Judge For Yourself



Our program on July 30th was presented by Jaime Goodman, candidate for Circuit Court Judge, Group 30. He explained how the elections for judges is very different from the general elections for other political positions. Most people don't know about these:

1. Elections are Non-Partison—the candidate is not allowed to disclose

party affiliation by law. Everyone gets to vote.

- 2. The elections are held in August. The winner has to win by more than 50%. If there is a run-off, it takes place during the regular elections in November.
- 3. Group # this refers to the seat that is up for election. There are 35 Circuit Court Judges in Palm Beach County. Jaime Goodman is one of 3 candidates for Group 30.
- 4. Elections are for a 6 year term.

Jaimie Goodman is a veteran employment discrimination lawyer with over 30 years of litigation and courtroom experience: 10 years handling complex employment litigation for a Fortune 500 company and the past 21 years in private practice handling complex civil litigation and employment cases.

Jaimie also has a long history of community service. His passion for service is why Jaimie filed to become our next elected Circuit Court Judge. Mentoring Helps Our Youth Succeed

Our program on July 23rd was presented by Gary Graham, the Mentoring Initiative Director for the United Way, PBC. It is documented that students who participate in mentor relationships miss fewer school days, are less likely to participate in negative behaviors and more likely to graduate on time. Just one hour a week can help a child become: 52% less likely to skip a day of school; 37% less likely to skip a class; 46% less likely to start using drugs; 27% less likely to start drinking and 33% less likely to hit someone.

Under the Mentor Center, United Way now funds and has oversight of eight mentor programs. The Mentor Center also serves as the anchor of the Palm Beach County Mentor Network, a professional affiliation of 22 formal mentor programs working together to elevate mentoring in the community. These local mentor programs oversee more than 10,000 mentor matches.

activities, and I asked what it took to join."

Ohio resident Mike Nichols had no intention of joining Kiwanis when he attended the Berea Arts Fest in the fall of 2010. But when hunger pangs struck, he stopped by the concession stand run by the Kiwanis Club of Beria, Ohio, for a hotdog and a bit of information about the organization selling them. He got both, courtesy of former Berea Kiwanis Club President Jodee Ward, who happened to be handling customers that day. "She's got an outstanding personality," Nichols says of his Kiwanis sponsor. "I said to her, 'This looks like fun...what does Kiwanis do?' She described to me some of the club's

The deal was sealed before Nichols got his hotdog (with extra mustard and onions). Ward invited him to a meeting, and shortly thereafter he joined. Now that he's been in Kiwanis for a few years (and is his club's president-elect), he's got some advice for other Kiwanians seeking to bolster membership: always keep an eye peeled for folks who might be interested, and never miss an opportunity to approach them in a friendly, low-pressure way. "I like to say that all of our members are on the membership committee," Nichols says. "I think it's a lot more effective to draw people in rather than try to push them."

Ward—herself a former club president and current member of the Ohio District membership committee—couldn't agree more. The trick, she says, is simple for some but difficult for others. "You have to learn to talk to people," Ward advises. "You have to open your mouth and ask. And to me, 'ask' stands for 'Always Say Kiwanis.' One way or another, always mention Kiwanis. Plus, in my sales career I've learned that you can say almost anything if you do it with a big smile on your face.

Ward certainly isn't timid about singing Kiwanis' praises, having chatted up candidates everyplace from her grocery store meat counter to, of course, the group's charity concession stand. Nichols credits her sunny personality and gift for gab with turning him into a Kiwanian. "I was interested in doing something," he recalls. "I was ready. The ground in the garden was prepped for planting, and Jodee just poured the seeds right in." Ward is the sort of gardener who never misses a chance to plant those seeds. Sometimes they prosper, sometimes not. She never knows until she tries. And tries again.

July 2:

1776 The Continental Congress passed a resolution that "these United Colonies are, and of right, ought to be, Free and Independent States."

Put protein in Perspective

Protein gives us the energy to get up and go—and keep going. Protein in food is broken down into the 20 amino acids that are the body's basic building blocks

for growth and energy, and essential for maintaining cells, tissues, and organs. While too much protein can be harmful to people with kidney disease, the latest research suggests that most of us need more high-quality protein than the current dietary recommendations. It also suggests that we need more protein as we age to maintain physical function.

How much protein do you need?

Protein needs are based on weight rather than calorie intake. Adults should eat at least 0.8g of protein per kilogram (2.2lb) of body weight per day. A higher intake may help to lower your risk for obesity, osteoporosis, type 2 diabetes, and stroke.

- ■Older adults should aim for 1 to 1.5 grams of protein for each kilogram of weight. This translates to 68 to 102g of protein per day for a person weighing 150 lbs.
- ■Divide your protein intake among meals but aim for 25 to 40g of high-quality protein per meal; less than 15g won't benefit bone or muscle.
- ■Get plenty of calcium (1,000 to 1,200 mg per day). Source: Environmental Nutrition

The key to ensuring you eat high-quality protein is to try different types, rather than relying on red meat and whole milk dairy products which are high in saturated fat. Trying different healthy protein sources such as fish, beans, nuts, seeds, peas, tofu, chicken, and soy products will open up new options for healthy mealtimes.

Top ten tips for reading aloud

Kiwanis International urges the entire Kiwanis family to implement Read Around the World projects throughout the entire year. The tips listed below are a great resource for reading aloud, provided by author <a href="Memoryle-Mem

- 1. Spend at least ten wildly happy minutes every single day reading aloud.
- 2. Read at least three stories a day; it may be the same story three times. Children need to hear a thousand stories before they begin to learn to read.
- 3. Read aloud with animation. Listen to your own voice and don't be dull, or flat, or boring. Hang loose and be loud, have fun and laugh a lot.
- 4. Read with joy and enjoyment. Real enjoyment for yourself and great joy for the listeners.
- 5. Read the stories that kids love, over and over and over again, and always read in the same "tune" for each book: i.e. with the same intonations on each page, each time
- 6. Let children hear lots of language by talking to them constantly about the pictures, or anything else connected to the book; or sing any old song that you can remember; or say nursery rhymes in a bouncy way; or be noisy together doing clapping games.
- 7. Look for rhyme, rhythm or repetition in books for young children, and make sure the books are really short.
- 8. Play games with the things that you and the child can see on the page, such as letting kids finish rhymes, and finding the letters that start the child's name and yours, remembering that it's never work, it's always a fabulous game.
- 9. Never ever teach reading, or get tense around books.
- 10. Please read aloud every day, moms and dads, because you just love being with your child, not because it's the right thing to do.

Religious Tolerance

Religion. Did the hairs on your neck stand up a little? Because it's been a sensitive issue since the beginning of time. But lately it seems that religious intolerance has been growing. And while we can disagree about the past and we can argue about the future, we are all here now. Together. And together we all have the same basic right to hold and practice our own beliefs. I don't see anything hair-raising about that.

The meaning of the term "religious tolerance" involves:

Accepting that followers of various religions consider their own beliefs to be true. Most people believe that their religious beliefs are true, perhaps even true on an absolute basis.

Allowing others to hold religious beliefs that are different from yours. No society is truly free unless there is freedom of religious association, speech and belief for everyone.

Allowing others to freely change their religion, or denomination or beliefs. Freedom of religion includes the right to change one's faith.

Allowing others to practice their religious faith, within reasonable limits. Religion is more than belief; it involves practices as well.

Refusing to discriminate in employment, accommodation etc. on religious grounds. People who follow minority religions have the right to be treated fairly in the workplace and society generally.

Making a reasonable effort to accommodate other people's religious needs. For example: Allowing an employee to work overtime in order to take off a religious festival or holy day that is significant to them. Scheduling meetings so that they do not conflict with common holy days.

You, of course, may wish to define religious tolerance differently. In the field of religion, there is often no consensus on the definitions of terms.
