Delray's Library is on the GO!

Our speaker on June 9th was Kae Jonsons, the Development Director of the Delray Beach Library.

There's always something going on at the library. Here are a few of the services the Library provides: They bring the library to neighborhood schools and community centers with outreach programs. They are the only library in the state of Florida that provides a Lifelong Learning Institute. They provide over 4,000 free books to children during the summer camp reading programs. They offer meeting rooms (both large and small) for studying, lectures, programs and rentals. They offer innovative after school clubs that include Weird Science, Robotics and 3D printing. They offer a state of the art recording studio for children to create audio stories, record songs, and narrate books. They provide assistance in resume writing, job searching, and public assistance programs. They

provide a variety of new Technology Resources for children that include computers with educational programs, tablet kiosks, learning tech lab, and the interactive educational "cube". They provide dedicated librarians who support local businesses with information, research, and referrals. They offer after school homework help for children with friendly and knowledgeable staff and volunteers. They provide databases for learning languages, and reading ebooks, free of charge. They offer Ukulele Classes along with seasonal music programs including the Musical Matinee Program.

Project FACT (Fathers And Children Together)



Our program on June 16th was presented by Shamus Gordon, the Project Manager of Project Fact. Project FACT (Fathers And Children Together) is a grassroots and

community-based initiative developed and implemented through the Boys and Girls Club of Palm Beach County.

The program seeks to empower and mobilize fathers and father figures to become more engaged in their children's lives, improve fathers' parenting skills, and to improve the academic engagement of the children of fathers who actively participate in

the program. Services include weekly programs for boys and young men, monthly seminars and workshops for fathers, including group sessions covering mental health and family law services, yearly Fathers & Daughters Dinner & Dance, Bring Your Dad To School Day and FatherFest, an affirmation and celebration of fathers and their children!

Blood Pressure Control

70% of US adults age 65 or older have high blood pressure and only about half have it under control (less than 140/90 mmHg).

Blood pressure medicine (along with a healthy diet and exercise) can protect the heart, brain, and kidneys, but only if patients take it and keep their blood pressure controlled. However, at least 25% of adults, ages 65 or older, with Medicare Part D prescription drug insurance are not taking their blood pressure medicine as directed. This means they may skip doses or stop taking it altogether. Health care systems, including providers, medical practices, pharmacies, hospitals, community health workers, and insurers can work with patients to make taking medicine easier.

Medicines don't work if people don't take them.

The reasons people don't take their blood pressure medicine as directed vary:

1. Not filling the prescription – Nearly 25% of new prescriptions for blood pressure medicine are never filled.
2. No symptoms – People with high blood pressure often don't have symptoms so some may not treat a problem they don't notice.
3. Complexity – People don't know when to take which pills when they have multiple medicines.
4. Side effects – Medicines may have unwanted side effects.
5. Forgetting – People forget to take their medicine or refill prescriptions on time.
6. Cost – Medicine costs may be too high for some people.

Wage Dispute Project



Our program on June 23rd was presented by Natalie Staruschak, Esq., representing the Legal Aid Society of PBC.

All workers have a legal right to the wages they have earned. Legal Aid's Wage Dispute Project provides free legal services to employees who are owed wages due to non-payment or underpayment.

Wage theft" refers to the nonpayment or underpayment of wages. Wage theft occurs in situations where workers do not receive minimum wage or overtime wages; when employers cheat workers out of hours; force workers to work off the clock; fail to pay workers their final paycheck; misclassify employees as independent contractors to avoid paying minimum wage and overtime; or make impermissible deductions from their worker's paychecks.

Wage disputes typically occur in employment relationships where employees are paid hourly, by daily or weekly salary or by project. Disputes are prevalent in many of the low-wage service industries that make up the backbone of the South Florida economy, such as plant nurseries, hotels, restaurants, day labor, domestic work, and the retail industry. When employers get away with wage theft, it creates an unfair advantage over honest competitors and negatively impacts working standards for all employees in the community.

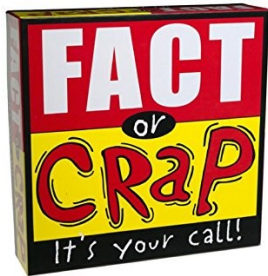

Healthy food for kids - Eating out with kids

Skip the fries. Instead, take along a bag of mini carrots, grapes, or other fruits and vegetables.

Watch portion size.

Stick to the children's menu or go for the smallest size. Order pizza by the slice—it will satisfy your child's craving without tempting overindulgence.

Order the kid's meal with substitutions. Children often love the kid's meal more for the toys than the food. Ask to substitute healthier choices for the soda and fries.

Opt for chicken and vegetables in a sit-down restaurant, rather than a big plate of macaroni and cheese.

Be wise about sides.

Sides that can quickly send calories soaring include fries, chips, rice, noodles, onion rings, and biscuits. Better bets are grilled vegetables, side salads, baked potato, corn on the cob, or apple slices.

Be smart about fat

Kids need healthy fats—and plenty of them—in their diet. Healthy fat helps kids fill up (and stay full), concentrate better, and improves their mood.

Healthy fats

Monounsaturated fats, from olive oil, avocados, nuts (like almonds, hazelnuts, and pecans), and seeds (such as pumpkin, sesame).

Polyunsaturated fats, including Omega-3 fatty acids, found in fatty fish, such as salmon, herring, mackerel, anchovies, and sardines, or in flaxseed and walnuts.

Unhealthy fats

Trans fats, are found in vegetable shortenings, some margarines, crackers, candies, cookies, snack foods, fried foods, baked goods, and other processed foods made with "partially hydrogenated" vegetable oils (even if they claim to be trans-fat-free). No amount of trans fat is safe.

June 3:

1621, the Dutch West India Co. received its charter for a trade monopoly in parts of the Americas and Africa.
 1937, Edward, The Duke of Windsor, who had abdicated the British throne, married Wallis Simpson in a private ceremony in Monts, France.
 1948, the 200-inch reflecting Hale Telescope at the Palomar Mountain Observatory in California was dedicated.
 1965, astronaut Edward H. White became the first American to "walk" in space during the flight of Gemini 4.
 2004, President George W. Bush announced the resignation of CIA Director George Tenet amid a controversy over intelligence lapses about suspected weapons of mass destruction in Iraq and the September 11 terrorist attacks.
 2010, BP sliced off a pipe with giant shears to make way for a cap in the latest bid to curtail the worst oil spill in U.S. history.
 2020, Prosecutors charged three more police officers in the death of George Floyd and filed a new, tougher charge of second-degree murder against Derek Chauvin, the officer who was caught on video pressing his knee to Floyd's neck. (Chauvin would be convicted on all charges.)

 1903, Ford Motor Co. was incorporated.
 1911, IBM had its beginnings as the Computing-Tabulating-Recording Co. which was incorporated in New York State.
 1933, The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. was founded as President Roosevelt signed the Banking Act of 1933.
 1959, actor George Reeves, TV's "Superman," was found dead of an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound in the bedroom of his Beverly Hills, California, home; he was 45.

1888, abolitionist Frederick Douglass received one vote from the Kentucky delegation at the Republican convention in Chicago, effectively making him the first Black candidate to have his name placed in nomination for U.S. president. (The nomination went to Benjamin Harrison.)
 1931, aviators Wiley Post and Harold Gatty took off from New York on a round-the-world flight that lasted eight days and 15 hours.
 1947, the Senate joined the House in overriding President Harry S. Truman's veto of the Taft-Hartley Act, designed to limit the power of organized labor.
 1972, President Richard Nixon signed Title IX barring discrimination on the basis of sex for "any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."
 1988, James E. Hansen, a climatologist at the Goddard Institute for Space Studies, told a Senate panel that global warming of the earth caused by the "greenhouse effect" was a reality.
 1993, in a case that drew widespread attention, Lorena Bobbitt of Prince William County, Va., sexually mutilated her husband, John, after he'd allegedly raped her.
 2016, Britain voted to leave the European Union after a bitterly divisive referendum campaign, topping Prime Minister David Cameron, who had led the campaign to keep Britain in the EU.

1865, eight people, including Mary Surratt and Dr. Samuel Mudd, were convicted by a military commission of conspiring with John Wilkes Booth, the assassin of President Abraham Lincoln. (Four defendants, including Surratt, were executed; Mudd was sentenced to life in prison, but was pardoned by President Andrew Johnson in 1869.)
 1934, Adolf Hitler launched his "blood purge" of political and military rivals in Germany in what came to be known as "The Night of the Long Knives."
 1958, the U.S. Senate passed the Alaska statehood bill by a vote of 64-20.
 1971, a Soviet space mission ended in tragedy when three cosmonauts aboard Soyuz 11 were found dead of asphyxiation inside their capsule after it had returned to Earth.
 2009, American soldier Pfc. Bowe R. Bergdahl went missing from his base in eastern Afghanistan, and was later confirmed to have been captured by insurgents. (Bergdahl was released on May 31, 2014 in exchange for five Taliban detainees.)
 2013, 19 elite firefighters known as members of the Granite Mountain Hotshots were killed battling a wildfire northwest of Phoenix after a change in wind direction pushed the flames back toward their position.
 2020, An international disaster relief organization reported the first confirmed case of COVID-19 among migrants in a tent encampment of asylum seekers at the U.S.-Mexico border.

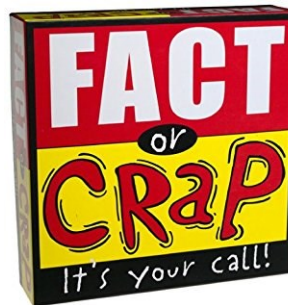
- Each horizontal row has every number only once.
