May 25th – Our Community Comes Together for the Danzig Walk by Frederica Joseph

An annual walk is held to remember two young people who were shot during a block party on Danzig Street in Scarborough on July 16, 2012. Shyanne Charles was 14 years old, and Joshua Yasay was 23 years old.

In May, police escorted 50 people who showed their support for the families and friends of the victims of gun violence in the Danzig community. This was a walk to remember and honour the individuals whose lives were cut short. Participants walked 4.5 km from Danzig Street and Morningside to Port Union and Waterfront Park where a ceremony, and the release of peace doves took place.

Joshua's mother organized the event. As May 25th was Joshua's birthday, she felt this would be an appropriate way to remember Joshua and other victims of violence in the community.

Two heartfelt themes of the event were increasing awareness of gun violence issues, and building hope for the restoration of peace.

Rainy weather was no deterrent for the participants, including our City Councillor Paul Ainslie, a representative from our MPP Andrea Hazel's office, and members from many community agencies and groups, such as our Kiwanis Club of Scarborough.

A Recollection and History of Kiwanis Clubs in Scarborough by Barry Hitchcock

During Guildwood Day's 50th Anniversary, one long-time resident of our community and the local Rotarian Club Secretary, Gerard Baribeau, connected us with another long-time community resident.

Barry Hitchcock has shared with us his recollections of earlier Kiwanis Club activities in Scarborough and has given his permission for us to share his recollections in our newsletter. We are very grateful to learn how the Eastern Canada and Caribbean District of Kiwanis International came to be. Below are Barry's recollections and history of Kiwanis Clubs in Scarborough.

I joined the Kiwanis Club of the Golden Mile in December 1961. The club, founded in 1953, had about 40 members. There were 5 Kiwanis Clubs in Scarborough - Scarborough the mother club (with about 60 members), which sponsored the other four clubs, Golden Mile, Cedarbrae, West Hill, and Agincourt (each with about 35 to 40 members). Kiwanis was a big presence in Scarborough, with their many community projects.

A significant presence was that together the five clubs sponsored the Kiwanis Football Association of Scarborough, with ten teams for pre-high-school boys, five junior and five senior teams. Each team played once a week in parks all over Scarborough. Kiwanians filled the roles of managers, coaches, handlers of the yardsticks, and as the association executive members, including president, secretary, registrar and two members at large. Scarborough Firefighters served as referees. For my involvement, as registrar, I received a Recognition Award from the Municipality of Scarborough.

The Kiwanis Music Festival of Greater Toronto was another project jointly run by all the Toronto region clubs. The festival was featured as a daily article with pictures in the Toronto Star. The Golden Mile Club provided two presidents to the festival. I served as Director, and at different times as Chairman of the Scholarships and Awards Committee and The Stars of the Festival Concert Committee. Initially, one end-of-festival concert was held in Massey Hall, Ford Theatre, O'Keefe Centre, or Roy Thomson Hall. Later, the single concert was replaced by three end-of-festival concerts, held at Martingrove Collegiate, Edward Gardens, and University of Toronto Scarborough Campus, spaced at one-week intervals.

Kiwanians thought big. The Golden Mile's inaugural project in 1953 was a horse show. Scarborough was then a rural community. The show was a newsworthy event.

The Golden Mile Club had Bill White, a black man, as a member. I believe he may have been the only black Kiwanian Worldwide - certainly so, in North America. Bill came from a distinguished Nova Scotia family, and his sister was world-renowned contralto Portia White. He was a musician (piano performer and composer) and had a choir called the "Bill White Singers". Bill could take a room full of people and have them singing in four-part harmony in minutes. He was an inspirational speaker and activist. In 1970, Bill was inducted into the Order of Canada for his record as a social worker, activist, and musician.

In the mid 1950's, the Kiwanis International convention was held in San Francisco. The Golden Mile Club, along with members of the other Scarborough clubs, traveled to the

convention as a group in a private rail car. When they checked in at the convention hotel, Bill White was denied a room, because of their policy regarding skin colour. The Golden Mile Club, with support from other Canadian clubs, threatened to boycott the convention if Bill White was not admitted.

When the first Caribbean club was founded, the American clubs would not accept it in any of their divisions. Ontario, Quebec, and the Maritimes stepped up and welcomed the club, thus creating "Eastern Canada and the Caribbean".

In 1991, I received a congratulatory letter acknowledging 30 years as a Kiwanian. Shortly afterwards, the Golden Mile Club turned in its charter. The club was unable to replace its aging members with young people. The only club left in Scarborough was the Scarborough Club, then reduced to fewer than ten members. Likewise, the North York Club, which traditionally had a close relationship with the Golden Mile Club. I attended both clubs as a guest, but did not join either of them, as it was obvious that their time before turning in their charters was limited.

These are my recollections about Kiwanis in Scarborough during the 1960s through to the 1990s, that I thought might be of interest to you. Kiwanis was a big part of my life, and that of my family.

We are very grateful to Barry Hitchcock for sharing his recollections and are proud about how we became part of the Eastern Canada and Caribbean District of Kiwanis International.
