## 100 Years of Local Surfing History

On March 12th, we had a program on the surfing history in Delray Beach, presented by Tom Warnke.

Tom says it was a "revelation" when he began surfing in 1956 after his family moved to Boynton Beach, Florida. "I was 8 when I rode my first waves on an

inflatable mat. Nearby Delray Beach had a good surfing spot at the end of Atlantic Avenue. I could rent a board from Delray Bicycle & Sporting Goods for an entire day with a coupon in the Sunday paper for \$1.25. They sold some of their rental boards, which is how I bought my first one."

Warnke is a lifelong surfer but more than anything, he's an organizer. His life's devotion is to surfing, the sport and the lifestyle. Never short of new projects, Warnke

has seemingly found time for impacting the lives of thousands of East Coast surfers. From contest organizer to 40 years as an ESA District Director to Executive Director of the Palm Beach County Surfing History Project to his time in the development of the first Florida Surfrider Foundation Chapter, Warnke's influence on East Coast Surfing runs deep.

Warnke is Executive Director of the Palm Beach County Surfing History Project (PBCSHP), which manages the Surfing Florida Museum's collection and exhibits. Warnke is committed to preserving the history, culture, memorabilia and future of East Coast surfing, mainly focusing on the State of Florida.

## Board Meeting Notes

Our club's recent Board Meeting took place via Zoom on February 3rd. Here are some notes:

**I. Board Attendance:** President David Freeburn; Secretary Jay Alperin, Treasurer Bill Morse. Directors: Kelleher, Davidson, Pam; Krieg,

Davidson, Joel; Sablo, Devoe, Laseter

**II. Foundation Attendance :** President Freeburn, Vice-President Pollack; Directors: Colonna, Youngberg, PDavidson.

**III. Secretary's Report:** Motion to Approve minutes of January 6, 2025 meeting. Motion made by: Bill Morse, Seconded by: Joel Davidson. Motion Passed (Ezra Krieg opposed)

**IV. Financial Report:** Bill Morse reported that the club has approximately \$27,000 in the bank. He is up to the point of reconciling both accounts to determine separate balances for the club and the foundation. Jay Alperin stated that they working on putting a budget together as well as a calendar of events.

### V. Old Business

A. Additional Shoe Drive for Jacob's Shoes - There was a discussion regarding the timing of another used shoe collection—this time it would be expanded to include shoes other than athletic shoes. The consensus was to move forward with another collection as soon as possible.

B. Real Men Bake - Peggy Kelleher reported that the final amount raised from the Real Men Bake event was not yet determined due to the Women's Club treasurer being ill. Peggy suggested that Kiwanis work closely with the Women's Club and perhaps become a full partner on the next event. They are hoping to find a better location.

C. Putt Putt Golf ReCap - Rich Pollack stated that \$1700 had been raised by this event. He asked Reeve Bright what happened to the Luna Rosa gift cards that hadn't been used. He would like to use them for the club or auction them off at an upcoming event. Reeve said he wasn't sure how many he had left but would bring whatever he has to the next club meeting.

D. Pine Grove School - Pam Davidson said Pine Grove was interested in funds for a big party for the school, which is not within the scope or budget of our club. She will speak to them again about setting up a Terrific Kids program similar to the one at Orchard View Elementary. Peggy noted it would cost about \$350 total for medals, prizes, etc. Rich Pollack questioned why we would take on another school when we are already working with Orchard View. Other members feel it's appropriate to replicate the program, and that we have the capacity to do both.

E. Additional Club Sign for Delray Affair - April 4 thru 6. - The second sign has not been located—a new sign will cost around \$120.00. Motion to allocate funds to buy a new sign for the club. Motion made by: Pam Davidson. Seconded by: Joel Davidson. Motion passed unanimously.

F. IHOP Pancake Day - Joel reported that Delray Kiwanis will be well represented with sixteen club members scheduled to participate.

G. Legal Questions on Story Trail Agreement with City - The necessary changes have been made to the agreement, however the City insists on referring to the Kiwanis contribution as a donation. The club's name

on Sun Biz has to be corrected—that should be completed in the next few days. Joel stated that the original cost estimate was around \$8,700. Due to delays in getting the agreement finalized, the City has to re-bid the job and costs may increase. Any increase will be absorbed by the City.

H. Golf Tournament - input from Linda Brown - Scott Youngberg has been in touch with Linda Brown and they have set the date and location. The tournament will be on October 18, 2025 at the Indian Springs Country Club. Scott is finalizing a flyer that will contain the necessary information.

I. T-Shirts - Scott will send out another email to gauge how many members will want to order T-shirts. The price of each will depend upon the quantity ordered.

J. Happy Hour, and Pancakes, Pints, and Pigskins event - Peggy stated that Happy Hour will be on Tuesday March 11 from 5-7 at Tim Finnegan's. There was nothing to report as of now on the Pancakes, Pints and Pigskins event.

K. Mistletoe Event - Tom Carney will be attending a conference that will provide him an opportunity to speak with a representative of the Guinness World Record organization. Tom will ask if the participation fee of \$16,000 can be reduced.

L. Fundraising Committee - David Freeburn will be sending an email to members requesting a summary of their fundraising ideas.

M. Police Appreciation - April 9th - Ezra reported that things were moving along with this event - a winner had been chosen. This is a good opportunity to showcase Delray Kiwanis, and members are encouraged to bring guests. Scott asked that the board authorize \$100 towards the cost of a new plaque. Motion to authorize funds to purchase a plaque for the Police Appreciation event. Motion made by: Ezra Krieg. Seconded by: Peggy Kelleher. Motion passed unanimously.

N. Club Position Nominations - Scott reported that the position of president was still open—people have been nominated but they've declined. He will send out another email seeking volunteers. Bob Barcinski and Doug Martin have both informed him they are resigning from the board while Reeve Bright and Larry Schroeder will be coming on.

O. Joel had previously suggested that the incoming officers of Key Club be invited to a Delray Kiwanis meeting during their spring break (March 24 - 28). David will touch base with Bob Hayes on this.

### VI. New Business

A. District Convention Service Project (Meal Packing) - Pam described how the program works to provide shelf stable meals to children and families in need. The meals will be packed at the district convention in Palm Beach County. Volunteers package food for distribution through churches and other organizations. Delray Kiwanis can apply for a grant to put toward this program. Motion to apply for Foundation grant to put towards the District Convention Service Project. Motion made by Ezra Krieg. Seconded by Jay Alperin. Motion passed unanimously.

B. Mini grant request - Rich reported that no applications had come in but he was expecting to receive one from the library for their Trivia Night event.

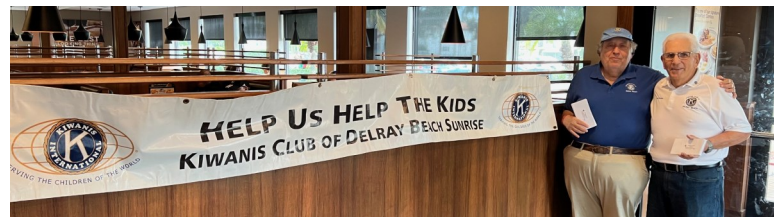

## DID YOU KNOW?

### What Did People Use Before Toothbrushes?

Since the fourth millennium BCE, when urban civilizations first appeared in ancient Mesopotamia, humans have strived to achieve proper dental hygiene. Yet the nylon-bristled toothbrush we use today didn't come along until the 1930s. For the thousands of years in between, people relied on rudimentary tools that evolved with scientific knowledge and technological advancements over time. Some of the earliest toothbrush predecessors date as far back as 3500 BCE. Here's a look at how people kept their teeth clean before the modern toothbrush.

#### Chew Sticks and Toothpicks

Sometime around the year 3500 BCE, the ancient Babylonians (located near modern-day Iraq) created a tool known as a "chew stick." This simple, handheld piece of wood is considered the earliest known direct predecessor to the toothbrushes we use today. Chew sticks were simple wooden twigs cut to approximately 5 or 6 inches long. One end of the stick was then softened in boiling liquid to help separate the fibers, creating an almost brushlike effect. Individuals would chew on these sticks to freshen their mouths, as the frayed fibers would slide between the teeth and help loosen debris. Many early Arab cultures used a specific shrub called *Salvadora persica* (also known as the "toothbrush tree") to create their chew sticks, which they called miswak. The shrub was particularly aromatic in nature and thought to have a stronger mouth-freshening effect than other plants.

Around this same time, civilizations in Mesopotamia, Egypt, and elsewhere in the ancient world also used early versions of a toothpick to keep their teeth clean. These were often made of thin pieces of wood, though in later years, wealthy individuals began crafting toothpicks from brass and silver for added opulence and durability. In ancient Greece, toothpicks were known as *karpheos*, roughly meaning "blade of straw," suggesting the Greeks may have used coarse fibers such as straw in addition to wood.

#### The First Hog's Hair Toothbrush

The world of dental hygiene was forever changed thanks to the ingenuity of ancient China. During the Tang dynasty (618 to 907 CE), coarse hair fibers from the back of a hog's neck were attached to a handle made of bamboo or bone, creating an early handheld toothbrushing device. Centuries later in 1498, Emperor Hongzhi of the Ming dynasty formally patented this hog's hair toothbrush. For the next several centuries, artisan toothbrush makers around the world drew inspiration from ancient China and continued to heavily rely on coarse boar's hair. In fact, toothbrush bristles didn't see another major change until the middle of the 20th century.

### **Myth-busting federal tax refunds**

Many taxpayers file their federal tax returns and then eagerly anticipate details about their refund.

The best way to check the status of a refund is through the Where's My Refund? tool, the IRS2Go app, or by signing in to the taxpayer's IRS Online Account.- But many people mistakenly think there are better ways to get their refund status. Here are some of the myths about tax refunds.

**Myth: Calling the IRS, a tax software provider or a tax professional will provide a more accurate refund date.**

Many people think talking to the IRS, tax software provider or their tax professional is the best way to find out when they will get their refund. There is no need to call the IRS unless Where's My Refund? says to do so.

Taxpayers that do want refund info by phone can call the automated refund hotline at 800-829-1954. This hotline has the same information as the Where's My Refund? tool.

**Myth: Ordering a tax transcript is a secret way to get a refund date.**

A tax transcript will not help taxpayers find out when they will get their refund. IRS tools like Where's My Refund? will tell taxpayers if their refund is approved and sent.

**Myth: Where's My Refund? must be wrong because there's no deposit date yet.**

Where's My Refund? on both IRS.gov and the IRS2Go mobile app are updated once a day, usually at night. Even though the IRS issues most refunds within 21 days, it's possible a refund may take longer. Taxpayers should also consider the time it takes for the banks to post the refund to their account. People waiting for a refund in the mail should plan for the time it takes a check to arrive. If the IRS needs more information to process a tax return, the agency will contact the taxpayer by mail.

**Myth: Where's My Refund? must be wrong because the refund amount is less than expected**

There are several factors that could cause a tax refund to be less than expected. The IRS will mail the taxpayer a letter of explanation if any adjustments are made. Some taxpayers may also receive a letter from the Department of Treasury's Bureau of the Fiscal Service if their refund was reduced to offset certain financial obligations. Before calling, check Where's My Refund or wait for the letter to understand why the change was made. The letter will also tell the taxpayers know how to respond, if they need to.

**Myth: Getting a refund this year means there's no need to adjust withholding for 2025.**

To help avoid a surprise next year, taxpayers should make changes now to prepare for next year. One way to do this is to adjust their tax withholding with their employer. The IRS Tax Withholding Estimator tool can help taxpayers determine if their employer is withholding the right amount.

Taxpayers who experience a life event like marriage, divorce, the birth or adoption of a child or no longer being able to claim a person as a dependent are encouraged to check their withholding. Taxpayers can use the results from the Tax Withholding Estimator to complete and submit a new Form W-4, Employee's Withholding Certificate, to their employer as soon as possible. Withholding takes place throughout the year, so it's better to take this step now.

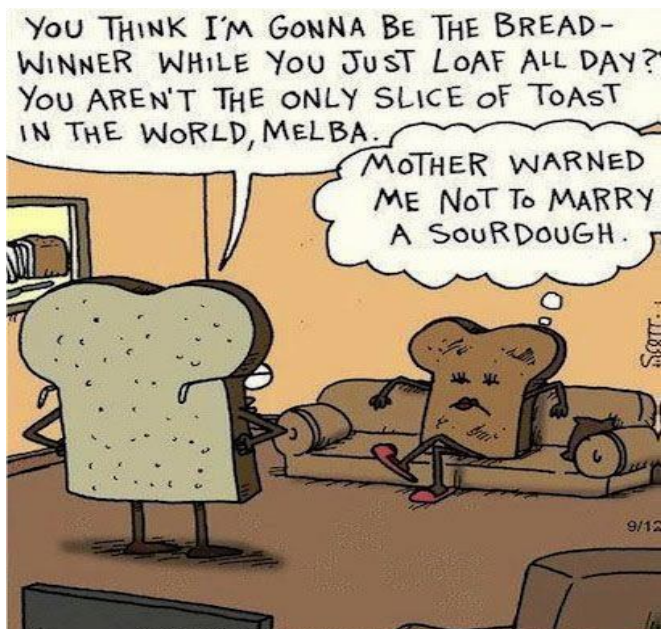

### Tips for Making Cleaning Your Closet Easier

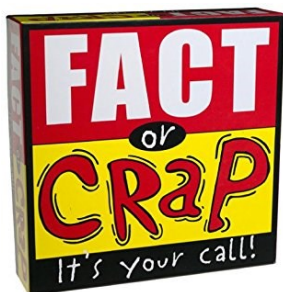
There's something satisfying about cleaning out your closet, especially at this time of year. Here are some tips on how to make spring cleaning your closet a little easier.

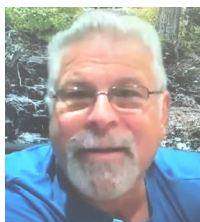

## Krieg's Korner

As a regular feature of our weekly meetings, **Ezra Krieg** brings us up to date with what happened on "This Date in History" Here are a few interesting items from the past month:



### March 5:

1770, the Boston Massacre took place as British soldiers who'd been taunted by a crowd of colonists opened fire, killing five people.  
1933, in German parliamentary elections, the Nazi Party won 44 percent of the vote; the Nazis joined with a conservative nationalist party to gain a slender majority in the Reichstag.  
1946, Winston Churchill delivered his "Iron Curtain" speech at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri, in which he said: "From Stettin in the Baltic, to Trieste in the Adriatic, an 'iron curtain' has descended across the continent, allowing police governments to rule Eastern Europe."  
1963, country music performers Patsy Cline, Cowboy Copas and Hawkshaw Hawkins died in the crash of their plane, a Piper Comanche, near Camden, Tennessee, along with pilot Randy Hughes (Cline's manager).  
1970, the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons went into effect after 43 nations ratified it.  
1998, NASA scientists said enough water was frozen in the loose soil of the moon to support a lunar base and perhaps, one day, a human colony.  
2004, Martha Stewart was convicted in New York of obstructing justice and lying to the government about why she'd unloaded her Imclone stock just before the price plummeted; her ex-stockbroker, Peter Bacanovic, also was found guilty in the stock scandal. (Each later received a five-month prison sentence.)  
2021, California relaxed guidelines for reopening outdoor venues, clearing the way for fans to attend opening-day baseball games and return to Disneyland nearly a year after coronavirus restrictions shut down major entertainment spots.  
2022, a promised cease-fire in the Ukrainian port city of Mariupol collapsed amid scenes of terror in the besieged town. The number of people fleeing the country reached 1.4 million just 10 days after Russian forces invaded.

### March 12:

1912, the Girl Scouts of the USA had its beginnings as Juliette Gordon Low of Savannah, Georgia, founded the first American troop of the Girl Guides.  
1928, the St. Francis Dam north of Los Angeles, California failed, sending over 12 billion gallons of water into San Francisco Canyon and killing over 400 people.  
1930, Mohandas Gandhi began his 24-day, 240 mile (387 kilometer) "Salt March" to the Indian village of Dandi (then called Navsari) as an act of non-violent civil disobedience to protest the salt tax levied by colonial Britain.  
1933, President Franklin D. Roosevelt delivered the first of his "fireside chats," a series of evening radio broadcasts to the American public.  
1947, President Harry S. Truman announced what became known as the "Truman Doctrine" to help Greece and Turkey resist Communism during the Cold War.  
1980, a Chicago jury found John Wayne Gacy Jr. guilty of the murders of 33 men and boys. (The next day, Gacy was sentenced to death; he was executed in May 1994.)  
2003, Elizabeth Smart, the 15-year-old girl who vanished from her bedroom nine months earlier, was found alive in a Salt Lake City suburb with two drifters, Brian David Mitchell and Wanda Barzee. (Mitchell is serving a life sentence for kidnapping Smart; Barzee was released from prison in September 2018.)  
2009, disgraced financier Bernard Madoff pleaded guilty in New York to the largest Ponzi scheme in history, having defrauded his clients of nearly \$65 billion; he would later be sentenced to 150 years behind bars. (Madoff died in prison in April 2021.)  
2021, the city of Minneapolis agreed to pay \$27 million to settle a civil lawsuit from George Floyd's family over Floyd's murder by police.

### March 19:

1931, Nevada Gov. Fred B. Balzar signed a measure that made the state the first to legalize gambling.  
1953, the 25th Academy Awards ceremony was the first to be televised; "The Greatest Show on Earth" would win the Oscar for Best Picture.  
1965, archeologist E. Lee Spence discovered the wreckage of the SS Georgiana, a Confederate ship that had sunk near Charleston, South Carolina, exactly 102 years earlier.  
1966, Texas Western (now the University of Texas at El Paso) became the first team to start five Black players in the NCAA basketball tournament's championship game; they defeated top-ranked Kentucky in the final, 72-65.  
1995, 17 months after announcing his retirement from basketball, Michael Jordan returned to play in the NBA with his former team, the Chicago Bulls. (He would go on to win three more NBA championships alongside the three he and the Bulls had already won.)  
2003, in a televised address, President George W. Bush announced that coalition forces had begun an invasion of Iraq. (Bush would declare victory just over five weeks later in his "Mission Accomplished" speech.)

### March 26:

1812, an earthquake devastated Caracas, Venezuela, causing as many as 30,000 deaths. (The U.S. Congress later approved \$50,000 in food aid to be sent to Venezuela—the first example of American disaster assistance abroad.)  
1917, the Seattle Metropolitans became the first American ice hockey team to win the Stanley Cup, defeating the Montreal Canadiens 9-1 to win the championship series, three games to one.  
1979, a peace treaty was signed by Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and witnessed by President Jimmy Carter at the White House.  
1992, a judge in Indianapolis sentenced former heavyweight boxing champion Mike Tyson to six years in prison on rape charges. (Tyson would ultimately serve less than three years of the sentence.)  
2018, a toxicology report obtained by The Associated Press revealed that the late pop superstar Prince had levels of fentanyl in his body that multiple experts described as "exceedingly high."  
2021, Dominion Voting Systems filed a \$1.6 billion defamation lawsuit against Fox News, saying the cable news giant falsely claimed that the voting company rigged the 2020 election. (Fox would eventually agree to pay Dominion \$787.5 million in one of the largest defamation settlements in U.S. history.)  
2024, Baltimore's Francis Scott Key Bridge collapsed after being struck by a container ship, killing six maintenance workers on the bridge.

## A Montana Kiwanis club turns trash into reading treasure.

"Education and literacy" is one of the three Kiwanis causes, and the Silver Bow, Butte, Kiwanis Club in Montana, U.S., found a creative way to bring kids and books together — while helping the environment.

It started when Kiwanis International Trustee Cathy Tutty, a member of the club, purchased a house that came with an unwanted leftover: an old, nonfunctioning refrigerator taking up valuable space in the garage.

"I thought, 'What can we do with it?'" says Tutty. "I didn't want to just take it to the landfill."

Doug Ingraham, a fellow club member who works at an asbestos abatement business, volunteered to remove the refrigerator's freon if a purpose could be found for the appliance. Tutty had an idea: Transform the refrigerator into a freestanding "book box" — and place it in her front yard.

After the freon and the refrigerator's seal were removed, club members painted the refrigerator in "Kiwanis blue." Then Tutty visited the elementary school just two blocks from her home and asked the librarian whether any of the students would be willing to help personalize the former fridge.

"There were four groups of them," Tutty says. "We got some nontoxic paint, and they put all these different-colored handprints on it."

The school also happened to be getting a number of new books for the library and donated the older books to Tutty for the box. And when another refrigerator became available from a neighbor's estate, she decided to create a second book box for a local affordable-housing apartment complex.

### **Partnership power**

At the time, the Montana District of Circle K International (the Kiwanis service program for college and university students) was in Butte, holding its annual Fall Rally. The CKI members took on fridge-painting duties as a service project. Now the box is available 24/7 outside the apartment complex office.

"All of that got Doug thinking, 'We've got to figure out a way to get books,'" Tutty says.

At the time, Scholastic — a large publishing and education company — was awarding one "book desert" grant to each state in the U.S., with a goal of expanding children's access to reading material. Ingraham applied and received the grant for Montana, gaining access to 1,000 books and an official Little Free Library. He placed that library halfway between a high school and an affordable-housing community.

Tutty occasionally supplements the book supply with additional purchases from Scholastic.

"Every so often, I'll buy US\$300 worth of books when they have a special going on," she says, "because you get 20 free books for every \$150 you spend. So then I end up with 40 more books."

As for the box in Tutty's front yard, she also stocks it with fruit snacks and small bubble blowers in the summer and sports drinks when the weather is cool — adding incentives for kids to stop by and grab a book.

"It's fun," she says. "People say, 'You have a refrigerator in your yard?'"
