CARD Provides Expert Consulting at No Charge

Ali Cunningham, Assistant Director of The FAU Center for Autism and Related Disabilities (CARD) gave the program at our March 7th meeting. CARD provides expert consulting, training and support, at no charge, for Autism Specpeople with autism and related disabilities, their families and the professionals serving them. CARD's goal is to optimize the potential of the individuals they serve by helping them become valued members Otherwise Specified (PDD-NOS); Rett of their communities, enabling them to learn, work, communicate and socialize.

FAU CARD was established by the Florida Legislature, and is funded by the Florida Department of Education, to provide free services and supports to eligible constituents throughout Palm Beach, Martin, St. Lucie, Indian River, and Okeechobee Counties.

CARD serves individuals of any age, diagnosed with one of the following: trum Disorders (ASD) which includes Autistic

Disorder, Asperger Syndrome, and Pervasive Developmental Disorder Not Syndrome; Childhood Disintegrative Disorder (CDD); Dual Sensory Impairment or Deaf-Blind; or Sensory Impairment with another disabling condition.

Family members, friends, and professionals may also receive CARD's free services.

CARD's work centers on building the capacity of families, schools, and other community agencies to better prepare and support people with autism and related disabilities. It is important to recognize that there are some activities beyond the scope of their work. These include the following: They are not a treatment provider; FAU CARD and its staff members do not provide direct therapy to children or adults; they do not provide assessment, testing, or diagnostic services; and they do not provide advocacy services. However, if you are in need of such services, they can provide you a referral.

Those were the words of our program speaker, Dennis Moran, at our March 14th meeting. Dennis is an agent with Allstate Insurance. What it means is that there's a lot of fraud out there.

As a result of accident fraud, Florida insurance consumers pay 56

Dennis Moran percent more than consumers in other states for automobile insurance premiums – an average of \$736 in Florida versus \$471 countrywide. Staged accidents, rampant litigation, and unscrupulous medical clinics that provide services to Personal Injury Protection claimants have created a perfect storm of skyrocketing costs for honest Florida consumers.

Florida leads the nation in staged automobile accidents and questionable insurance claims. Four of the top 10 U.S. hotspots with the highest rate of questionable auto claims are in Florida: Tampa, Miami, Orlando and Hialeah. If the underlying problems that allow for the abuse of Florida's no-fault law are not addressed in 2012, Florida's consumers will continue to pay the price.

Worse, the Florida Office of Insurance Regulation warns that the current trend in fraudulent claims is unsustainable and may lead to an automobile liability insurance availability crisis.

"Undercover investigations have revealed that many participants in staged accidents were part of a larger group and that the staged crash was just the first step in the overall scheme," said Florida Sheriffs Association Executive Director Steve Casey. "PIP fraud used to be more of an individual crime and now has become an organized crime." Solutions? There are coalitions out there like Gear-Up Florida that are fighting this.

Healthy Families Targets Child Abuse & Neglect Healthy Beginnings Help Children Begin Life Healthy

Our program on March 28th featured two speakers - Stephanie Moreau, the program director for Healthy Families, a program of Families First of Palm Beach County and Gabrielle Bargerstock, representing Healthy Beginnings, a program with the Children's Services Council.

Healthy Families prevents child abuse in 98% of the high-risk families served. The statistics are startling: 49,964 children were abused or neglected in Florida last year. Every 11 minutes, a child in Florida is abused or neglected. And every 45 hours, a child in Florida dies

from abuse or neglect.

Families First of Palm Beach County is a private nonprofit county wide family service agency whose vision is to build stronger families-stronger communities. Comprehensive programs are provided for 1,300 families yearly. Families seeking to build a better quality of life for their children can benefit from the agency's six diverse programs whose focus is to reduce barriers that impact family stability. Families First has offices in West Palm Beach and Belle Glade; Families First can provide personal support and coordination of services to fulfill the

families individual needs. Families First has been serving families and children since 1990 and is an ethical, competent and responsive agency with a high standard of values. Their mission is to



create a safe, healthy and sustainable environment for families and their children through innovative practices. For more information, go to www.familiesfirstpbc.org.

Healthy Families and Families First fall under the umbrella of Healthy Beginnings Services, a part of the Children's Services Council of Palm Beach County. CSCPBC is an independent special district established by Palm Beach County voters, who dedicated a source of funding so more children are born healthy, remain free from abuse and neglect, are ready for kindergarten, and are on grade level by the end of third grade.

Today, the Children's Services Council of Palm Beach County provides leadership, funding and research on behalf of Palm Beach County's children so they are born healthy, growing up safe and ready to learn.

The Council's mission is to enhance the lives of children and their families and enable them to attain their full potential by providing a unified context within which children's needs can be identified and resolved by all members of the community. To achieve this, the Council plans, develops, funds, and evaluates programs and promotes public policies which benefit Palm Beach County's children and families. 4=1: A Membership Initiative

Here's something to think about.....

Over the years, clubs have been presented with numerous membership growth programs.

4=1, a program that the Florida District is promoting this year and has promoted in the past, is probably one of the easiest to implement. At its most basic level, it's simply a matter of dividing our membership into teams of four and charging each team with the responsibility of recruiting one new member into our club during the year.

Besides the obvious benefits of growing our membership, the bylaws of Kiwanis International include the following item: "If a club achieves a net growth greater than or equal to 25 percent at the end of a given Kiwanis year, the club shall be relieved of any obligation to pay International dues for any club member over and above the club membership of the previous Kiwanis year." This basically means that the club gets an International dues refund if they meet or exceed the 25% mark for the net gain in members.

The program costs nothing but a small bit of time, and the potential rewards are numerous.

Governor's Message

By the time you read this, we should be just about done with the Kiwanis Education Days and the 27 Official Governor's visits. If you attended either or both you know that the two areas I am dedicated to improving this year is our relation-

ship with the Service Leadership Programs (SLPs) we sponsor and our 26-year history of declining membership.

We started out the new year with a SLP Advisor training session in Cocoa Beach. Over 100 Kiwanis advisors to our SLPs gathered for a two-day workshop to learn the how to's of advising, mentoring and leading the more than 22,000 members of the SLPs in the Florida District. Exit evaluations showed that those who attended were ecstatic at the content and overwhelmingly wanted this training taken to the Division level. By late spring or early summer we intend to announce a schedule that will allow all SLP advisors, Kiwanians, and school faculty to be trained. We are certain this training will raise our ability to perform our duties and render our SLP programs the best in Kiwanis International. This training concept makes sense and is one of a kind. Our hats are off to the forward thinking members of the Florida Foundation who provided us with sufficient funds to conduct training and have made money available to continue training at the Division level.

Membership remains a concern, but we are making slow progress. We are down 79 members from our base number given to us by Kiwanis International on September 30, 2011. Were it not for the 143 members Kiwanis International charged to us after September 30th we would have a plus membership this year. International set our number on the last day of September, then allowed clubs to continue dropping members through the 10th of October. Those drops count on this year. I honestly believe we can show a net gain in membership for 2011-12, but we all need to take responsibility for growing Florida Kiwanis. If every club will give the 4 = 1 program an honest try, we will grow. Guaranteed! Simply divide your club roster into teams of four and require each team to recruit one new member between now and August 1, 2012. We can't make it any simpler.

Thanks for all you are doing in your respective communities to meet the ever-increasing needs of our children. We have never been needed more. We are up to the task; you prove it every day with the variety and volume of your service. I know it's hard sometimes and we all have sacrificed; it's what we do and what we do makes us who we are.
