Horses & Handicapped Becomes "EATS"

(formerly known as Horses and the Handicapped of South Florida). Our club may be the first to refer to them with the new acronym of "EATS". Equine-Assisted Activities (EAA) are widely recognized as one of the most beneficial forms of recreational therapy that people with special needs can receive. EATS has been providing this therapy for almost 30 years, helping hundreds of riders improve their self-esteem and interaction with the world around them. Using all five senses as they ride, students process visual, auditory, and tactile information which leads to significantly improved muscle tone, strength, speech, balance, and coordination. The benefits of horseback riding are as numerous as the types of disabilities and conditions served. This therapy strengthens muscles and increases mobility while building self-confidence, self-awareness and a feeling of freedom and joy for the rider. Their facility offers the most effectiveequine assisted programs including therapeutic riding and hippotherapy. Patients in the Hippotherapy program perform physical therapy on a horse where the horse's movement works in tandem with the physical therapist to deliver stretching and strengthening exercises not easily replicated in a

Red wine and meat: a winning combination in the fight against heart disease.

Clinical research conducted at the Hebrew University revealed

that drinking a glass of red wine while having a meal with meat can prevent accumulation of oxidized cholesterol in the blood. While concerns have long been fo-

cused on total and "bad" cholesterol (low-density lipoproteins, or LDL), a major culprit is actually cholesterol/ LDL that has become oxidized – a source of damaging free radicals.

According to the researchers, natural components in red wine – known as polyphenols, particularly "resveratrol," found in red grape skins - prevent the oxidation of cholesterol released into the bloodstream after eating meat. Because there is a known link between LDL cholesterol and heart attacks, the combination between red wine and meat, according to the researchers, can be very effective in preventing heart attacks.

Why Donate Blood?

A blood donation truly is a "gift of life" that a healthy individual can give to others in their community who are sick or injured. In one hour's time, a person can donate one unit of blood that can be separated into four individual components that could help save multiple lives.

From one unit of blood, red blood cells can be extracted for use in trauma or surgical patients. Plasma, the liquid part of blood, is administered to patients with clotting problems. The third component of blood, platelets, clot the blood when cuts or other open wounds occur, and are often used in cancer and transplant patients. Cryoprecipitated anti-hemophilic factor (AHF) is also used for clotting factors.

In a recent study supported by the National Blood Foundation (*TRANSFUSION 2002;42:122S*), more than 5,000 individuals who were current blood donors at the time or who had given blood in the past were asked why they donate blood. Nearly three-quarters of the respondents said that they give blood to help others. Respondents also said that giving blood makes them feel good about themselves; supports their local communities and hospitals; supports their community culture; and "pays back" society for the times when they or their families have needed blood transfusions in the past.

Generally, you must be at least 16 years of age, a minimum of 110 pounds, and in basic good health. Blood donors are not paid. Blood supplies can vary depending on the region and time of year. As donor qualifications continue to become stricter and as the donor population ages, our nation is at risk of a low blood supply. If you are eligible, your blood donations are needed. Most blood centers strive to maintain an optimum inventory level of a three-day supply. Due to unpredictable demands from trauma incidents the inventory fluctuates hourly. When the blood supply drops below a three-day level, blood centers begin alerting local donors to increase the inventory to a safe operating level. There is no risk of contracting AIDS or any other disease through the donation process. Each collection kit is sterile, pre-packaged and used only once.

The body contains 10 to 12 pints of blood. Your whole blood donation is approximately one pint and doesn't take long to be replaced. The volume of fluids will adjust within a few hours of your donation. The red blood cells will be replaced within a few weeks.

You may donate whole blood once every 56 days, which allows plenty of time for your red cells to be replenished.

For all of these reasons and more, donating blood is a good idea. There are plenty of Blood Bank locations throughout Palm Beach County or just look for the donation buses as you drive around town.

International President's Message by Tom DeJulio, President of Kiwanis International

KIWANIS OBJECT 4

To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.

I recall my earliest understanding of the difference between contribution and commitment. It is called the "bacon and eggs" theory. The chicken makes a contribution while the pig makes the commitment. The fourth Object of Kiwanis requires our members to go beyond contributing to a cause or project. We are called upon to make a commitment to develop, by precept and example, a "more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship." This year, you will hear the word "growth" used less often than the words "membership development." Why? Numerical growth goals have not been successful in recent years because they place too much focus on numbers. Membership development, on the other hand, focuses on "impact"—the impact Kiwanians make in their communities and the impact on their own lives when making a difference whenever and wherever they serve. By active involvement with a Service Leadership club, Kiwanians impact young leaders through mentoring and by creating opportunities for them to become the next generation of serviceable citizens.

The fourth Object drives Kiwanis to be an "activist" organization, one whose members are quite vocal and aggressive in displaying their passion for the causes they serve. Kiwanians also display the fourth Object by educating themselves about the needs in their local and global communities. When was the last time your club leaders conducted a "community analysis," a critical directive that has been reinforced recently by mandatory Kiwanis training? Kiwanis International spends a considerable amount of time and dollars aggressively inviting new members to join our network. When we do, we are not just looking for more numbers on our rosters or more contributions to our cash accounts. Rather, we seek a personal "commitment" to impact more lives that will create a more serviceable citizenship.

Do a Google search on the words "serviceable citizenship," and you may be surprised to find that nearly all the initial entries are Kiwanis-related. Kiwanians have owned that description since the fourth Object was adopted in 1924, because they continue to channel their caring energies to perform transformational service in their communities. Service impact cannot always be easily measured. It is measured better by a qualitative commitment to the defining values described in the fourth Object.
