DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING February 6, 2016

The second meeting of the 2015-16 District Board of Trustees was held on February 6, 2016 at the Kiwanis District Office, Harrisburg, PA. Governor Jennifer Vare presided. The meeting was called to order at 9:30AM. All board members were present with Trustee Kate Feryo calling in by phone.

The inspirational thought/invocation was provided by Trustee Keith Smith.

Guests included Circle K District Administrator Kelly Shaup, Laws and Regulations Chair Matt Wise, Past Lt. Governor Judy Raub, Past Lt. Governor Tracy Smith, Past Governor/Formula Chair Cathy Szymanski and Administration Chair Paul Kasoff.

Membership & New Club Building (Pages p1-p11B)

Formula Chair Cathy Szymanski led a discussion on new club building.

The Philadelphia new club building blitz on April 24-27, 2016 was discussed. Cathy appealed for support of this effort and explained the effort. As part of that effort, Governor Vare indicate that Kiwanis International asked that the District consider waving the interim dues collected from new clubs. After discussion, the board did not take any action on this request.

Governor Vare asked Formula Chair to add all board members as new club openers if she would like them to be working on new club opening.

Information was provided from Lt. Governor Evaluation Reports #1 about existing clubs. Information was specifically discussed on the East Shore Club and the Zelienople Harmony.

A membership incentive contest was discussed. See the page marked p11A. The board approved this proposed plan.

A corporate member database was discussed. See the page marked p11B. The basic idea is to gather information on who are our corporate members and why they belong to Kiwanis. This information will then be shared with all clubs to give them ideas for potential members.

The Kiwanis and JCI partnership was discussed. Executive Director Kevin Thomas was to write a letter to Kiwanis clubs and JCI Clubs. As he prepared to write the letters, he did research. After research and email exchanges, it his recommendation that before any letters are sent that a meeting be set up between the Kiwanis District Leadership and JCI State Leadership to establish some plans and joint efforts between the organizations.

Changes to the membership portion of the board meeting agenda were discussed. No changes were considered at this time

Consent Agenda (Pages p12-p54)

All items in the consent agenda were approved by proper motion, second and vote.

Discussion and Action items

Reports were reviewed on the 2014-15, 2015 District Convention and 2015-16 Budgets. Those reports can be seen as page p55-p57.

A final report was provided on the District holiday party. It is page p61.

A report was provided on the District shirts. See page p62-p63.

The travel program by the Kiwanis International travel partner AHI was discussed. Information was provided to the board. Executive Director Kevin Thomas recommended the District actively promote these programs to gain the financial benefit to the District offered by AHI travel. By consensus, the board agreed.

Vacancies were discussed in 2016-17 Trustees and Lt. Governor positions as were plans to fill vacancies. The resignation of 2015-16 Division 13N Lt. Governor Lisa Smith was discussed. A Division 13N Council meeting will be called to fill the vacancy as well as get a Lt. Governor in place for the 2016-17 year.

Potential redivisioning was discussed. By approved motion, Trustees were instructed to come to the April district board meeting with any recommendations they might have for redivisioning in their region.

2016-17 Club officer education was discussed. Governor —elect John Gräb will be following up with Education Chair Dennis Bouchard to begin finalizing plans and dates for the 2016-17 year. Lt. Governor training will be June 10-11, 2016 at Bucknell University. Training for 2016-17 Trustees will be scheduled by Governor-elect John Gräb.

A report from the committee looking at District awards was considered. The report is page p99-p100. Trustee Kate Feryo presented the report. After review and discussion, the committee was directed, if possible, to have details for its recommendations in place for the April district board meeting with idea of changes going into effect for the 2016-17 year.

The Midwinter conference program and forums were reviewed. See pages P70, P71, P71A and P71B. Midwinter Conference registration totals, sponsorships received and shout outs were reviewed.

Key Leader was discussed. Emphasis was placed on having Trustee support and promotion of Key Leader events since we are running two events.

Trustee Mike Coolbaugh provided an update on the 2016 District Convention.

The Kiwanis International convention in Toronto was discussed. See pages p79 - 80. By proper motion, second and vote, the board approved the governor having a hospitality room for the convention.

Clubs not paying dues for the 2015-16 year were discussed and reviewed.

A new contract for the District Executive Director was discussed. The committee has met but has not yet finalized a proposal. A proposal will be developed on or before the Midwinter conference with goal of having a new agreement by the Midwinter Conference.

A meeting of District Service Leadership Plan Administrators was discussed. This will be finalized after the new District I-Plan (Strategic) is further refined so that their input into the plan can be gathered; this will be sometime in the spring.

Circle K Administrator Kelly Shaup provided an update on the development of a Circle K Board background check policy. A policy has been developed that the Circle K District board will consider. If the Circle K board approves the policy, it will then be submitted to the Kiwanis District board for approval.

Trustee Mike Coolbaugh will be scheduling a meeting of the committee developing a crisis communication plan.

Dates for the 2016-17 Board meetings were reviewed. See page p87.

Discussion took place on the April 2016 Board meeting date and location. Governor Jen Vare will be doing a survey to determine if there is a need to change the time and location.

Information was provided on the Kiwanis Day at The Phillies. See page p88.

Criminal history and child abuse clearances of board members, Lt. Governors and District Chairs were reviewed. Follow up will be done as needed for those not yet submitted.

District Bylaws Amendments were considered in a discussion led by laws and regulations chair Matt Wise. The recommendations of the Laws and Regulations Committee can be seen as pages p91-p92. The District Board approved all the recommendations of the District Laws and Regulations committee. A discussion was then held on a provision of the bylaws that was inadvertently left out of the new District Bylaws that was in the old bylaws and should have been included in the new bylaws; see page p92A for the provision. After discussion, the board adopted a motion to offer an amendment at the District Convention that will put that provision into the new District Bylaws.

District strategic planning was discussed. This plan is called the I-Plan. On December 11-12, 2015, a committee of Kiwanians appointed by Governor Jen Vare met in Newark, NJ with six other North American Districts. This meeting was facilitated by Kiwanis International. The purpose of the meeting was to begin the development of a District I-Plan under the rubric of the Kiwanis International I-Plan. See pages p93-p98 for the initial work of the committee. This plan will be refined and developed further by the committee and then submitted to the District Board for approval. After District Board approval, the plan will be submitted to Kiwanis International.

The District Foundation Nominating Committee was discussed. Governor-elect John Gräb will chair this committee.

Governor Jen Vare talked about missing board meeting reports from board members and district chairs. She will be doing follow ups to try to get all who should be submitting reports to do so.

As part of the I-Plan development, a new position, District Public Relations coordinator, is being created. The District is presently looking for qualified candidates and board members were asked to share the names of anyone they think might be a good fit for the position.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Kiwanis International chose Pennsylvania for a Club opening Blitz April 24-27, in the Philadelphia area. We are excited that they chose Pennsylvania. Judy Raub, LTG Sarah and Matt have working on a plan for the event. This will be the third event of this kind that Kiwanis International has done. Sarah, Jen, David and I were fortunate to be part of the Seattle event and have ideas to make the Pennsylvania event even better. We hope you are all able to come to the blitz and go out and help invite new members to join one of the 10 new clubs that we will be opening during this event.

DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING October 3, 2015

The first meeting of the 2015-16 District Board of Trustees was held on October 3, 2015 at the Kiwanis District Office, Harrisburg, PA. Governor Jennifer Vare presided. The meeting was called to order at 9:30AM.

The inspirational thought/invocation was provided by Trustee Judy Janes.

All board members were present.

Guests included Circle K District Administrator Kelly Shaup, Lt. Governor Bill McCabe, Past Lt. Governor Tracy Smith and Administration Chair Paul Kasoff.

Membership & New Club Building (See the pages p2-p12)

Formula Chair Cathy Szymanski called into the meeting.

Clubs organized in the 2013-14 and 2014-15 year were verbally reviewed as no written reports were received.

Initial clubs to be organized in 2015-16 were discussed. Region 1 is looking Smethport and Cochranton. Region 2 has no specific targets but some focus may go to Connellsville and Fox Chapel. Region 5 has a plan in place for Columbia; the East Shore area and Hamburg were discussed. The Old Forge area was discussed in Region VI. Hughesville in Region IV was discussed as well as South Williamsport and Loyalsock. Region VII is Northwest Philadelphia and Central Bucks.

Clubs that were in need of special counselling include Greencastle, Lehigh Valley Industrial Park, West Shore, Hatboro-Horsham, Kennett Square, Nittany, Kittanning and King of Prussia.

The Kiwanis and JCI partnership was discussed. Executive Director Kevin Thomas will work on information to share with Kiwanis clubs and JCI clubs.

Consent Agenda (See the pages p13-p68)

All items in the consent agenda were approved by proper motion, second and vote. (Note: The Club Leadership Education agenda was removed from the consent agenda for discussion later.)

Discussion and Action items

Club Leadership Education was discussed after being removed from the consent agenda. Governor Jen Vare will follow up with Education Chair Dennis Bouchard about the numbers, attendance and possible follow up to get more officers to take the online training.

Vacancies in 2015-16 Lt. Governor positions were discussed; divisions 4 and 8 are vacant. At the present time, there are no candidates for those divisions. Discussions will be held about the Division 5 and 6 Lt. Governors doing some communication outreach to those divisions.

The vacancy in the Region III trustee was discussed. A motion was introduced, seconded and approved to appoint Ann Graves from the Kiwanis Club of State College as Region III Trustee subject to her agreeing in a conversation with Governor Jen Vare.

A review of the candidates for 2016-17 Trustee positions took place. See page 69. Rules and procedures on the Election of Trustees were discussed and will be updated for upcoming elections in accordance with district bylaws.

2016-17 Lt. Governors were reviewed. See page 72.

Discussion was held on potential redivisioning. Trustees are to talk to Lt. Governors and other past leaders in their regions about any potential need for redivisioning and this will be discussed at the next meeting.

Potential changes to Lt. Governor reports were reviewed based on a potential report form submitted by Lt. Governor Sarah Zulueta; input was offered by board members that will be relayed to Sarah by Jen Vare. A final version of the report will be considered on a conference call on November 10, 2015.

The 2015 District Convention was reviewed. See pages 77-78. There was a general consensus to not have formal entertainment on Saturday at the Governor's banquet.

November 10th was established as a date for a conference call to approve the Midwinter Budget and program.

The possibility of doing a shoe drive at Midwinter was discussed. See pages 79-80 for information. A motion was approved, with one abstention, to authorize further investigation of this project and report to board on the feasibility of doing this on a November 10th conference call.

Proposals for the 2017 and 2018 District Conventions were discussed. A motion was introduced, seconded and approved to have the 2017 District Convention at the Doubletree Lancaster and the 2018 District Convention at the Doubletree Pittsburgh Greentree.

The possibility of a joint convention with the New Jersey District was held. There have been informal discussions about this possibility. It was decided to do nothing with this until if or when a formal request is received from the New Jersey District Board of Trustees.

Board members completed and signed conflict of interest statements.

The District Investments and Account Balances reports were reviewed; see pages 95-100.

A proposed District budget was considered for the 2015-16 year; see page 101 for the proposed budget.

A motion was introduced, seconded and approved to adopt the proposed budget. Another motion was then introduced to allow the Trustees and the Immediate Past Governor to receive a stipend of up to \$100 per board meeting to defray the travel and attendance expense of board meetings. The motion was seconded and approved.

Based on the approval of the previous motion, another motion was introduced to amend the adopted 2015-16 District operating budget to move \$3,200 from the miscellaneous line item to a line earmarked for Trustee/Immediate Past Governor Board Meeting. The motion was seconded and approved. The amended budget is page 101A.

The District Holiday Party was approved for December 18, 2015.

The District Raffle was approved for the 2015-16 year with no changes to its operation.

A report was provided on District shirts. See page 105-106.

It was reported that the District Electric Choice program is in not taking traction and rates are increasing. Executive Director Kevin Thomas reported that because of the increases folks are not renewing. The Electric Choice program appears not to be a viable fundraiser for the District and active promotion will be discontinued.

With the pending retirement of Robin Cook, the board considered a proposal regarding the position of District administrative secretary. It is page 107. The proposal was approved by the District Board.

The contract for District Executive Director Kevin Thomas expires on September 30, 2016. A committee consisting of Governor Jen Vare, Governor-elect John Gräb, Immediate Past Governor Bob Raub and Trustee Keith Smith will enter into negotiations with Kevin Thomas regarding a new agreement to present to the board at the January board meeting.

The 2016 Key Club District Convention budget was brought up for approval. It is page 108. The budget was approved

An update was provided on strategic planning. Kiwanis International will be having a meeting on December 11-12 in Newark, New Jersey to help Districts develop their own plan based on the Kiwanis International strategic plan and Pennsylvania will be invited to that meeting.

An update was provided on our work with Early Childhood Development.

An effort is underway to establish a date for an SLP Administrators conference.

Board members were encouraged to provide support in getting clubs to submit their new form of standard club bylaws.

Background checks of District Board members, Lt. Governors and District Chairs were reviewed. Follow up will be conducted with those not having submitted their clearances. A motion was introduced, seconded and approved to amend the District policy on background checks to have them come to the District office for review by the District Executive Director. If a check is not clear, it will then be sent by Executive Director to the District Youth Protection chair for further review and possible action.

A discussion was held between the board and Circle K Administrator Kelly Shaup on a potential policy for the Circle K District board members as it relates to the need for volunteer background checks and Pennsylvania state law. After the discussion, Administrator Shaup felt he had enough direction to work with the Circle K board and Kiwanis committee to develop a policy for them to consider and adopt.

The Pennsylvania District 2015-16 Distinguished Club award was presented for approval. See page 124. The award was approved by the board.

Trustee Kate Feryo will provide a report on recommendations for District awards at our next meeting.

A discussion took place on an Emergency Communication policy. A committee will be appointed to develop a proposed plan. The committee will consist of Jen Vare, John Grab, Mike Coolbaugh, Kevin Thomas plus the Administrators/Chairs of the Circle K, Key Club, Aktion club and Key Leader administrators or someone from their committees as determined by the administrators of those committees.

A proposal was considered for partnering with EDC Educational Services; see pages 119-123. Governor Jen Vare and Kevin Thomas will schedule a meeting with Denita Richardson to explore the proposal further.

Partnering with Barnes and Noble on a District wide bookfair program was discussed. After discussion, approval for the program was given pending review of materials and program implementation requirements at the November 10, 2015 board conference call.

Board members were reminded of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Kiwanis license plate program.

A discussion was held on the format and nature of future board meeting agendas.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

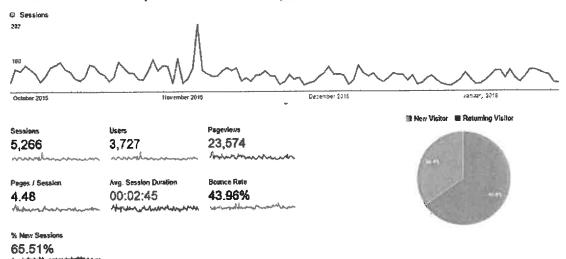

District Board,

At this point there is not a lot to report.

After I receive a final report from Kiwanis International I will compile our District statistics and send it to all of you. This will probably be sometime in March as they will need time to get all donations credited and also District rankings. I will also have limited access to computers from the latter part of January till March. In the meantime, if I get an interim giving report, I will forward it. If anyone or club would still like to donate our District will still get the credit. I have not seen a report, but I would say we are still about \$4 million short of the \$110 million goal.

We did have a good fall with 2 Bronze Clubs (\$350 pre member),1 Model Club (\$750 per member), and 1 Platinum Club (\$1,500) per member. We also got 10 club pledges ranging from \$250 to \$2,000. Some of these are on the December report. We also had a private donor pledging \$25,000 to become our 2nd private party major donor. This donor had already given part of this over the past 5 years.

Recognition during the fulfillment phase of The Eliminate Project

Thanks to the dedicated work of thousands of volunteers and the enthusiastic response of Kiwanians, the five-year active fundraising phase of The Eliminate Project brought us to within 95 percent of our goal amount. In human terms, that means we have helped protect more than 58 million mothers from the tragedy of maternal and neonatal tetanus. More amazingly, hundreds of millions of babies have been spared a painful death because of Kiwanians just like you.

During our active fundraising phase, we raised nearly half of our goal in paid gifts. The other half is represented by pledges from individuals, clubs and districts. Fulfilling those pledges will represent the greatest focus of the next phase of the campaign—the fulfillment phase. Ultimately, the project will be declared complete when the final vaccination has been dispensed that will eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus from the face of the earth.

The fulfillment phase of the Eliminate Project is every bit as critical to our success as the active fundraising phase. In fact, some would say more critical. This is when we finish what we, together, started five years ago. We have a promise to keep. Let's get it done!

Recognition policy changes

During the fulfillment phase which began on January 1, 2016, club and individual recognition changed somewhat. Those changes are summarized here.

Global Service Society recognition (Club recognition)

If a club makes a pledge after December 31, 2015, it will only receive Global Service Society recognition (Model Club, etc.) if it is in a district with an active pledge. Clubs in Canada may make club pledges during the period of the government match which ends on December 31, 2016.

Individual recognition

Centennial Award

The Centennial Award will not be available after December 31, 2015, except to donors who made a pledge for the award prior to December 31, 2015 or to any club or individual who makes a Centennial Award gift or pledge directly to the Kiwanis Foundation of Canada during the Canadian government matching period which ends on December 31, 2016.

George F. Hixson Fellowship

The Hixson Fellowship will be available only for donations to the Children's Fund of the Kiwanis International Foundation.

Impact donors

Impact 175 and 350 lapel pins will be available upon request while supplies last.

Lead and Major Gifts

Lead and Major Gift recognition will remain available to all individuals.



Walter Zeller Fellowship

- After December 31, 2015, donors may pledge for a Zeller only if they belong to a club with an
 active club pledge or a district with an active district pledge. Pledges must be completed within
 two years or by December 31, 2020, whichever comes first.
- Canadian donors may pledge for a Zeller Fellowship during the time of the Canadian government match, which ends on December 31, 2016.
- Any donor who contributes a single gift of US\$1,250 will qualify for a Zeller Fellowship regardless of their club or district affiliation.
- Diamond-level Zeller Fellowships will continue for those individuals who are Walter Zeller Fellows.
- Mother's Day Zellers are no longer available.

Donor Legacy Book

Clubs will be recognized in the Donor Legacy Book based on their pledges and giving as of December 31, 2015. Individuals will be recognized in the Donor Legacy Book based on their personal giving and any club gifts credited to them as of December 31, 2015. Gifts given in honor or memory of an individual will not count toward that individual's giving total. Lead and Major Gift donors will be recognized for the amount they have pledged as of December 31, 2015.

Report of the Youth Protection Committee

January 15th, 2016

To: District Governor Jen Vare, District Trustees and other District Officers and Chairs

- In November, 2015, Governor Jen issued a memo to all District officials who
 had not, as of the end of October, submitted their clearances as required by
 District policy. It was effective in obtaining nearly all of the outstanding
 clearances.
- As of the beginning of 2016, the status of compliance with District policy is as follows:
 - o Trustees:
 - All Trustees have their clearances on file at District offices except for one.
 - o Lieutenant Governors:
 - All Lieutenant Governors have their clearances on file, except for two that submitted them to me, but I cannot find them and have asked these Lt. Govs. to re-send copies to District.
 - o District Chairs:
 - All those holding committee chairs in the District have their clearances on file, except one.
 - o Foundation Trustees: all PAKF officers and trustees are in compliance with the PAKF policy, which is identical to District policy.

I have passed the names of the few individuals indicated above to Governor Jen and District Executive Kevin Thomas for further action.

• Training. I will be presenting a session at the Mid-Winter conference on Youth Protection training at the club level. With the help of fellow committee members Mike Coolbaugh and Matt Wise, I have developed a 20 – 25 minute 'essentials' presentation. The length was designed to fit the time typically allotted for a speaker at most Kiwanis Club meetings. The presentation has about 12 PowerPoint slides that could either be projected or passed out to attendees, and has a script for the presenter. This presentation was developed in response to requests from clubs for a Youth Protection training package.

The target audience at the Mid-Winter conference are Lt. Governors and others willing to do a bit of travel within their Divisions or Regions, as well as for their own clubs.

- Kiwanis International Policy Revisions. On October 1, 2015 KI adopted the following revisions to the Youth Protection Policy:
 - o District SLP Chairs and their assistants must have clear criminal background checks conducted and verified by Kiwanis International.
 - o SLP Advisors at the club level must obtain new background checks upon their appointment to that position.
 - It is my interpretation that, for example, if Jane Doe was a club member without any prior SLP responsibilities, but had both PA State Police and Child Abuse clearances, were she to be named the Advisor for a new or existing SLP sponsored by her club, she would have to obtain a new set (i.e., reset the 5-year clock). In an e-mail exchange with KI, I learned there is allowance for how 'current' the existing clearances are. In the above example, if Jane were to have clearances that were obtained within the past year or less, she would most likely not have to re-certify.
 - o A SLP Charter will not be granted unless the petition indicates that the Kiwanis Advisor(s) has clear background clearances in accordance with the above.

Since my report issued for the February 6th District Board meeting, I received new information from Kiwanis International regarding a change to the implantation of KI Youth Protection policy. The following was adopted at the most recent International Board meeting:

Effective October 2016, all Kiwanis Club Service Leadership Program Advisors must obtain clearances from Safe Hiring Solutions through Kiwanis International. These clearances will be valid for no more than two years. KI will not recognize background checks for SLP Advisors obtained through other agencies.

For our District, the implication is that a Club SLP Advisor must obtain state (and if applicable FBI) clearances per Pennsylvania Law *and* clearance from KI.

I exchanged e-mails with Suzanne Lentz of KI to obtain a better understanding of the revised policy. In short, it is unrealistic for KI to adopt and maintain different clearance policies based on state and/or District.

This requirement affects <u>only</u> Kiwanians who are their Club's SLP Advisors. *It does not affect any other club position.* Nor does this affect SLP Faculty Advisors, whether or not they are members of Kiwanis. Nor does this affect the District's Youth Protection Policy. Note that KI Youth Protection Policy has always required SLP Club Advisors to have clear background checks.

I have reviewed this policy change with Bob Orlando, and we have come up with a potential solution for District Kiwanis clubs to mitigate the effect of this KI policy change upon those who have volunteered to be SLP Advisors. We believe that Kiwanis support of any SLP club represents a valid expenditure from the Club's "External" or "Project" (or its Foundation) account, rather than its "Internal" or "Administrative" account. We believe that the cost of SLP Advisors' background checks through KI represents a legitimate expense in support of the SLPs. Therefore, these costs could be paid from the "Project" account from the club's fundraising activities (rather than internally generated), and it would be appropriate for the Club to pay for its SLP advisors' KI background checks. A similar situation is where a Club pays for the surety bond for its Treasurer, rather than having the Treasurer pay for it himself or herself.

I will be reviewing this change during my session at Mid-Winter. However because of the nature of this change, I ask that I (or another District official) review this at the Friday night session with District leaders. I will also prepare a detailed article for the Keystone Kiwanian.

On behalf of the Kiwanis International Foundation board, I am pleased to share with you this update on the Kiwanis International Foundation.

I am pleased to report that the Pennsylvania District was honored in 2014-15 for achieving the President's Challenge of a 10% increase in unrestricted giving over our 3-year average. Honored are Governor Robert Raub, Secretary Kevin E. Thomas, and District Chair Benjamin Osterhout. Divisions that also achieved the President's Challenge were Division 2, Division 12S, Division 16, and Division 17.

The Foundation needs the support of all Pennsylvania Kiwanis members. The Foundation cannot continue to provide program support without financial resources. Please encourage clubs and members to make the Kiwanis International Foundation a philanthropic priority. I hope to be able to report 100% of our leadership supports the Kiwanis International Foundation.

There is not a "per member" giving requirement, but we encourage clubs to be "Today Clubs", which means that their combined club and individual giving to the Kiwanis International Foundation Children's Fund is at least \$10 per member.

Clubs can hit one of these per-member giving levels by giving to any area of our foundation. Whether it's club gifts or individual gifts, any Gift of Today will be counted toward your club's per-member giving average.

These club recognitions are awarded annually at the end of the Kiwanis year. Eligible clubs will be determined by the Kiwanis International Foundation. Recognition will be sent to district leadership for presentation. There are four recognition levels: Blue, Silver, Gold and Diamond. To achieve one of these four levels, clubs must reach the following per-member giving average:

- Blue, US\$10
- Silver, US\$25
- Gold US\$50
- Diamond, US\$100

Silver clubs for 2014-15 included: Lancaster, Lewisburg, Pottstown, and West End-Monroe County. Gold clubs for 2014-15 included: Dalmatia, Mansfield, and Norlanco-Rheems.

Diamond club for 2014-15 was: Nazareth Area (only 1 of 7 in Kiwanis International)

Comments regarding committee:

We recently welcomed John Mazurowski to the committee after committing to server in the role as Zone 2 Administrator.

Concerns/issues:

The only current concern that we have is the number of dues paid members. We are much behind in our dues paid membership number at this point in the year when compared to past years. There are a number of clubs we are currently working with where we know that dues payments have already been sent or are in the process of being paid. There are a few other clubs where committee members and / or Kiwanis sponsors have notified the school faculty advisor that dues need to be paid and information as to why dues are necessary is being shared. There are also two large clubs from Zone 6 that do not have their dues payment reflected in K.I.'s numbers. We are awaiting the last dues payment report at the end of January to see improvement in these dues payments. On February 1st we will have a letter being sent to all non-dues paying clubs as well as their sponsoring Kiwanis club. This letter will inform them of the current nonpayment status and will also include a review of why dues are important. Copies of these letters are attached to this report.

Assessment of District Officers:

I can honestly say that this years' district officers have been exceptional. The executive officers have shouldered a vast amount of responsibility and work and have led the entire board in changes and improvements to the Key Club program. I cannot say enough good things about this group of officers.

Additional information/comments:

- Officer Training: Dare I say this?? Ugh!!! Officer training HAS been taking place throughout the district. Our attempts at having a video version of the training that took place at DCON 2015 went up in flames after the production company ran into technical Issues with the sound of the recordings they took. After realizing that our video was not going to be ready for the District, Zone Administrators and LTG's put together training as soon as the school year started. Our current executive officers are meeting at the District Office on February 5 to record a training video which will be put up on our You Tube channel. The training will be available to all clubs starting in March of 2016 and officers can take the training at a time and place that works best with their schedule. Kiwanis International has shown great interest in our efforts to put this training together and will be watching closely for what we put out to our members.
- Orphaned Key Clubs: This administrative year our district board worked very hard to identify all Key Clubs that lost their sponsoring Kiwanis club and thus had become "orphaned." The district board identified Kiwanis clubs in close proximity to these Key Clubs and made contacts with them and asked that they take over sponsorship. I am very happy to report that ALL Key Clubs that have become "orphaned" over the last few years now have Kiwanis sponsors.
- The move to convert standard forms and documents over to on line submission forms continues. Clubs can now file their monthly reports on line and submit this report though our website. New club officer reports have also been converted to an on line submission. The hope is that more clubs will now report their new officer information and make communications between them and their LTG much smoother than past years.
- There is an effort underway to address communication problems that exist between certain clubs and the district board. A directory of faculty and Kiwanis advisors has recently been updated after several months of research by board members and myself. We have taken K.I. MUC contact information, corrected invalid names and addresses. This updated

- directory has been shared with the board and will be presented to K.I. We are not compiling a list of "non-communicating" Key Clubs and efforts will be made by the Kiwanis Committee to revive ties through contact with the faculty advisors and sponsoring Kiwanis clubs.
- Early Childhood Learning has been accepted as our 2016-2017 Youth Servers Youth (YSY) project. This has been in place as our 2015-2016 YSY project and great strides are being made by clubs throughout the district to participate with Kiwanis to address this fundamental educational concern here in Pennsylvania.
- Kiwanis Growth has been one of the focuses of out K-Family committee. There are three clubs in Zone 6 that have recently lost their Kiwanis sponsor and there has been talk of interest in working with parents of these clubs to form a new Kiwanis club. The committee will be making a report and submitting it to Cathy Szymanski in order to share with the Formula Team.

Strengths of Regional Meeting: It was a good well attended meeting.

Executive Director's Report - January 23, 2016

- 1. Attached is my schedule for the period October 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015. I will be pleased to answer questions about any activity.
- 2. I want to remind everyone that even though we have "The Formula Team", growth, particularly new club building, is the responsibility of all board members. The years where we have had the greatest success with new club building were the years where we had a lot of involvement by the Trustees, Governor, Governor-elect and Executive Director.
- 3. At the recent meeting I attended in Toronto, a discussion occurred about the new monthly report form; the changes have generally not been well received. The form was redesigned to gather information on the I-Plan and to attract more corporate partners. However, no input was sought beyond the International office and board. In my opinion, there are several reasons for this. I will not go into all of them here. However, one of them is that there isn't presently any group in the organization to represent concerns and offer input on this type of change that can be quickly addressed and from whom input can be sought. I intend to offer a fix for that by, again, establishing a District Secretaries committee.
- 4. Since some of you have dealt with him in past, you should know Scott Smith has left Kiwanis International employment. He will continue to be associated with Kiwanis International through his private company, Club Resources, LLC.
- 5. The AHI Travel programs offer a nice opportunity for some fundraising for the District. I think we should embrace that opportunity by promoting their travel programs.
- 6. Kiwanis International will be bringing up the COLA dues increase proposal again in a modified format. Last year, the Kiwanis International Board brought forth an amendment that would have allowed the Kiwanis International Board to increase dues, if deemed necessary, by an amount tied to an index but not more than 5% at any one time. This proposal was not approved by the delegates at the Indianapolis convention. The Kiwanis International Board is bringing this type of amendment up again in a modified format with the hope that the modifications will gain delegate approval in Toronto.
- 7. Even with the \$10.00 per member dues increase approved last year, Kiwanis International will still have an operational deficit. Prior to the deficit, the operational deficit stood at \$4.4 million. Now it likely will be \$1.1 million. Of course, much of this deficit, if not all, is the result of investments being made through The Formula.
- 8. Thank you for what each of you do for Kiwanis and for all your work.

Immediate Past Governor's Report to the District Board

During the past quarter, my activities on behalf of the Pennsylvania District of Kiwanis have reduced greatly. I wasn't quite expecting such a dramatic decrease in events and obligations that I had grown to anticipate as your District Governor.

As Immediate Past District Governor, I had more time to invest working with the Formula Team. I spent several days canvasing the Borough of Columbia with Club Opener Judy and Lieutenant Governor Stef inviting business owners and others to information meetings that have been scheduled in October through December. I attended several information meetings in Columbia. As a new club counselor for Division 13S, I met with 13S Lieutenant Governor George as well as President Brian Bailie of the Greencastle and President Bob Kranc of the Big Spring Kiwanis Clubs. Continued involvement with the Greencastle club is needed to evaluate the next steps to support strengthening that club. Big Spring added 6 members to their roster correcting a long standing error in their membership numbers. I was honored to attend the Club Counselor Summit meeting in Atlanta, GA recently. There, I joined with about 40 other Club Counselors and we learned techniques and processes for counselling clubs. On the second day, Kiwanis members representing clubs from the Georgia District joined us and became our practice subjects where we employed the techniques we learned. It was truly education and inspirational.

I have served on the committee to review and propose a new employment contract for our District Executive and have met with committee members to discuss the work that needs to be done before the committee and recommend to the board, a replacement contract for Kevin.

I accomplished some last minute business of the District Governor for the 2014 – 2015 Kiwanis year. 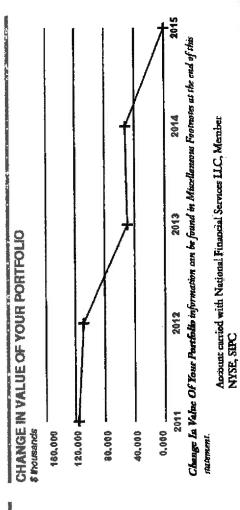

TORONTO OBSERVATIONS

(Unless otherwise specified, all prices are in Canadian dollars or the Loonie)

- If you fly to Toronto, you have three choices to get from the airport: Limo, Taxi and the UP Train. The limo and taxi will cost you around \$58.00 one way. They are the easiest to access after you clear customs and baggage claim. The train involves 10 minutes more of walking to get to it (after a relatively long walk from the plane through customs and baggage claim.) It costs \$27.00 one way and \$44.00 if you buy a round trip ticket. The train makes 2 quick stops before it ends at Union Station in downtown Toronto which is very near the convention center. From there you will have to walk to your hotel or take a cab. After doing both, I would recommend a taxi or limo if you have someone to share the ride.
- If you drive to Toronto remember that is the 3rd largest city in North America so traffic congestion will be a reality. As well, parking is expensive. There is an open air municipal lot just a couple of blocks from the Hilton which will cost \$28.00 per day with no in and out privileges. Valet Parking at the Hilton is \$40.00 per day with unlimited in and out privileges. Self-parking In the private garage associated with the Hilton is about \$60.00 per day with no in and out privileges.
- Convert some (a small amount since you can use a credit card almost anywhere) U.S. currency to Canadian and use a credit card whenever possible. Most of the Canadian businesses will take US currency at par value. With the Canadian dollar only with about .68 to the U.S. dollar, that means you overpay tremendously if paying U.S. currency for any purchase.
- If you are a Verizon customer, for \$2.00 per day you can get unlimited talk, data and text. Do it. Otherwise you'll pay a bloody fortune to use your smart phone. My understanding is ATT has a similar program but it may be more expensive.
- We are at the Hilton Hotel with Montana, New Jersey and Missouri-Arkansas. It is a very good situation for us. It is twelve minute walk from the convention center and there is a covered walk, called The Path, to use in the event of bad weather, although because of twists and turns it will take 15 to 20 minutes. The subway has an entrance and stop just outside the Hilton that takes you quickly and efficiently to Union Station which is at the convention center; you can buy a weekly pass for the subway which is an excellent system and a great way to get around Toronto. There will, also, be a shuttle bus service to the convention center; the pick-up point for the shuttle will be at the Sheraton, which is across the street from the Hilton. There are many restaurants nearby from fast food to high end; Toronto has over 9,000 restaurants. There are two restaurants in the hotel including a Ruth's Chris Steakhouse and there is full service Starbucks in the hotel. Room rate is \$201Canadian plus tax but at the current exchange rate it is about \$139.00US plus tax.

- I am recommending we not have a District dinner or organized meal. To do so at the hotel would be expensive even factoring in the exchange rate. The restaurants/venues outside the hotel capable of doing it do not offer much of a cost savings alternative and might represent a logistics challenge in getting folks there. With all the choices available in downtown Toronto, folks should be free to spend what they want, where they want.
- Here's an idea to consider if Governor Jen and others want to consider it. For the last several years, we have not had a hospitality room. I think the Hilton offers an opportunity to do so. They have junior suites on each floor; they are king bedded rooms with a fair amount of open space. By themselves, they might be a little small to do hospitality. But each suite is attached to an adjoining separate sleeping room which if used would allow some extra space. The junior suite costs \$251.00 per night. The Governor's costs are covered for 4 nights at the regular room rate by Kiwanis International so only \$51.00 of the junior suite's cost per night would not be covered by Kiwanis International. If a junior suite was reserved in the Governor's name and someone else that was going was willing to take the adjoining room, a hospitality suite might work. There are grocery and liquor stores nearby. Perhaps a "donation" bowl could be set up to help defray costs.
- The District Caucus time will need to be determined but probably Thursday late afternoon offers the least conflict so my recommendation is that we have it from 4:00pm to 5:30pm on Thursday, June 23rd.
- The Convention Center is, well, a convention center. Nothing exciting or remarkable.

 Registration, exhibits and forums will be in the south hall and the general/business sessions will be in the north hall. The South Hall is a little unique in that it was built down so you enter at the highest level (500) and descend into the ground; registration will be in the lowest level (800). As with all halls of this type, there is walking involved. But if necessary, mobility scooters can be reserved. Hopefully the buses will be able to unload outside the North Hall for the general sessions; if they can't, they'll be extra walking involved.
- While we are there, an International Jazz Festival will be in town at the same time.
- Some information shared by the International staff follows.

Toronto is a good convention destination. You will like it. This was my third visit and the first in many years. I was favorably impressed. I hope you will join me there this summer.

Laws and Regulations Committee Matthew J. Wise, chair

Report to District Board of Trustees January 23, 2016

- The District received communication from Kiwanis International Indicating that there were minor changes made to the Standard Form for District Bylaws, of which we just amended and accepted during the House of Delegates at the 2015 District Convention in Erie. Upon further review of the list, the committee has determined the following to be true and make subsequent recommendations.
 - a. Article IV. District Board, Section 3
 - Current: If the first meeting is held prior to October 1, any action taken shall become effective on October 1, unless otherwise specified.
 - ii. Proposed: If the first meeting is held prior to October 1, any action taken shall become effective on October 1, unless a later date is specified.
 - b. Article IV. Conventions, Section 1
 - i. Current: The annual convention of the district shall be held at such place and date, between March 15 and September 15...
 - ii. Proposed: The annual convention of the district shall be held at such place and date, between March 15 and September 25...
 - c. The remainder of adjustments have either been already adopted or alternatives were approved by Kiwanis International prior to the board approval of the District Bylaws, which were subsequently adopted during the House of Delegates.
 - d. Recommendation: It is the recommendation of this committee that the Board approve the above amendments and present them as a one-sheet summary to the House of Delegates during the 2016 Annual Convention to be held in Scranton.
- 2. Kiwanis International recommended to use that we made an amendment to Article V Committees.
 - a. The KI recommendation is to remove the listing of committees as well as the listing of additional standing committees required by the District.
 - b. During the initial review in March and April 2015, the Committee worked with KI and received approval to include the items in our bylaws, as is.
 - c. Recommendation: It is the recommendation of this committee that the Board approve leaving the committees listed in the bylaws, as removal of committees from the Bylaws may be a contentious issue at the House of Delegates and therefore could jeopardize the integrity of the bylaws document. The committee will follow up with Kiwanis International at the direction of the Board.

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- 3. In a review by Kiwanis International, it has been discovered that Article X references "See Section 4 for the schedule of prorated dues..."
 - a. In reality, this should say "See Section 6 for the schedule of prorated dues..."
 - b. Recommendation: It is the recommendation of this committee that the board approve the new wording of Article X, Section 5 to read: "See section 6 for the schedule of prorated dues..."
- 4. The committee was made aware of several grammatical and formatting issues.
 - a. Page 2 Section 2.B.: remove line between "elected" and semi-colon.
 - b. Page 3 Section 8.A.: add period to the end of the sentence.
 - c. Page 6 Section 6: replace colon with period after the number.
 - d. Page 9 Section 9: replace colon with period after the number.
 - e. Page 10 Section H: remove draft word.
 - f. Page 13 Section 3: replace colon with period after the number.
 - g. Recommendation: Since the board is reviewing several other amendments at this meeting, the committee recommends that these items be approved of at this time. A complete list can/will be provided to the House of Delegates during the 2016 Annual Convention to be held in Scranton, per the direction of the District Board.
- 5. The PA District Policy Code was adopted in April 2015. Since then, several amendments to the Youth Protection policy have been made as well as a few new policies adopted.
 - a. The committee is currently working on adding these new policies and amended policies in to the Official Policy Code Document.
 - b. Work on this will be completed by the April meeting of the Board of Trustees.

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assume office on the first day of October following their election; no trustee may be elected to serve more than one three year term except for implementation purposes or if serving as a replacement for an unexpired trustee term. The term of the Executive Director shall be determined by the Board of Trustees and shall be set forth in a contract. For implementation purposes and with the first election only, trustees may be elected for terms of less than three years. Trustees serving only one or two years on the Board of Trustees shall be eligible to stand for election for a full three year term.

SECTION 4. The duties of the officers shall be as follows:

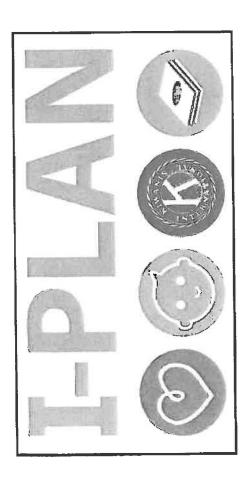
- (a) The Governor shall be the executive officer of the district and shall preside at all conventions and at all meetings of the Board of Trustees. He or she shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special committees. Under the direction and supervision of the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International, the Governor shall have the duty of furthering the objects of Kiwanis International and of promoting the interests of the clubs within the district. It shall be the Governor's duty to attend any convention of Kiwanis International.
- (b) The duties of the Governor-elect shall be such as are from time to time assigned by the Board of Trustees and/or Governor. He or she shall be assigned as a back up signature in case of the incapacity of the Secretary/Treasurer.
- (c) The Trustee shall assist the Governor in the work of the district. They shall represent the Governor and shall have full responsibility under the direction of the Governor in supervising the district executive work in their respective regions. The Trustee shall also perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Governor or the Board of Trustees.
- (d) The Secretary/Treasurer shall perform the following duties: (1) Keep a record all receipts and disbursements made in the manner authorized by the Board of Trustees. (2) Sign all checks for approved expenditures. (3) Maintain the books of the District which at all times shall be open to the inspection of the Governor, Board of Trustees and any authorized auditor. (4) Keep all records of the district, the minutes of the convention and the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Trustees. (5) Collect all funds due the district and deposit the same in the district depository and furnish a monthly statement of all receipts and expenditures to the Governor and Governor-elect. (6) Be bonded in such amount as shall be fixed by the Board of Trustees, the premium of which shall be paid by the district. (7) Submit to the proper officials and committees all communications received from Kiwanis International. (8) Cooperate with the Governor in forwarding all official reports required by Kiwanis International. (9) Report to the annual convention and at such other times as the Governor and Board of Trustees shall require. (10) Perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Governor and the Board of Trustees.

SECTION 5. Lieutenant Governor and Lieutenant Governor-elect:

- (a) Each division in the district shall have a Lt. Governor and Lieutenant Governor-elect, who shall not be considered a District Officer.
- (b) Each Lt. Governor and Lieutenant Governor-elect shall be an active, privileged or senior member in good standing in the division from which he or she is elected; shall have been a member of one or more Kiwanis clubs for at least four years; shall be, or have been a club president; or shall have served as a club secretary for at least two (2) years; and shall be active in the affairs of his or her club and his or her division.
- (c) Lt. Governors and Lieutenant Governors-elect shall not be members of the District Board of Trustees, but they shall be entitled to attend all meetings of the district, of the District Board of Trustees, and of the division from which they are elected. Lt. Governor-elects shall be furnished all information from the district office as is furnished to the Lieutenant Governors. Lieutenant Governors-elect shall devote their time to familiarizing themselves with the duties and responsibilities of the office of Lieutenant Governor and the operation of their division and the district.
- (d) The Lieutenant Governors shall assist the Governor and the Board of Trustees in the work of the district. They shall represent the Governor and shall have full responsibility under the direction of the Governor and Board of Trustees in supervising the district executive work in their respective divisions. The Lieutenant Governors shall also perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Governor or the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE VI Board of Trustees

- SECTION 1. The Board of Trustees shall consist of the Governor, the Governor-elect, the Immediate Past Governor, Trustees and the Secretary/Treasurer Executive Director. Additionally, the Circle-K District Governor and the Key Club District Governor and a representative of the Pennsylvania Kiwanis Foundation Board shall be non-voting, exofficio members of the Board of Trustees.
- SECTION 2. The management and control of the affairs of the district not otherwise provided for in these bylaws shall be vested in the Board of Trustees, subject to the direction of the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International.
- SECTION 3. The Board of Trustees shall hold at least four (4) meetings during each fiscal year, one not later than October 31, at such time and place as designated by the Governor, and another in connection with the district convention at such time and place as shall be determined by the Board of Trustees. If the first meeting shall be held prior to October 1, any action taken shall become effective on October 1. All meetings shall be held within the district except that the Board of Trustees may meet at the International Convention. Any meeting of the Board of Trustees may be held by teleconference and/or video conference provided that all board members and other persons are able to fully participate in the teleconference and/or video conference.

January 2016 Board Meeting Summary – PA Kiwanis Awards

At a board meeting last year, I was charged with gathering a small group together to review the current award to determine if any adjustments should be made. This data was gathered in March 2015, however due to personal circumstances was never compiled and reported to the board until this point. Please accept the following for consideration as a summary of each item.

Review of Current District Awards

- 1) PA District Club Newsletter Contest It is proposed to alter this award to include social media and online resources. Consider the name "Club Communications Contest" with a traditional newsletter category and a digital communications category (including website & social media). The focus of the award is recognizing clubs who keep members up to date with events, projects, and news.
- 2) PA District Club Brochure Contest It is proposed that the focus of this contest be adjusted to include submission of a business card format. The card and/or the brochure should highlight important information such as how to contact the club, website info, and connection to social media. The current categories/ colored divisions remain an appropriate system.
- 3) <u>Distinguished Kiwanian Award</u> this award continues to be appropriate and is a nice mix of achievable criteria with a bit of a higher standard. The only suggestion to consider is adjusting the perfect attendance from 9 consecutive months to 9 out of 12 months.
- 4) George F. Laning Interclub Award This award continues to be appropriate, however clubs seem to have gotten away from it. Perhaps rather than a set number of interclub events, the achievement can be related to a percentage & remove the ability for the LTG to serve as an extra person to count for a club. It is a good idea to remind clubs of the criteria and purpose. Consider a type of "trophy" or item (rather than a banner patch) that can be passed around year to year to the club in the division with the most interclubs as a fun incentive sort of similar to a club hosting the LTG banner.
- 5) <u>District Multiple Service Award</u> no information available. This appears to be based upon monthly reports submitted by club secretaries. Not much input on this award. Perhaps re-visit a single-service award similar to Circle K. We would need to develop criteria.
- 6) <u>Prayer Breakfast Award</u> This award seems to be "outdated". The number of clubs participating decrease each year. Not many clubs continue this practice, and clubs are now a bit more inclusive in their religious affiliations. Although this ties into the human & spiritual values object of Kiwanis, it doesn't seem necessary to have a specific award for it.
- 7) <u>Distinguished Club</u> This award is determined by Kiwanis International & the criteria changes each year.

- 8) <u>Kiwanis Hero in Service Award</u> appropriate to maintain the current standards and procedures.
- 9) Membership Growth Awards no information available. It's now based upon the Formula materials. We need to work with the Formula team and LTG's to review this award and see how criteria will be distributed to club leaders.

In general, the group seemed to be in support of keeping the banner patches as recognition. Many clubs like them and display with pride. Something like a certificate is rarely able to be displayed as meeting places are varied and don't typically support the ability to hang things in a permanent manner.
