Our program on February 27th was presented by Roxanne Jacobs, the Executive Director of Grandma's Place, Inc.

Grandma's Place accepts physically and emotionally

compromised children from birth to 12-years-old who have been removed from their own homes because of abuse or neglect. They

contract with ChildNet to provide 24 hour/seven days a week, 365 days a year care, with wake staff around the clock for these children and assume responsibility for their safety and well being while in the program.

The agency provides shelter, food, clothing, as well as constant supervision, transportation, school supplies, personal items and incidentals for each child at their residential community in Royal Palm Beach. They make each child feel safe,

> comfortable and loved. Their professional staff works with the child's caseworker, guardian ad litem, therapists, and families toward a case plan for reunification. When

reunification isn't possible, they work with other agencies to assist with finding a suitable foster or adoptive For more information, go to www.grandmasplacepb.org.

Breaking The Cycle of Homlessness

Calvin Phillips, Director of Housing of the Lord's Place, presented the program on February 20th. For more than 30 years, The Lord's Place has continued to provide cutting edge services to the homeless population of EMPLOYMENT. Palm Beach County. Their continued commitment to the homeless community has changed the lives of countless men, women and children

who have gone on to be everything they ever dreamed they could be, and most importantly, selfsufficient.

The Lord's Place is a nonprofit, non-sectarian, 501(c)3 organization that has been changing the lives of homeless families and individuals in Palm Beach County for over 30-years. www.thelordsplace.org.

They are committed to breaking the cycle of homelessness with programs and services that include COMMUNITY **ENGAGEMENT, SUPPORTIVE** HOUSING and JOB TRAINING &

During the past year, they served over 1,565 men, women and children. By the end of the year, 92% were no longer homeless. This past year, they

also helped 133 formerly homeless men and women gain job skills and helped place 88 in jobs with local employers. Their success over the years is due Breaking the Cycle to an unwavering commitment of Homelessness to their clients and an approach that balances compassion and



5 ways to make a huge impact in 2019 without being a millionaire

When you think of people who outshine others at giving, chances are well-known philanthropists like Bill and Melinda Gates or Warren Buffet immediately come to mind. With their net worth well into the billions, it's easy to consider them among the people who are making the greatest impact.

Sure, the Gates and Buffet did top Forbes magazine's list of The 50 Biggest Givers over the years. However, charities couldn't survive if they only relied on donations from the super -rich. For example, much smaller donations by ordinary Americans totaled \$410 billion in 2018 - 78 times the amount given by the Bill Gates Foundation that same year. Wendy Smith points out that statistic in her book "Give a Little: How Your Small Donations Can Transform Our World", stressing that donations as small as US\$5 can change and save lives.

As 2019 gets underway, commit to making a huge impact in the lives of people around the world ... by starting off small. Here are 5 ideas to get you started.

- 1. Make it automatic. As we all know, good intentions can fade within a few weeks of us singing "Auld Lang Syne" after our New Year celebrations and resolutions. Many organizations, including Kiwanis, offer the option of donations in credit card installments.
- 2. Employer matching donations. Most of us are familiar with the concept of matching donations—when an employer makes a charitable gift equal to the amount donated by an employee. If your company does not have this option, ask your supervisor or human resources department to consider it as a benefit. It effectively doubles your charitable giving.
- 3. Friend matching donations. Why not implement the same concept with your friends and relatives? For example, if you donate US\$10, US\$25 or US\$50 monthly to The Eliminate Project, imagine the additional impact you can have by asking 10 of your friends to match that amount. Your US\$10 monthly donation amounts to US\$1,200, while a US\$50 monthly donation can generate US\$6,000—enough to save or protect the lives of nearly 3,500 women and children susceptible to tetanus.
- 4. Pair charitable giving with another New Year's goal. If you're planning to shed a few pounds or give up in smoking in 2019, devote the funds you normally would spend on sweets, fast food or cigarettes to your favorite charity.
- 5. Make a plan. Just like anything else, you may not accomplish your charitable giving goals without a strategy. ng of the year, commit an hour to studying the causes you are committed to supporting. Once you understand the "why" behind your donation, you'll likely be more committed to making a difference—and encouraging others to do the same.

Don't skip breakfast

Not hungry first thing in the morning? Pushed for time? Trying to lose weight? There are many

calorie-counted treats that will tempt you to rediscover the pleasure of breakfast. From energy-boosting "apple pie" porridge and protein-packed scrambled eggs, to a nutrient-rich green smoothie and granola bars, there's something for everyone.

"Creating the habit of eating in the morning is something you can build towards," says dietitian Alison Hornby. "Start off with a light bite, such as a piece of fruit or a low-fat yoghurt. "After a while, your morning appetite will naturally increase and you'll probably find you eat less throughout the day, including snacks."

Research suggests people who eat breakfast are slimmer because they tend to eat less during the day, especially high-calorie snacks. If you're short on time in the morning, think about ways of gaining time by keeping your breakfast choice simple, either by waking up 10 minutes earlier or getting other chores out of the way ahead of time.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

Don't Fall for Scam Calls and Emails Posing as IRS

Scammers and cyberthieves continue to use the IRS as bait. The most common tax scams are phone calls and emails from thieves who pretend to be from the IRS. Scammers use the IRS name, logo, fake employee names and badge numbers to try to steal money and identities from taxpayers.

Taxpayers need to be wary of phone calls or automated messages from someone who claims to be from the IRS. Often, these criminals will say taxpayers owe money and demand payment right away. Other times, scammers will lie to taxpayers and say they're due a refund. The thieves ask for bank account information over the phone. The IRS warns taxpayers not to fall for these scams.

Below are several tips that will help filers avoid becoming a scam victim.

IRS employees will not:

- Call demanding an immediate payment. The IRS won't call taxpayers if they owe taxes without first sending a bill in the mail. Demand payment without allowing taxpayers to question or appeal the amount owed. Demand that taxpayers pay their taxes in a specific way, such as with a prepaid debit card. Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Threaten to contact local police or similar agencies to arrest taxpayers for non-payment of taxes.

- Threaten legal action, such as a lawsuit.

If taxpayers don't owe or don't think they owe any tax, and they receive an inquiry like this, they should:

Contact the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration. Use TIGTA's "IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting" web page to report the incident.

Report the incident to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the "FTC Complaint Assistant" on FTC.gov. Add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments of your report.



In most cases, an IRS phishing scam is an unsolicited, fake email that claims to come from the IRS. Some emails link to sham websites that look real. The scammers' goal is to lure victims to give up their personal and financial information. If the thieves get what they're after, they use it to steal a victim's money and identity.

For those taxpayers who get a phishing email, the IRS offers this advice:

Don't reply to the message.

Don't give out your personal or financial information.

Forward the email to phishing@irs.gov. Then delete it.

Don't open any attachments or click on any links. They may have malicious code that will infect your computer.

February 7:

1795 the 11th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, dealing with states' sovereign immunity, was ratified. 1817 America's first public gas street lamp was lighted

in Baltimore at the corner of Market and Lemon streets (now East Baltimore and

1904 a fire began in Baltimore that raged for about 30 hours and destroyed more than 1,500 buildings.

1962 President John F. Kennedy imposed a full trade embargo on Cuba.

1964 The Beatles arrived at New York's John F. Kennedy International Airport to begin their first American tour.

1971 women in Switzerland gained the right to vote through a national referendum, 12 years after a previous attempt failed.

1984 space shuttle Challenger astronauts Bruce McCandless II and Robert L. Stewart went on the first untethered spacewalk, which lasted nearly six hours. 1986 Haitian President-for-Life Jean-Claude Duvalier (doo-VAHL-yay') fled his country, ending 28 years of his family's rule.

2009 A miles-wide section of ice in Lake Erie broke away from the Ohio shoreline, trapping about 135 fishermen, some for as long as four hours before they could be rescued (one man fell into the water and later died of an apparent heart attack).

2009 A \$787 billion stimulus bill aimed at easing the worst economic crisis in decades cleared both houses of Congress.

2013 beginning a long farewell to his flock, a weary Pope Benedict XVI celebrated his final public Mass as pontiff, presiding over Ash Wednesday services inside St. Peter's Basilica at the Vatican.

2017 President Donald Trump's embattled national security adviser, Michael Flynn, resigned following reports he had misled Vice President Mike Pence and other officials about his contacts with Russia.

2017 President Donald Trump's personal attorney, Michael Cohen, said he had paid \$130,000 out of his own pocket to a porn actress who claimed to have had a sexual relationship with Trump
