Since its founding in 1937, the Historical Society of Palm Beach County has been the "go-to" resource history education and research, assembling an extraordinary collection of documents, photographs and artifacts that tell the fascinating story of the people who made Florida and Palm Beach County an exceptional area to live, work and learn. The Society has partnered with the School District of Palm Beach County to provide programs for elementary and middle school students. Research in the archives is by appointment, and open to members in the Society free of charge.

The Historical Society of Palm Beach County's offices are located inside the restored 1916 Courthouse in Downtown West Palm Beach at 300 North Dixie Highway. The Richard and Pat Johnson Palm Beach County History Museum is located on the 2ND Floor of the Courthouse. Their mission is to protect abused, abandoned and neglected children in the communities they serve. ChildNet uses a family-centered, strength-based, needs-driven approach to promote appropriate services for the children and their caregivers. If you are looking for a way to make a

difference in the world, make a world of difference in the life of a child by becoming a foster parent. Foster care is the temporary placement for children who have been removed from their home due to abuse, abandonment or neglect. Children stay with a foster family until they are able to return home or until an alternate permanent placement is found. Every child and teen needs love, support and guidance to thrive and become well-adjusted, socially responsible, self-sufficient, stable adults. ## CROS Ministries Provides Hope Through the Caring Kitchen & Food Pantry in Delray Beach

C.R.O.S. Ministries collaborates with people of different faiths and organizations to create solutions to the unmet needs of people in our community. On June 26th, we heard from Juanita Goode, who talked about the Caring Kitchen and Food Bank in Delray Beach, which are sponsored by CROS Ministries.

The Caring Kitchen is a hot meal program in Delray Beach located at 196 NW 8th Ave., two blocks north of Atlantic Ave. In 2011, The Caring Kitchen served 104,967 combined breakfast, lunch and dinner meals. The program includes numerous services such as job search assistance and referrals to human service and social service agencies in an effort to move people to self-sufficiency. All of The Caring Kitchen programs are carried out primarily with donated food and volunteers.



Non-perishable food items are collected by congregations, groups, and individuals throughout Palm Beach County and taken to the closest pantry. In 2012, 46,770 people received emergency food, nearly half of them children. The newest component of their Community Food Pantry program is "Nutrition in a Knapsack". This program provides nutritious food to children who might not have adequate food over the weekend during the academic year.

Unfortunately, hunger is a part of children's lives. The Ministries are staffed 95% by volunteers. Help is always needed. If you would like to volunteer with this program, call Juanita at 561-699-5113 or go to [www.crosministries.org](http://www.crosministries.org) for more information.

### June 5:

**1723** Economist Adam Smith was born in Kirkcaldy, Scotland.

**1933** The United States went off the gold standard.

**1967** War erupted in the Middle East as Israel raided Egyptian military targets. Syria, Jordan and Iraq entered the conflict.

**1968** Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was shot and mortally wounded just after claiming victory in California's Democratic presidential primary. Gunman Sirhan Bishara Sirhan was immediately arrested.

## Did You Know.....?

The Lee County and Labelle area Kiwanis clubs have joined together in an child safety awareness campaign designed to educate the public on the dangers on leaving unattended children in the car called "Not Even for a Minute."

Trinky Jarrett, a Kiwanis Club of Fort Myers Beach member and wife of Division 19 Lt. Governor Robert Jarrett, organized the design and printing of 5,000 car decals and fact sheets with money from a fundraiser involving all 14 Kiwanis clubs in the area. The decals have been distributed to daycare centers, churches, nursery schools and children's healthcare clinics in Lee County and Labelle.

"Parents should place the decal either on their dash boards or on the car window by where the child's car seat

is," said Trinky Jarrett. Jarrett is looking for funds to print more decals to keep up with demand as we head into the hot summer months. "We want to make the public aware that it is dangerous to leave an unattended child in the car – even if it's only for a minute," said Jarrett, "Kids are left unattended in cars every year. Too many of these children die.

Others suffer thermal burns, severe dehydration, seizures, kidney damage and brain damage. One death is too many."

**Retirement Realities Checklist (Part 1)**

Retirement is not a static point in time. It is a potentially decades-long period during which many factors can have a significant impact on your savings and income. It's always best to contact a Financial Planner or Professional to create a personalized plan. Here's Part 1 of a 10 point checklist to get you started:

**1. Determine your...Sources of Guaranteed Income**

Social Security and traditional pensions were long-considered the backbone of a retirement income plan, as both provide a guaranteed lifetime income. Yet, the roles of these two sources are diminishing over time. **IRI data shows that less than 40% of Boomers currently younger than age 60 expect Social Security to comprise a major source of their retirement income. Additionally, the number of defined benefit plans in the marketplace dropped 66% between 1985 and 2010.** Guaranteed income can help cover your everyday, essential expenses during retirement, addressing lifestyle risk. (Source: 2011 IRI Fact Book, pg. 98)  
Remember: Guarantees are based on the claims paying ability of the issuer.

**2. Determine your...Sources of Non-Guaranteed Income**

This includes stocks, mutual funds, bonds, commodities, inheritances, payments from company savings plans such as a 401(k) plan. Interest, dividends, and other gains help grow your overall investment portfolio, yet offer no guarantees on principal or earnings. Knowing the sources of non-guaranteed retirement income you can expect can help your advisor construct a plan for you that also offers principal and income protection to help preserve some of these gains. Note that non-guaranteed income is susceptible to sequence of returns risk—the risk of running out of money due to low performance in the early years of withdrawals—and asset allocation risk—the risk of investing too conservatively or aggressively to sustain your portfolio for the long-term.(Sources: GAO, Social Security Administration)

**3. Prepare for...Social Security**

Determining when to begin taking Social Security benefits is not to be taken lightly. Research from the Government Accountability Office shows that, between 1997 and 2005, 43% of individuals eligible to start benefits within a month of turning age 62 did so. It is important to keep in mind that **if you elect to commence your Social Security retirement benefits at age 62, your benefit payment amounts will be reduced from 25%30%, severely curtailing one source of lifetime income.**

**4. Prepare for...Longevity Risk**

None of us knows how many years we will live, therefore running the risk that our savings may be insufficient to last throughout our retirement years. In general, **if both you and your spouse are now age 65, there is a 50% chance that one of you will live to age 92, and a 25% chance that one of you will live to age 97.** Many investments you may own do not assure that funds will be available for as long as needed. Ask your financial advisor about supplementing your retirement investment portfolio with a guaranteed income product. (Source: Prudential Financial)

**5. Prepare for...Market Uncertainties**

The Great Recession had a significant impact on both everyday living expenses and retirement savings. **Nearly one-half of Baby Boomers found it more difficult to pay for essential items, such as food, gas, and medication, and one-quarter had difficulty paying their housing expenses.** And, 20% made premature withdrawals from their retirement savings accounts, cutting into their nest eggs. Although no one can say if and when a market downturn of this magnitude will occur again, the ups and downs inherent in the financial markets must be considered when saving and living in retirement. Learn your risk tolerance so that you and your advisor can select the investments most appropriate for you, as some financial products are more susceptible to market swings than others.


