The Coronavirus aka Covid-19 Hits Canada Hard

Covid-19 has ravaged the world as the latest pandemic to take hold. P Chris Foran announced on March 14th the suspension of Tweed Kiwanis Club meetings until April 5th. That suspension has now been extended until the end of April.

P Chris Foran reported on the following for the newsletter:

“In person meetings are cancelled for at least April. We are considering doing a Zoom teleconference or video conference for members interested in participating. So far, from the members I have spoken to, I’m getting mixed responses. *(A Zoom Teleconference meeting is now scheduled for April 16th)*”

I am going to send a weekly email to members letting them know what we are doing or planning, events being postponed, other organizations initiatives etc. and looking for ideas on what we can do to help out youth and community during this period.

I would also like directors to have input into this weekly email and to provide me with any information they may have on their respective committees/projects.

I would like to see if members have ideas on how we could help the youth and community during this period. Pretty tough when we are trying to get everyone to stay home but someone may have a great idea about contributing to a cause e.g. food bank, or an online service that could help out seniors and others that can’t leave their home.”

In an effort to prevent the spread of COVID-19 within communities and across the country, all Canadians are advised to:

- stay at home unless you have to go to work; talk to your employer about working at home if possible
- avoid all non-essential trips in your community
- do not gather in groups
- limit contact with people at higher risk, such as older adults and those in poor health
- go outside to exercise but stay close to home
- if you leave your home, always keep a distance of at least 2 arms lengths (approximately 2 metres) from others; household contacts (people you live with) do not need to distance from each other unless they are sick or have travelled in the last 14 days
- avoiding crowded places and non-essential gatherings
- avoiding common greetings, such as handshakes
- wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds
- when coughing or sneezing, cough or sneeze into a tissue or the bend of your arm, not your hand
- avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands

- 2: To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.
- 3: To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business and professional standards.
- 4: To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.
- 5: To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service and to build better communities
- 6: To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and good will.

PLG Marj Buck Has Been Cookin the Books!!



Looking for some tasty recipes well then you need look no further. PLG Marj Buck as the Tweed Kiwanis club advisor for the St. Carthagh Kiwanis Builders Club, has been working with the 25 youth on creating and selling a recipe book for \$15.00

The school decided to focus on the importance of food for their school wide Lenten project. They wanted to show the impact of daily nutritious meals to students on a community, local and global scale. As a school community they are fundraising on behalf of three very deserving organizations: *Food for Learning* - a school-wide food program that offers nutritious breakfasts each morning to all students, as well as snack bins each day in every classroom. On a local level they will be supporting the *Morningstar Mission* in Napanee - an organization offering routine healthy meals such as hot lunches, hot suppers, food basket programs to those who cannot always reach their full potential. Lastly, globally they will be fundraising for *Zoos Victoria* an organization based in Australia. 100% of the donations to Zoos Victoria goes toward getting food to the animal wildlife population devastated by the recent catastrophic bushfires.

In keeping with the theme of “food” and its importance, they created a “St. Carthagh Cardinals Cookbook.” Funds raised by sales of the cookbook will go towards these three very carefully chosen programs. Cook book sales are likely on hold pending school closures.


The St. Carthagh Builders Club was chartered by Kiwanis International on November 12, 2019. This is the second project the club has undertaken since being chartered. The first was the

The Kiwanis Club of Tweed and the Municipality of Tweed are excited about their partnership on a significant project to upgrade and add new equipment to the playground in Memorial Park. The plan includes a variety of equipment that specializes in engaging sensory, motor, cognitive and social skills, including spinners, swings, panels, slides, ladders and a zipline. Improvements will be made to general playground equipment, and rubber surfaces will be used in various locations within the playground.

Kiwanian Jim Hanna, who chairs the Playground Committee, says “Every child should be able to access a playground and not have to watch from the sidelines as others play. This playground is designed to do just that – children and others of all ages will be able to come to the park to relax and enjoy the playground on the water in the heart of Tweed.” Mayor Jo-Anne Albert added “The Municipality welcomes the opportunity to work together with Kiwanis on the playground project, which will be a great asset for our residents and visitors. I am confident we will be able to make this project a reality – we have a very generous community”. Kiwanis Club of Tweed President Chris Foran concluded “We are excited as a Club, and for the community, but especially for kids using wheelchairs or other mobility devices”.

The upgraded playground is targeted for completion in 2020/21. A campaign to raise funds for this project, estimated at a cost of approximately \$400,000, was kicked off at the annual Christmas party fundraiser at the home of Kiwanian Don DeGenova and Dr. Charles Mustard. Over \$20,000 was donated that November evening, including \$5,000

contributions from both the Kiwanis Club of Tweed and from DeGenova/Mustard. Since that time, a total of over \$86,000 has been donated or committed by community members, businesses, service clubs and the Municipality to this important project. Most recently, the “Family Feud”, a community group that runs annual hockey and slo-pitch tournaments, made a generous donation of \$5,000. Government and public grant opportunities are being sought, and community groups, businesses, and individuals are invited to support this worthwhile cause. While this special project is underway, the Kiwanis Club of Tweed will continue to fund other community initiatives.

Cheques payable to the ‘Municipality of Tweed’, noting ‘Kiwanis Playground’ in the memo, can be dropped off to the Municipal office at 255 Metcalf St., or mailed to Postal Bag 729, Tweed ON, K0K 3J0. ‘Donation certificates’ are now available for purchase at the Municipal office to make a contribution in any amount in that special someone’s name. All businesses, organizations and individuals who make donations will be acknowledged on signage at the playground, and receive a tax receipt for contributions over \$10. In the case of donation certificates, the recipients name will be included on the signage; the purchaser will receive a tax receipt.

Wearing masks or face coverings <https://www.canada.ca/en/public-health/services/diseases/2019-novel-coronavirus-infection/prevention-risks.html>

Medical masks, including surgical, medical procedure face masks and respirators (like N95 masks), must be kept for health care workers and others providing direct care to COVID-19 patients.

Wearing a non-medical mask or face covering in the community has not been proven to protect the person wearing it. Strict hygiene and public health measures, including frequent hand washing and physical (social) distancing, will reduce your chance of being exposed to the virus.

Wearing a non-medical mask or face covering is an additional measure you can take to protect others around you, even if you have no symptoms. It can be useful for short periods of time, when physical distancing is not possible in public settings such as when grocery shopping or using public transit.

Wearing a non-medical mask or face covering covers your mouth and nose to help prevent your respiratory droplets from contaminating others or landing on surfaces. Just like our recommendation not to cough into your hands (instead, cover your cough with tissues or your sleeve), a mask can reduce the chance that others are coming into contact with your respiratory droplets.

If wearing a non-medical mask or face covering makes you feel safer and stops you from touching your nose and mouth, that is also good. But remember not to touch or rub your eyes.

Homemade cloth face coverings

Use caution if you intend to wear a [homemade cloth face covering](#). [Instructions for sew and non-sew methods](#) are available.

Safety when wearing non-medical masks

It is important to understand that **non-medical masks have limitations and need to be used safely.**

Non-medical masks or face coverings should **not** be placed on:

- children under age 2
- anyone who has trouble breathing
- anyone who is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance

If you choose to use a non-medical mask or face covering:

- you must wash your hands immediately before putting it on and immediately after taking it off (in addition to practising good hand hygiene while wearing it)
- it should fit well (non-gaping)
- you should not share it with others



Face masks can become contaminated on the outside, or when touched by your hands. When wearing a mask or face covering, take the following precautions to protect yourself:

- avoid touching it while using it
- change a cloth mask as soon as it gets damp or soiled; put it directly into the washing machine or a bag that can be emptied into the washing machine and then disposed of; cloth masks and face coverings can be laundered with other items using a hot cycle, and then dried thoroughly
- non-medical masks or face coverings that cannot be washed should be discarded and replaced as soon as they get damp, soiled or crumpled; dispose of them properly in a lined garbage bin; do not discard them in shopping carts, on the ground, etc.

We Now Have a New Website
