proceed with Gala 2021 or cancel it
- 7. At the same summer Board Meeting a decision will be made to try Super Regionals for Spring 2021
 - These could be broken up:
 - North & South
 - East & West
 - Break into 3 groups
 - Or go wherever members want based on date & time
 - Spring Super Regionals would each have the same agenda & timeframe
 - o If fall meeting is working with special marketing (above) we suggest following the same procedure

Proposed Resolution Safe Kids

Submitted by: Kiwanis International Board

Purpose: This resolution puts into writing something all Kiwanians believe: All children deserve to be safe. This resolution requires no action by Kiwanis International, clubs, or districts, but exemplifies to the world Kiwanis' unwavering mission of serving the children of the world.

Effective date: October 1, 2019 Vote required to adopt: Majority

Financial Impact: None

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The Kiwanis motto is Serving the Children of the World; and

WHEREAS, The Kiwanis defining statement includes the phrase, "improving the world one child and one community at a time"; and

WHEREAS, The Fifth Object of Kiwanis is: "To provide, through Kiwanis clubs a practical means...to build better communities"; and

WHEREAS, The Sixth Object of Kiwanis is: "To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism, and goodwill";

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Kiwanis International stands against violence, neglect, and abuse directed towards children.

Proposed Amendment 1 Nondiscrimination Clause

Submitted by: Kiwanis Club of East Geauga, Ohio, USA

Purpose: To add a nondiscrimination clause to the Kiwanis International

bylaws.

Effective date: Immediately

Vote required to adopt: Two-thirds

Proposer's position: The club advocates this amendment for the following reasons:

- This amendment will help ensure that all people are treated equally and given the
 opportunity to be welcomed into our Kiwanis family.
- Ensuring that clubs are open and inviting to all individuals will increase the number
 of potential members. Clubs with diverse members develop deeper connections with
 each other and with those served, keeping members engaged and willing to continue
 membership.
- An inclusive environment where all members feel welcomed and respected encourages
 the use of each member's talents, ideas, perspectives and backgrounds. This will lead
 to more positive community interactions as clubs better reflect the communities they
 serve.
- These goals and outcomes align with Kiwanis International's strategic plan.

Board's position: The Kiwanis International Board supports this amendment for the following reasons:

- In the past, Kiwanis International has maintained that lack of any specific criteria or restrictions regarding membership (e.g., members may only be X persons or members may not be Y persons) means that Kiwanis is nondiscriminatory. The Board believes it is now time for Kiwanis to have a statement on nondiscrimination. Having a stated nondiscrimination provision can help raise consciousness among clubs of the importance of diversity and inclusion.
- Rotary and Lions both have nondiscrimination provisions, as do Key Club International and Circle K International, though each are approached in different ways.

Financial impact: None.

Amend Kiwanis International bylaw provisions as follows:

ARTICLE VIII. CLUB MEMBERS

Section 10. Kiwanis clubs shall not discriminate based upon race, color, creed, national origin, gender, age or sexual orientation when considering membership or during any of their activities or operations and shall conduct business in compliance with local nondiscrimination laws.

Proposed Amendment 2 Abstention on Trustee Votes

Submitted by: Michigan District Board

Purpose: To allow delegates to abstain from voting for the complete number of Trustee offices to be filled.

Effective date: October 1, 2019. (This would first apply to elections held at the 2020 Kiwanis International convention.)

Vote required to adopt: Majority

Proposer's position: The district board advocates this amendment for the following reasons:

- It allows the elector to vote for only those nominees that they have deemed qualified for their vote.
- There may be times where the elector believes that there are too many nominees that don't fulfill their expectations to fill all of the available vacancies.
- It doesn't force the elector to select a nominee that they may not think is appropriate for the office just to fulfill the mandatory number of votes required for the ballot to count.

Board's position: The Kiwanis International Board does not support this amendment for the following reasons:

- Multiple Trustee offices must be filled each year (usually three or four). It is the right
 and responsibility of delegates to elect persons to fill all open offices, not just one or
 two.
- This amendment would encourage bullet voting: that is, where a voter is entitled to vote for more than one candidate but instead votes for only one. This unintentionally encourages clubs and delegates not to evaluate all the candidates. It can also be used as a tactic to maximize the chance that the voter's favorite candidate will be elected while increasing the risk that other favored candidates will lose.
- The existing rule encourages clubs and delegates to consider which are the best
 candidates for all open Trustee positions rather than vote only for the candidate from
 their district or candidates they have been requested to vote for. This encourages both
 more informed delegates and more participation by delegates.

Financial impact: None.

Amend Kiwanis International bylaw provisions as follows:

ARTICLE XVIII. NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS Section 3.

d. No ballot shall be counted whereon it appears that the elector has voted for a greater or lesser number of nominees for an office than there are vacancies to be filled. (6/1997)

Proposed Amendment 3 New Requirement for Vice President

Submitted by: Kiwanis Club of Venice, Florida, USA

Purpose: To require that Kiwanis International Trustees must have at least a one year absence from the Board before subsequently serving in the offices of Vice President, President-elect, or President.

Effective date: October 1, 2019. (This would first apply to elections held at the 2020 Kiwanis International convention.)

Vote required to adopt: Two-thirds

Proposer's position: The club advocates this amendment for the following reasons:

- To remove the politics from the Kiwanis International Board so that decisions are not made on the basis of being a candidate for election the year leaving the Board.
- To give potential candidates the opportunity to run when they are ready, not at the end
 of their Board term.
- . To increase the candidate field.

Board's position: The Kiwanis International Board does not support this amendment for the following reasons:

- A Trustee can lose valuable momentum and connectivity by being off the Board a year, and it can then take more time to become reacquainted with the issues facing the organization.
- This adds an extra year to the cycle a person must complete in order to reach the office
 of Kiwanis International President. This is not in the best interests of Board members,
 potential candidates or the organization.
- Adding more criteria and restrictions to qualify for an office may lead to a reduction in the number of willing and qualified candidates, which is also not in Kiwanis' best interests
- The proposed language could be open to various interpretations and therefore confusion.
- This amendment would preclude a third-year Trustee from running for Vice President (or President-elect or President), which is currently permitted.
- When filling a vacancy in the office of Vice President (should the need ever arise), the Board may currently choose someone from on or off the Board. This amendment would preclude a current Board member from being chosen. That also may not be in Kiwanis' best interests, because someone from off the Board would then have to reorient themselves immediately in order to function in the office.

Financial impact: None.

Amend Kiwanis International bylaw provisions as follows:

ARTICLE XI. OFFICERS

Section 6. The President, President-Elect and Vice President shall be elected at the annual International convention for a period of one (1) administrative year. In order to occupy any such office, the member must have served two (2) years as trustee and must be off the Board of Trustees at least one (1) administrative year. (6/2015)

Proviso: This amendment would affect only the office of Vice President as of October 1, 2020. The Vice President, President-elect and President elected prior to the effective date of the amendment would continue the progression as set forth in the Bylaws. After the date of the amendment, each candidate for Vice President would have to be qualified as set forth above.

Section 11: In the event that a Trustee with a remaining term in office of one (1) year seeks to be elected to an office above the level of Trustee, the term of office of said Trustee shall end on September 30 following the annual International convention at which the Trustee seeks higher office. (7/1998)

Proposed Amendment 4 New Trustee Seat for a Member Under Age 50

Submitted by: Kiwanis Club of Springfield-Downtown, Illinois, USA **Purpose:** To establish a new seat on the Kiwanis International Board guaranteed to be held by a person who is age 50 or under at the time of election.

Effective date: October 1, 2019. (This would first apply to elections held at the 2020 Kiwanis International convention, with the first term beginning October 1, 2020.)

Vote required to adopt: Two-thirds

Proposer's position: The club advocates this amendment for the following reasons:

- This amendment would allow the opportunity for more youthful demographic leadership and representation on the Kiwanis International Board.
- Our organization must build its future by providing opportunities for young leaders to have a consistent voice and perspective at the international level.
- A consistent presence of a member under age 50 on the Kiwanis International Board sends an important message and example that young people can find time to be active at all levels of the organization.

Board's position: The Kiwanis International Board does not support this amendment for the following reasons:

- This proposal goes beyond the club's main stated purpose "to allow the opportunity for more youthful demographic leadership and representation on the Kiwanis International Board." It does more than just add a new seat for a younger member. It also allows a district holding that seat to have more than one member on the Board and to skip the "dark year" provision. These are not considered to be good changes for two reasons:
 - Because larger districts have a larger membership base from which to draw potential candidates, these changes may favor larger districts.
 - These changes would reduce the potential number of districts that would serve on the Board, thereby reducing diversity at the top leadership level of the organization.
- Members under age 50 may already serve on the Board. A special seat is not necessary to allow those persons to serve on the Board.
- This proposal attempts to address one demographic group within Kiwanis without regard for any others.
- There are other ways to accomplish the goal of including the voices of young members on the Board.
- The Board may be challenged to find willing and qualified candidates each time this term is available.

Financial impact: Approximately US\$7,000 annually if the Trustee is from North America or US\$12,000 if from outside North America, mainly for paid expenses to attend Board meetings.

Amend Kiwanis International bylaw provisions as follows:

ARTICLE XI. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of Kiwanis International shall be a President, President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Vice President, Executive Director, fifteen (15) sixteen (16) Trustees, and a District Governor for each district. The authority and duty of each officer shall be such as are defined in these Bylaws. (6/2010)

Section 3. Each elected officer shall be an active member in good standing of a club, and The members of the Board of Trustees shall have served as a district governor at least two (2) years prior to assuming a Kiwanis International office. Each officer also shall have and maintain a clear criminal history background check conducted and verified by Kiwanis International. The Under-50 seat shall be held by a qualified member who is under fifty (50) years of age at the time of election. No offices shall be held by the same member, nor shall any officer simultaneously hold more than one (1) International office. (6/2018)

Section 7. Trustees

- a. The term of office of Trustees shall be three (3) years, except for those elected to fill vacancies as provided in these Bylaws.
- b. No member shall serve for more than four (4) years in the office of Trustee. However, the time served by any member appointed by the International Board to fill an unexpired portion of a vacant term shall not count in determining the number of years served in the office of Trustee for the purpose of this provision. (6/2015)
- c. Five (5) Trustees shall be elected each administrative year: three (3) from the United States and Pacific Canada Region and two (2) from <u>all</u> other regions <u>and</u> <u>at-large</u> as provided in these Bylaws. (6/2010)
- d. One (1) Under-50 Trustee shall be elected every third year as provided elsewhere in these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XIII. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

- a. The Board of Trustees shall consist of the President, President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Vice President, and fifteen (15) sixteen (16) Trustees. (7/2006)
- b. For the purpose of providing Trustee representation on the Board of Trustees, Kiwanis International shall be divided into seven (7) electoral regions as follows, each to include areas as defined by the International Board: (6/2010)
 - Africa
 - Asia-Pacific
 - · Canada and Caribbean
 - Europe
 - Latin America

- Middle East
- United States and Pacific Canada (6/2010)
- The Trustees of the Board of Trustees shall be elected so as to provide that: (6/1997)
 - The Asia-Pacific Region is guaranteed two (2) Trustees, to be selected by that region by a procedure it recommends and which is approved by the Board of Trustees. (6/2010)
 - (2) The Canada and Caribbean Region is guaranteed one (1) Trustee, to be selected by that region by a procedure it recommends and which is approved by the Board of Trustees. (6/2010)
 - (3) The Europe Region is guaranteed two (2) Trustees, to be selected by that region by a procedure it recommends and which is approved by the Board of Trustees. (6/2010)
 - (4) The United States and Pacific Canada Region is guaranteed nine (9) Trustees to be elected at-large by delegates from that Region at the annual International convention until such time that an alternate plan is presented by the Region and approved by the Board of Trustees. (6/2010)
 - (5) Other Regions. When another region has a minimum of two districts, it will be considered by the Kiwanis International Board for a guaranteed seat, subject to the appropriate amendment of this Article. (6/2010)
 - (6) At-Large Seat. Until such time that all defined regions have at least one (1) guaranteed seat on the Kiwanis International Board, there shall be one atlarge seat, which shall be filled by a nominee from any region other than the United States and Pacific Canada Region and shall be elected at-large at an annual International convention by delegates and delegates-at-large from all regions. (6/2010)
 - (7) Under-50 Seat. There shall be one Under-50 seat on the Kiwanis International Board each year, which shall be filled by a nominee from any region and which shall be elected at an annual International convention by delegates and delegates-at-large from all regions.
- d. No district may have more than one (1) member on the Board of Trustees; however, this provision shall not apply to the Under-50 Trustee seat.
- e. A district shall not have a club member on the Board of Trustees for one (1) administrative year after another member from that district has completed service on the Board of Trustees, except where necessary to fill a guaranteed seat as provided in these Bylaws; however, this provision shall not apply to the Under-50 Trustee seat. (6/2015)

ARTICLE XVIII. NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 6. A majority of all valid votes cast shall be necessary for the election of the Under-50 Seat, and the entire house of delegates shall vote for one (1) nominee. If no candidate receives a majority of the valid votes cast on the first ballot, then the candidate receiving the least number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot and a new vote shall be taken among the remaining candidates. This process shall be followed until one candidate receives a majority of the valid votes cast. Such candidate shall be declared.

elected.

(Existing Sections 6-9 will be renumbered.)

ARTICLE XIX. DISCIPLINE OF OFFICERS AND VACANCIES IN OFFICE

Section 7. In the event the vacancy is for the Under-50 seat, the Board of Trustees shall elect a qualified member who shall serve only until the end of the administrative year. If the vacant term extends beyond the current administrative year, an election to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the term shall be conducted at the next annual International convention, and the member elected shall take office on October 1 after election.

(Existing Sections 7-17 will be renumbered.)

Proposed Amendment 5 Family Membership Status

Submitted by: Pacific Northwest District. Cosponsored by the New England and Bermuda District Board, Ohio District Board, Southwest District Board, and Texas-Oklahoma District Board, and the Kiwanis Club of North Brunswick, North Carolina, USA

Purpose: To permanently adopt a new family membership status that provides a 50 percent discount on Kiwanis International dues and fees for qualifying members. Clubs may utilize this new status, provided the club's district also first adopts a family membership status (50 percent discount) regarding district dues and fees.

Effective date: September 30, 2019. (This would then be effective for dues paid for the 2019-20 administrative year.)

Vote required to adopt: Two-thirds

Proposer's position: The district advocates this amendment for the following reasons:

- This change will provide one more tool for attracting new members.
- This change will provide financial incentive for family members to join Kiwanis clubs.
- Kiwanis clubs will benefit by strengthening membership and providing more service.
- It will also benefit Kiwanis by strengthening the promotion of the Kiwanis family.
- This change will also provide one more path to membership for graduating Key Club and Circle K members who live at home beyond the two years free that they already have.
- Kiwanis International already has done some of the work needed for family membership due to the earlier pilot program. Districts that want to adopt it will have to make some adjustments.

Board's position: The Kiwanis International Board does not support this amendment for the following reasons:

- From 2010-2015, Kiwanis International piloted family membership in three districts that requested to participate: New England and Bermuda, Ohio, and Pacific Northwest. The goal of these pilots was to determine whether family membership would increase membership enough to warrant the 50 percent discounts in dues and fees. In January 2016, the Kiwanis International Board analyzed the results based on figures submitted by the piloting districts. Two of the pilot districts lost more members annually during the pilot than they had lost before the pilot, while the third district lost slightly fewer than they had lost before. Based on these results, Kiwanis International determined not to continue family membership.
- The proposer asserts that the bulk of family members will be new members and former Key Club and Circle K members. However, the majority of new family members in all three pilot districts were simply existing club members who changed their designation

to receive the dues discount, while only a minority were unique new members. It is unknown how many were former Key Club or Circle K members. Former members of Key Club and Circle K may already join Kiwanis clubs, and they qualify immediately, without documentation, for a two-year waiver of Kiwanis International dues.

- Historically, discounted membership programs have not increased membership in clubs. Rather, a positive club membership experience is the key factor in adding and retaining club members. Discounted memberships do, however, provide a greater level of confusion for club secretaries entering new members.
- The pilot program defined family members as a spouse, partner, adult offspring or adoptee, sibling or equivalent of a regular member who paid full dues. This proposal does not require any actual familial relationship.
- Under this proposal, a club may not offer family membership status unless the district also provides a 50 percent reduction in the new member add fee and annual dues.
 This essentially places control of the status with the district, not the club, which is unprecedented in Kiwanis.
- As mentioned above, the pilot programs primarily shifted existing members paying full dues to family members paying reduced dues. The resulting revenue loss if this amendment is adopted may force Kiwanis International and/or participating districts to request a dues increase sooner than they would otherwise need to. That would affect all clubs, not just those utilizing family membership status. This proposal essentially asks members who pay full dues to subsidize family members. Individual clubs may already do this, if they wish.
- The amendment states: "Clubs shall pass all discounted fees and dues on to the family
 members." This is contrary to the intention of club autonomy. Club are responsible for
 paying dues to Kiwanis International and the district per each club member. However,
 clubs may charge members any amount they wish. Some clubs already charge lower
 dues for younger members or others.
- This proposal contradicts Kiwanis International's continual efforts to simplify dues and fees for clubs and members. In January 2019, the Kiwanis International Board adopted a proposal to simplify the complicated dues and fees structure for new members joining clubs. Today, membership software utilized by Kiwanis must accommodate more than 900 product codes for different membership and dues classifications, waivers, tiered dues, and more. The action by the Board in January is to reduce the cost and complexity of the billing infrastructure. This amendment is contrary to those efforts.

Financial impact: When average figures from the three pilot districts are applied to all districts worldwide, family membership would result in a revenue loss of up to US\$250,000 annually. It is impossible to know or measure how many family members would have otherwise left clubs without this option or how many persons who joined clubs would not have joined without it.

Amend Kiwanis International bylaw provisions as follows:

ARTICLE VIII. CLUB MEMBERS

Section 7. Family Membership Status

a. Family membership status may be granted by a club to members who have the same shared residence as an active member and who are members of the same

- club. Each shared residence must include at least one active member who pays full Kiwanis International and district dues (known as the primary member) and may include up to three members with family membership status. The club will be responsible for verifying the legitimacy of the residency requirement.
- b. Before clubs may grant family membership status, their district must first amend
 its bylaws to also provide a 50 percent discount of district dues and new member
 enrollment fees for family members.

 Proviso: During the 2019-20 administrative year, districts may give a 25 percent discount
 if the district board so chooses. Thereafter, districts shall give the full 50 percent discount.
- c. Family members shall pay 50 percent of the Kiwanis International and district new member enrollment fees at the time of joining an existing club and 50 percent of the annual Kiwanis International and district membership dues thereafter. All other applicable fees remain payable, including insurance, as well as the financial obligations to the member's club. Family membership status shall not apply to any members forming new clubs. After the club is formally organized, members may apply for family membership status.
- d. Clubs shall pass all discounted fees and dues on to the family members.
- e. Family members shall have all the rights and privileges of club membership.
- f. Family membership status is not transferable to other clubs.

(Existing Sections 7-9 will be renumbered.)

ARTICLE XXI. OFFICIAL PUBLICATIONS

Section 4. Each club in the United States and Canada, excluding the French-speaking clubs in Canada, shall make it a condition of membership that each member, except those with family membership status, shall be a subscriber to the official publications of Kiwanis International and shall continue as such while a member. However, if spouses are both members of a club, one spouse may choose not to subscribe. (6/2012)

Section 6. Each club in the United States and Canada, excluding the French-speaking clubs in Canada, shall collect from each of its members, except those with family membership status, the subscription price of the official publications together with the regular club membership dues. Such subscription shall be duly entered upon the books of the club in a special subscription account, and the subscriptions for official publications shall be forwarded to the Executive Director of Kiwanis International. However, clubs shall not collect the subscription price from both spouses who are members of a club if one spouse has chosen not to subscribe. (6/2012)

ARTICLE XXII. REVENUE

Section 1. Subject to Sections 2 and 3 of this Article, each club shall pay to Kiwanis International for each member, with the exception of those holding life member status, the sum of fifty-two dollars (US \$52) per annum. However, members holding family membership status shall pay dues as provided in Article VIII. Such sum shall be based on each club's annual membership report as of September 30 of each year and shall be due annually on October 1 and payable by November 30. (6/2015)

Hello, Shawn (and others):

First: Changes to amendments may only be proposed by a delegate present during the House of Delegates at the Kiwanis International convention. So hopefully your club is planning to have one or more delegates representing it.

Per Standing Rule 5: "Any main motion or amendment shall be written in English, signed by the maker and seconder, and presented to the Executive Director or designee before it is moved." It's best to do that at the beginning of the House or at least at the beginning of amendments consideration. In any case, it must be done before the delegate moves the proposed change from the floor; otherwise, your motion at the mic will be ruled out of order until/unless we have it in writing first. We have a special form to use, which will be available at the front of the House throughout the Business Session. (FYI: Any proposed change to an amendment is considered to be an amendment to the main motion, also called an amendment to the amendment.)

When Amendment 1 comes up for consideration, the delegate simply goes to any microphone and moves to amend the amendment by changing the wording in whatever way you indicate at the time. It's best to propose any changes early during discussion of that amendment. The speaker may then tell the House why they advocate this changes, with a 3-minute time limit. However, debate on the proposed change is limited to just 5 minutes overall, so the more succinct you can be, the better, in order to allow more discussion on the change.

Incidentally, I did a little brief research on H.R. 5. If I understand correctly, it appears that has not yet been adopted. Also, the wording used in H.R. 5 is "on the basis of <u>sexual orientation</u> and <u>gender identity</u>," whereas your suggestion is "...and gender preference." I'm not sure if that difference is purposeful or not.

You can consult the full standing rules for the House of Delegates in the amendments booklet.

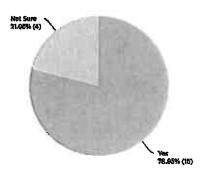




PA District International District Social Survey Results

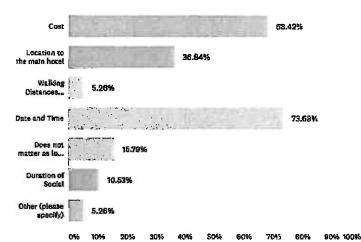
A PA District Survey was provided to attendees at Midwinter via paper and online to anyone who would be attending the 2019 International Convention in Orlando, FL to determine if the ICON committee would move forward with planning a District social of some sort.

Overall, all 19 surveyed were attending ICON and felt a District and 79% indicated that a District Social would be a great idea while 21% were not sure.



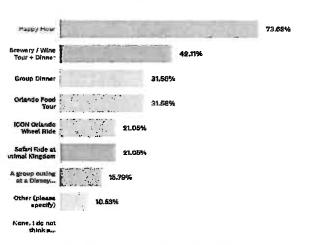
The considerations for people attending a social included the top 3 reason are:

- 1. Date and Time (73.68%)
- 2. Cost (68.42%)
- 3. Location to the Main Hotel (36.84%)



The top 3 and 4 (due to tie) group activities that attendees thought would be enjoyable are as follows:

- 1. Happy Hour (73.68%)
- 2. Brewery / Wine Tour + Dinner (42.11%)
- 3. Group Dinner (31.58%)
- 4. Orlando Food Tour (31.58%)



Conclusion:

Overall the committee concluded that many of the PA attendees would like to see an inexpensive low-key District social in Orlando that won't conflict too much with scheduled events and would be somewhat unique to Orlando. We also do not want to have to obtain venues that require minimums or deposits. We understand that not everyone will be able to attend due to other Kiwanis obligations, but it is the hope that a majority would like to come together to share a beverage, food and/or time with fellow PA Kiwanians for brief period of time during the busy convention.

Currently a **Friday June 28**th outing after convention forums have ended is being reviewed as a date/time as some may be leaving on Saturday after House of Delegates.

The most low-cost idea that is being investigated is:

- Happy Hour at local bar/restaurant at Disney Springs, same location where a KI's Friday Night Planet Hollywood event would be. Disney Springs is a 13-minute drive from the Coronado Springs Resort, where the convention will be held. Transportation is free utilizing the hotel shuttle from Coronado to Disney Springs. A Happy Hour location will be investigated to accommodate a group of 20. Afterwards group can wander around Disney Springs, a mecca of Disney shopping, dining and entertainment venues and take the shuttle back at their leisure or Uber.
- Happy Hour at hotel There are 3 different bar venues that can me used as a meetup spot for a
 happy hour at the hotel: Laguna Bar, Rock Sports Bar and Grill and Pool Bar. These are no
 reservation required and we can grab a series of tables together. Only down side is most people
 would have been in convention all day and may want a change of scenery outside of the
 Coronado as a social.

Other options explored but not as favored by committee due to cost, distance and possible walking for folks:

- Orlando Food Tours www.orlandofoodtours.com \$40 each; currently only shows to have DAYTIME tours available. Requires at least 1.5 miles of walking.
- Brewery Tours The idea is to look at 2 Breweries in close proximity to each other to visit. There are more breweries about 20 minutes from the hotel. Transportation will have to be reviewed adding additional cost. The thought is that this is not very "Disney".

Next steps:

The next step is to discuss with Board and determine what should be planned.

Keystone Scholars and Kiwanis International

Working Together for Pennsylvania's Children's Bright Future

Research shows children with savings accounts at birth are three times more likely to enroll, and four times more likely to graduate from postsecondary education. Since the Great Recession, 95% of jobs have gone to those with some type of postsecondary education—. This is why the Pennsylvania Treasury Department (Treasury) created Keystone Scholars, a program that provides every child born in Pennsylvania a \$100 scholarship grant to be used for qualified higher education costs. This \$100 seed is meant to encourage families to start saving early for their child's future higher education expenses.

Keystone Scholars is administered by Treasury, where the \$100 is invested and grows alongside the child. The money can be used for qualified higher education expenses at qualified institutions including vocational and technical schools, community colleges, and two- and four-year colleges. The scholarship grant must be used before the child's 29th birthday.

Keystone Scholars is available to every baby born to or adopted by a Pennsylvania family after December 31, 2018. The Keystone Scholars pilot program is also available to babies born to or adopted by a Pennsylvania family in 2018 residing in one of six pilot counties (Delaware, Elk, Indiana, Luzerne, Mifflin, and Westmoreland). Families with babies eligible for the pilot program have until the baby's first birthday to claim. For information about the claim process, please visit www.pa529.com/keystone.

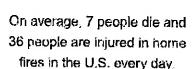
