The answers will propel us to do more for our communities and our clubs. 2021-2022 Governor Goals*

Membership:

- Open four (4) new Kiwanis clubs.
- Reduce the existing number of clubs under charter strength by 25%
- Increase club membership by a net +2 in 25% of clubs

Service Leadership Programs

- 80% of the service leadership programs be active and out of A-covid status.
- 100% of the service leadership programs be sponsored and have an engaged and active Kiwanis advisor.
- Develop Fall and Spring joint events for Kiwanis, Key Club and Circle K District leadership for membership development.

Justice, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (J.E.D.I) Initiative

- Develop a committee of 5 and create a committee charter by Oct 30, 2021.
- Create DCON, Midyear and quarterly J.E.D.I awareness opportunities.

Leadership Education

- Have 20 members of Pennsylvania clubs participate in Kiwanis Amplify leadership program and provide 50% funding for attendees.
- Have monthly virtual educational opportunities for members.
- 60% of club officers attend Club Leadership education.

District Leadership and Operations

- Obtain new Lt. Governor leaders in 50% of the vacant Divisions by January 1, 2022.
- Develop and approve a District Strategic Plan by Oct 9, 2021.
- Develop an initial District redivisioning plan by Jan 15, 2022.
- Move to a better technology platform to allow for improved member communication electronically that is timely by January 15, 2022. *Subject to change as goals are met or adjusted.

District Convention 2021 HARRISBURG WELCOMES KIWANIS

Following some hiccups along the way, we were able to book the beautiful Harrisburg Hilton for our annual district convention. More than 150 people from across the state—and several from out of state as well–thanks to our Centennial Club—joined fellow Kiwanians for the weekend. The convention focus was Literacy, Diversity, and Inclusiveness. That theme was encountered through informative panel discussions, forums and breakout sessions. Always present at any district convention are the fellowship time, awards and entertainment; not to mention great food! And the staff at the Hilton could not have been more gracious and kind.

Thursday started with a welcome reception at the Science Center at the Whitaker Center. The Friday morning breakfast and panel discussion, moderated by Emily Reed, featured local authors and a publisher. The discussion focused on the challenges of diversity in children's literature. There was also a children's book fair throughout the day on Friday, featuring books that focused on diversity and inclusiveness. The local authors held a book signing, as well as offering Kiwanians a chance to purchase their books at a discount. To support our literacy theme, attendees donated new or gently used children to young adults books. The books were distributed to a local Harrisburg children's organization and through the Booksmiles organization, an organization focused on getting books to children at home locations in Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Friday's lunch featured Beverly Bradley, president of Cops 'n' Kids – Lehigh Valley. Friday afternoon included educational and special interest forums, an all-attendance general session, and a "Meet the Candidates" Happy Hour sponsored by the Past Lt. Governors' Association. This year featured several virtual addresses during some sessions.

Saturday morning included more forums, another general session, followed by our annual Club and PA Kiwanis Foundation Awards luncheon. The annual business session (elections, bylaw amendments, recognitions, etc.) was held Saturday afternoon. The Connelly Award was presented during the general business session. Of course, Saturday evening featured the Governor's Banquet with exceptional entertainment provided by the St. James Players.

When the Kiwanis Club of Bald Eagle & Nittany Valleys learned that the annual telethon fundraising event for Children's Miracle Network and The Geisinger Janet Weis Children's Hospital in Danville would not be held this year, members were disappointed. Since the Club's charter nine years ago, it has partnered with CMN in various fundraisers and helped to answer phones during the telethon.

Club treasurer Sally Young had an idea. Why not conduct a month-long fundraiser for CMN culminating with a "Mediathon" using live streaming on the club's Facebook page? Under Sally's leadership, the club devised a theme using its 3-2-1 meeting structure (three hours service, two hours of social, one hour of meetings per month). Donors who made a gift or pledge of just \$6.00 per month for six months (\$36.00) were matched by BENV Kiwanis donating a new book to the Janet Weis Children's Hospital "Reach Out and Read" program in their name. The campaign ran during the month of June and ended on July 4.

The main event of the fundraiser was the Mediathon on Sunday, June 27. It was held at Miller Brothers Auto Sales in Mill Hall, a corporate member of BENV. Miller Brothers generously loaned office space, telephones, and computers to make the event possible. Club members Matt Wise and Ricky Reinberg provided the media expertise needed for the Facebook live interviews. Club president Penny Meyers joined Sally in a kickoff interview to begin the event and Sally announced that the goal was to raise \$3.600 for CMN.

Special guests included Jim Hepner and his wife Connie who brought their dog, Drake, a therapy dog who visits the Children's Hospital once per month. Macy Plowman and her mom, Jaime McCann, visited to relate Macy's Miracle Child story. The club also welcomed Teresa Everett and her son, Ryan. Ryan was born prematurely at 26 weeks at Geisinger in Danville.

The club succeeded in raising \$1,761.00 in donations and

donated 51 new books to the Reach Out and Read program. CMN expressed its thanks and was impressed with how the club organized and carried out the event. Matt Wise, who is also the Kiwanis Pennsylvania District Region 4 Trustee, said that the BENV event will likely be used as a model for other clubs in the district and possibly at the national level of Kiwanis as well. Kiwanis of BENV is looking forward to conducting another event Mediathon next year.

AKTION CLUB RAK'ing It Up for 25 Years

PA District Aktion Club celebrated 25 years of service at our annual DCON on Saturday, August 7, 2021. We again held DCON virtually to ensure the safety of the Aktion Club members and advisors. Although we dearly missed the Laurel Lodge (our convention home for 23 years), this virtual event opened up ways for various guests to participate with ease. There were over 40 people in attendance and participants included: Governor Don Smith, Governor Elect Sarah Zulueta, District Executive Director Kevin Thomas, Lisa Pyron, Kiwanis International SLP Staff, Cathy Szymanski, KI Trustee (and Erie Aktion Club Supporter), Richard "Dick" Brulotte, Ohio District Aktion Club Administrator, Kiwanian Eugene "The Great" Law, and State College Circle K member, Dylan Freeman. There were 5 Aktion Clubs who participated as well as their advisors: Abington, Erie, State College, Whitemarsh and ARC Scranton.

We opened DCON with a DJ and celebratory music. The DJ was B-\$ from the Dream Team and a member of the Whitemarsh Aktion Club. After a "loud and proud" member and club roll call, remarks were received from our distinguished guests. Aktion Clubs and members were honored and revered for 25 years of selfless service and giving, their servant hearts a model to live by. Aktion Clubs also shared what they have been doing during the pandemic to serve their communities as well as some of the difficulties they were and are having with meeting and doing service projects.

Our Keynote Speaker was Daniel "Danny" Ferron. He lives in Eastern PA and has Tourette Syndrome. He has spent his life living

with this neurological disorder characterized by involuntary tics and vocalizations. His goal in life is to educate others and advocate on behalf of others with Tourette's. He works as a health care worker for senior citizens, but has also done some work in TV and movies. He made a documentary about his Tourette's journey called: (available on You Tube). He has recently turned the photos from this movie into a coffee table book called "The Tour of Tourette's" (available on Amazon). Danny shared his life journey living with Tourette's and passion for education and advocacy about Tourette's through supporting local advocacy groups (PA Tourette Syndrome Alliance PA-TSA). His "Flat Danny Project" is another way he is spreading awareness and acceptance of this disorder. Proceeds from the sale of his documentary and book go to PA-TSA. A copy of one of his books was raffled off at the convention and Erie Aktion Club won the book.

The theme of this DCON was "RAK It Up—PA Aktion Club 25 Years of Service". RAK = Random Acts of Kindness. In April 2021, Aktion Club members were issued a challenge—to complete at least 25 RAK's by DCON. They were given a worksheet to help them keep track of their RAK's and during DCON, they shared out some of them. Some RAK examples that were shared were: sponsoring a coffee hour for residents in the building they live in, delivering meals from church to neighbors, buying coffee, buying a friend lunch, smiling at anyone and everyone, holding the door, calling and reaching out to friends to stay connected, sent cards, thanked first responders, helping family members, "pitching in",

cleaning up park and neighborhood after a severe storm, helping at garage sale and buying calendars for their friends. They learned that many of these RAK's did not cost ANY money, just time and love. One of the individuals shared that he completed 90 RAK's in the challenge timeframe. RAK's are Aktion Club essence—they do them every day.

After the "business session" of DCON was over, we had a Social Hour. Our DJ, B-\$ Dream Team, spun the tunes for an hour and we danced (in our chairs) and celebrated. In addition, to provide all clubs the opportunity to celebrate this 25 year service milestone, each Aktion Club received some funds to use to celebrate and commemorate this accomplishment. Each club will choose what they want to do with the money.

25 years of service completed...What will the next 25 years look like? The slate is blank and a new chapter has begun. Aktion Club needs Kiwanis more than ever. Thank you for continuing to support them. Through Aktion Club, they have a venue in which to serve and shine. Today it was held at Easton's Upper Hackett's Park Pavilion with wonderful weather and sunshine. Presenting on behalf of the Easton Kiwanis Foundation was President Dr. Kenneth Wildrick and on behalf of the Kiwanis Club was President Janet Owen. Accepting from the Easton Area Community Center was Maurice Zucker and Jay Williams. Carolyn Serva was on hand today from Family Connections and Sarah Panovec, herself an Easton Kiwanian, was accepting on behalf of the Third Street Alliance.

Kiwanis Foundation President Dr. Wildrick announced that the \$15,000 was "...a stretch beyond our upper calculated grant expectation, but we felt the circumstances of the pandemic and its effect on not-for-profits and children justified making the additional outreach. The need is great." The Grant Objective for this year was to promote the Foundation's goals for

youth of character development, education, development of the full potential of youth, and/or which foster the rise of youth from poverty.

While ten applications were ultimately received the three grant awards were made to Easton Area Community Center for their comprehensive 12-month programming in the core activities of after-School Education and an Enrichment program for youth from K-8 and a summer Camp Program for youth K-8. Family Connections was chosen for its Parenting Education program, including its expansion through creation of a new Parent Educator position. And Third Street Alliance for its Behavioral Health Initiative in its Learning Center as the grant will provide part of the

salary support needed for a Behavioral Health Specialist to provide the expertise and classroom resources needed.

DISTINGUISHED PROGRAM

2021-22

KIWANIS DISTRICTS

The district must be in good standing with Kiwanis International as defined by Procedure 204 – DISTRICT STATUS as of September 30, 2022.

A. GROWTH WITHIN THE DISTRICT (Must accomplish two of three)

- Net gain in membership over the Kiwanis administrative year, as certified by October 10, 2022.
- Achievement of the new club opening goal, as set by agreement of the president and governor (as president-elect and governor-elect). A district may achieve new club opening credit for a Kiwanis club in another nation under any program approved as such by the Kiwanis International Board.
- Increase of at least ten percent (10%) in new members added by clubs during the administrative year over the previous year.

AND

B. SERVICE BY CLUBS WITHIN THE DISTRICT (Must accomplish two of three)

- Submission of a club signature project in the Kiwanis International annual signature project contest.
- Increase in overall giving to the Kiwanis Children's Fund over the previous Kiwanis administrative year, from all district sources.
- Achievement of a district's goal of service to children. May include:
 - Number of specific or overall Service Leadership Programs clubs in good standing increased over the previous administrative year.
 - Monetary fundraising goal by clubs in the district to support a specific need of children within the district. (Must be documented and reported by the district to Kiwanis International by November 1, 2022.)
 - Documented service-hour goal by clubs of the district to support a specific need of children within the district. (Must be documented and reported by the district to Kiwanis International by November 1, 2022.)

KIWANIS DIVISIONS

Each district is encouraged to set criteria for recognizing distinguished divisions. Recommended criteria should reflect growth within the division, including:

- Conducting a club officer education program.
- Net gain in membership in the division.
- Opening of a new club within the division.
- Significantly supporting another division in its opening of a new club.
- Increase in new members by clubs in the division.

The district should determine the means and methods of recognition.

KIWANIS CLUBS

Each district is encouraged to set criteria recognizing distinguished clubs. Recommended criteria should include:

- Use of ACE (Achieving Club Excellence) tools to assess club and implement appropriate changes.
- Increase in membership by the club.
- Completion of a signature project by the club.
- Participation by the club president-elect and officers-elect in club officer education.
- Sponsorship/support of Service Leadership Programs.
- Financial support of the Kiwanis Children's Fund or other national/district Kiwanis foundations.
- · Club attendance at conventions and conferences.



The district should determine the means and methods of recognition.
