TB Control Program Provides Help



Our program on January 9th was presented by Mary Green of the Palm Beach County Health Dept. They have a Tuberculosis (TB) Control Program which over-

sees, manages, and facilitates the various activities and interventions necessary to assure identification and proper treatment of all individuals with TB to eliminate its subsequent spread to others. Persons with TB infection suspect or confirmed TB disease, or household contacts with infectious TB may receive anti-tuberculosis medica-

tion free of charge through the Palm Beach County Health Department. One third of the worldwide population has some form of TB. Florida is ranked 4th in the nation. Last year, 64,000 children worldwide died from this terrible disease. In Florida, the greatest numbers of those infected are homeless. By law, suspected or confirmed TB cases must be reported to the TB Control Program within 72 hours of diagnosis. All routine follow-up visits must also be reported.

Delray's Campaign For Grade Level Reading

Janet Meeks, the Education Coordinator for Delray Beach, discussed their

initiative for grade-level reading. The goal is to get students up to gradelevel by the time they complete 3rd grade. There are three factors that drive 3rd grade level reading: Attendance, Summer Learning and Kindergarten Readiness. Within the city limits of

Delray Beach, Florida, there are too many low-income children showing up Reading Matters in Delray beach! for school not ready to learn. Their goal is to increase from 19%-28% the number of students with an academic experience before they enter Kindergarten. There are also too many lowincome children in Kindergarten through 3rd Grade that miss too

many days of school. And finally, Summertime should not be viewed as a vacation from learning. This attitude contributes to the loss of academic and literacy ground

over the summer months. The fact is that only 20% graduate if they are not at grade level reading by the time they complete 3rd grade.

Here are a few interesting items from the past few weeks:

<u>January 2:</u>

1492 The leader of the last Arab stronghold in Spain surrendered to Spanish forces loyal to King Ferdinand II and Queen Isabella I.

Georgia became the fourth state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.

1900 Secretary of State John Hay announced the Open Door Policy to prompt trade with China.

1935 Bruno Hauptmann went on trial in Flemington, N.J., on charges of kidnapping and murdering the infant son of Charles and Anne Lindbergh. (He was found quilty and executed.)

1965 The New York Jets signed University of Alabama quarterback Joe Namath for a reported \$400,000.

1974 President Richard Nixon signed legislation requiring states to limit highway speeds to 55 mph.



Working Together for Home Fire Safety

More than 3,500 Americans die each year in fires and approximately 18,300 are injured. An overwhelming number of fires occur in the home. There are time-tested ways to prevent and survive a fire. It's not a question of luck. It's a matter of planning ahead.

Every Home Should Have at Least One Working Smoke Alarm. Buy a smoke alarm at any hardware or discount store. It's inexpensive protection for you and your family. Install a smoke alarm on every level of your home. A working smoke alarm can double your chances of survival. Test it monthly, keep it free of dust and replace the battery at least once a year. Smoke alarms themselves should be replaced after ten years of service, or as recommended by the manufacturer.

Prevent Electrical Fires. Never overload circuits or extension cords. Do not place cords and wires under rugs, over nails or in high traffic areas. Immediately shut off and unplug appliances that sputter, spark or emit an unusual smell. Have them professionally repaired or replaced.

Use Appliances Wisely. When using appliances follow the manufacturer's safety precautions. Overheating, unusual smells, shorts and sparks are all warning signs that appliances need to be shut off, then replaced or repaired. Unplug appliances when not in use. Use safety caps to cover all unused outlets, especially if there are small children in the home.

Alternate Heaters. Portable heaters need their space. Keep anything combustible at least three feet away. Keep fire in the fireplace. Use fire screens and have your chimney cleaned annually. The creosote buildup can ignite a chimney fire that could easily spread. Kerosene heaters should be used only where approved by authorities. Never use gasoline or camp-stove fuel. Refuel outside and only after the heater has cooled.

Affordable Home Fire Safety Sprinklers. When home fire sprinklers are used with working smoke alarms, your chances of surviving a fire are greatly increased. Sprinklers are affordable - they can increase property value and lower insurance rates.

Plan Your Escape. Practice an escape plan from every room in the house. Caution everyone to stay low to the floor when escaping from fire and never to open doors that are hot. Select a location where everyone can meet after escaping the house. Get out then call for help.

Caring for Children. Children under five are naturally curious about fire. Many play with matches and lighters. Take the mystery out of fire play by teaching your children that fire is a tool, not a toy.

Caring for Older People

Every year over 1,000 senior citizens die in fires. Many of these fire deaths could have been prevented. Seniors are especially vulnerable because many live alone and can't respond quickly.

International President's Message

KIWANIS OBJECTS 2 & 3

How often do we hear loud cries of "foul" when we learn of sports heroes dethroned with the discovery of a drug-produced victory? Or when students cheat on exams to gain a higher grade? Or when a lawyer uses client funds for personal use? Imagine lawyers actually engaging in such unethical and unprofessional conduct!

I cite my own "imperfect" profession to stress the point that the third Object of Kiwanis, "to promote the adoption and application of higher social, business and professional standards," is as relevant and applicable today as it was when first adopted in 1924. It is said in business that if you think like your customers, you will forge better, longer lasting customer relations and a greater understanding of customer expectations. Applying business ethics is not an option; it is a rule not to be broken. Play by the rules and practice the highest professional standards. That road may be harder to travel, but ultimately, you stay around a lot longer with integrity intact. I don't believe we do enough to brand Kiwanis as a highly ethical organization that maintains as one of its six core values and guiding principles the promotion of the highest standards of ethics and excellence.

Kiwanis Object 2: "To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships". Maybe it's because we think of service more in terms of feeding the hungry, than feeding communities hungry for values—values that, in the long run, can build a better, more ethically grounded world—one that Kiwanis builds better by interacting with hundreds of thousands of youth each year who will bear the responsibility to shape it.

We need to tell prospective new members that we are an organization that has stood the test of time and that has for nearly a century recognized the moral value of teaching and treating others the way you wish to be treated—with honesty, integrity and fairness.

Logically, our third Object follows the second, "living the Golden Rule in all human relationships." In our businesses and professions, in our clubs and in our communities, Kiwanians live and promote the values of the second and third Objects. This is one reason why we designed the 2013 Distinguished Club Award criteria to provide a greater understanding of the meaning of our Objects. The award criteria found in the second Object is intended to promote character education and inspire young persons to learn the important lessons of service and integrity through the application of the Golden Rule. These lessons are not imparted easily and generally are transmitted more effectively when Kiwanians mentor their young partners while engaging in service alongside them.

Kiwanis is indebted to thousands of service leadership administrators and club advisors who spend hours leading by good example. Clubs are urged to invite more persons like them to join our organizations. The distinguished club award criteria relating to our third Object also encourages clubs to "get involved" with any community youth group concerned about the future and the environment our youth will inherit. How fitting it is that one such group, the Boys and Girls Clubs of America, with which many Kiwanis clubs affiliate, last year introduced a public service advertising campaign titled "Great Futures Start Here." Kiwanis clubs, too, have great futures because they continue to play by the rules we call our Objects.
