Recognizing the urgency and the confusion, Barbara tried to assist further and walked with the citizen outside to show her the Court House. Still having some confusion, Neila

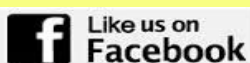

Delray's Golf Course



Our program on October 8th was presented by Misuse Barletto, Public Works Director, City of Delray Beach. Missy brought us up to date on the planned renovations of the Delray Beach Golf Course and club house.

The golf course is an important component of the City's Parks and Recreation Department and a valuable

community amenity, providing programs for families, juniors and seasoned golfers for the past 90 years. The goal of the renovation is to restore and preserve the golf course in a manner that is in step with the vision of its original architects, Donald Ross and Dick Wilson, while modernizing the course to meet today's standards.

Schedule: Golf Course will be closed for renovations beginning November 3rd, 2025. Course is expected to reopen in November 2026. Driving Range will remain open on a limited basis until mid-November 2025. New practice facilities expected to reopen in November 2026. Clubhouse will remain open through December 2025. The clubhouse will be renovated while the golf course is under construction and is expected to reopen in November 2026.

Luckson Pierre

Officer Luckson Pierre is being recognized today not for one, but for two separate cases. One involving purse snatching, and the other cyber stalking.

Back in May, Officer Pierre responded to the Fairfield Hotel and made contact with a Haitian female victim whose purse was snatched and the suspect ran from the location. Officer Pierre, a week later, again responded to a call at 399 S Swinton Ave, regarding another Haitian female victim whose purse was also snatched and the suspect fled the area.

Officer Pierre collected as much information as he could based on what the victims could remember. He began to investigate the incidents and based on physical descriptions, narrowed it down to the same possible suspect committing both crimes.

Though both cases were assigned to the Detective Bureau, Officer Pierre did not let that stop him from doing some extra leg work. He went out and canvassed the areas for cameras. He located several cameras, one of which captured the possible suspect from the Fairfield Hotel, running through an open field, holding on to the victim's purse. An ID was later made of the possible suspect who is a known prolific offender in the city. Officer Pierre also provided translation for another robbery which occurred at 800 SW 6th Ave where he again canvassed the area for cameras and witnesses.

Officer Pierre was dedicated to working those cases and provided a great help to the detective bureau.

In addition, in August, Officer Pierre responded to a suspicious incident call at the Delray Beach library. The victim alleged that the suspect (Emmanuel Ngalamou) had been sending her concerning emails. The victim was in a Facebook group with the suspect who then started to contact her via email. The victim blocked Ngalamou's email, but he kept using other email accounts to contact her. The victim currently lives in Houston and Ngalamou is a vagrant in Florida.

Officer Pierre reviewed several of the emails which detailed how Ngalamou heard voices in his head and experienced visions about abusing narcotics and having rape fantasies. Officer Pierre met with Ngalamou at the

library and admitted he did write these emails to the victim.

Based on his statements Officer Pierre placed Ngalamou under a Baker Act and transported him to the South County Mental Health Facility.

Officer Pierre diligently followed up with the victim who advised that the emails were still coming in and increased in both volume and disturbing content.

On August 24th, Officer Pierre conducted a sworn recorded interview with the victim using Facetime. The victim expressed the behavior by Ngalamou was disrupting her life and causing her unnecessary stress and anxiety, which included taking time off work and seeking professional mental health counseling. The victim had asked Ngalamou several times to stop emailing her, but he did not.

The victim had received over 200 emails from Ngalamou, which included pictures of himself professing his love for her and detailing how he could travel to her as he had stolen a credit card, while continuing to talk about rape fantasies. The suspect also sent the victim pictures from her social media accounts saying how he knew what she looked like. The victim perceived these as threats.

Three days later, the victim was still receiving emails from Ngalamou. Officer Pierre developed probable cause for Aggravated stalking for Ngalamou. Officer Pierre then located Ngalamou in the Delray Beach Library, where he was arrested. Officer Pierre made sure to follow up with the victim which lead to the discovery of more emails.

Officer Pierre's diligence in conducting a thorough investigation and the compassion shown for the victim is a prime example of how Delray's officers set the P A C E. (PACE stands for Professional, Accountable, Consistent and Engaged).

I. Board Attendance: President Diane Colonna, Secretary Alperin, Treasurer Bill Morse. Directors: Kelleher, PDavidson, J Davidson, Freeburn, Sablo.

II. Foundation Attendance : Vice-President

Pollack; Treasurer Morse, Secretary Alperin, Directors: Youngberg, PDavidson.

III. Secretary's Report: Motion to approve Minutes of Sept 8, 2025 meeting: Motion made by Jay Alperin, seconded by Joel Davidson. Motion approved.

IV. Old Business:

- A. Story Trail update – Joel is working with Amy Hanson of the City's Parks Dept. Stanchions should arrive in one month. They need to decide what goes on first and last stanchions: Kiwanis and City Logos?
- B. Pancakes, Pints, and Pigskins event update, November 16, \$40 per person. Peggy is working with Finnegan's. Sponsorships are available from \$100 to \$1,000. They have a \$100 and a \$1,000 so far.
- C. Alternate meeting location agreement (December - Fairfield Inn) - (Ronnie/Ezra) Dependent on golf course closure.
- D. Golf Tournament Update - Indian Springs Country Club - Oct 18, 1 PM tee off. - (Scott) 64 players so far, so we met minimum. Coolers will be at meeting Wednesday. Still need sponsors. We need two volunteers to cover "Hole in One" and drinks.
- E. Delray Beach 250th US Birthday Celebration – Peggy to meet with City Manager Terrence Moore to make arrangements for an activity that Kiwanis can be involved in.
- F. "Eat Better Live Better" Food Drive - (Rich/Mike Salem) The nonprofit is losing its federal funding. They are starting a "Fill a bag" initiative. Checks will be acceptable (KCoDBF) and there will be a list of

recommended items to donate. Rich will bring in bags for our use. G. Paper Towel Drive – Rich is looking into a Green Market project "Tossing Towels" for Schools. It would be a good activity to get Key Club members involved, and would raise awareness about Kiwanis.

V. New Business:

- A. Mini Grant Requests – Rich Motioned to give \$250 for Carver Middle School project "Living Skills in Schools" Second by Bill, Approved.
- B. Annual Gift to the Board – Joel asked that the board approve the annual \$250 donation to the Kiwanis International foundation. Motion to approve a \$250 gift made by Joel, seconded by Bill and approved.
- C. Charter Night - (Peggy) After some discussion regarding a possible date and location for the event it was decided to swear in new board members at Wednesday's regular breakfast meeting. It was also suggested that the Holiday Party be held at Ezra's since he was not present to object!
- D. Thanksgiving meal distribution update – Make checks out to Kiwanis Club of Delray Beach Foundation, \$40 per meal sponsored. Key Clubbers will be helping with distribution.
- E. Florida Kiwanis Foundation, Joel moved \$250 annual donation for 2025-2026. Second by Bill. Approved. It averages out to be about \$8 per member and we are asking for \$250 donation back to us for AVDA support.
- F. A discussion followed, about the mechanics of funding from IRAs (retirement accounts) through RMD as Qualified Tax Exclusions. A thorough explanation will be written by Peggy then distributed to the entire club by Scott.
- G. The Atlantic High School Key Club, advised by Ms., Laughton meets the first Tuesday of the month. We need time and location. They are planning to renew their dues. Their next meeting is on November fourth.

DID YOU KNOW?

Club vs. Foundation

Our program on October 29th was presented by Rich Pollack, Jay Alperin, Bill Morse and Peggy Kelleher. The topic was the structure of our Kiwanis Club. We essentially are comprised of two entities: the Club itself and the Club Foundation (The charitable arm of the club).

Here are some bullet points:

Bill and Jay – Structure

- Club has two bank accounts, club & foundation.
- What goes into club account, what comes out
- What goes into foundation account and what comes out
- Club money can go to foundation, foundation can't go to club
- Example of club money includes administrative club fees, Member dues, Happy Dollars, 50/50.
- Example of Foundation money includes money raised through fund raisers, contributions received and distributions to other charities. Our Foundation is a 501(c)3 organization.

Rich – Foundation Giving

- Foundation guidelines – 501 c3, children and families are priority
- Small donations to community, quick response
- Larger "legacy" donations – Scholarships, Achievement Centers from Golf, Thanksgiving, Orchard View.
- We offer Mini grants – mostly focused on kids.

Examples:

Library for children's programming, Chamber Education Fund, Hilltoppers, Holiday gifts for children with fathers or mothers in prison, Diaper bank, Teen history project at Spady, Drug prevention education at Carver Middle. Interfaith Council, Others: we also support Florida Kiwanis Foundation, Board member donations to specific causes.

Peggy – Donations and Tax Advantages

- Qualified Charitable Contributions – Can go to Most 501 c 3 organizations.
- RMD - Designate our club as recipient of proceeds from your IRA's required mandatory distribution.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

CUT DOWN ON UNWANTED CALLS

If you feel like you get more than your share of unwanted calls, you're not alone. To slow down these persistent calls — some of which lead straight to scams— take a few simple steps.

- Subscribe to the Florida Do Not Call list. If you think you have subscribed in the past, verify your subscription.

- Register your phone number for free in the National Do Not Call Registry. Registering will

likely cut down how many unwanted calls you get. Unfortunately, it won't stop calls from scammers to your home and mobile phone — and there are still organizations and groups allowed to call you.

- Hang up on robocalls. Getting a lot of recorded messages trying to sell you something? Odds are the calls are not legal. Don't press any numbers or call back. Instead, hang up and report them at DoNotCall.gov.

- File a complaint to report unsolicited communications with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services at File a complaint.

- Use your phone's built-in features. Many cell phones have settings that let you block calls from specific numbers or send certain calls straight to voicemail, especially if they come from a phone number you don't recognize.

- Check call-blocking or call-labeling services. Find out what your phone company offers by contacting their customer service using a phone number or website you know is right. Watch a short video to help you block unwanted calls on your cell phone or home phone.

- Research apps to filter calls before downloading. Some call-blocking apps are free, while others charge. At ctia.org, you can see wireless industry lists of call-blocking apps. See what independent experts are saying and check the ratings and reviews on your online app store before you decide on a call-blocking app.

Learn more about how to stop unwanted calls at ftc.gov/calls. To learn the latest information on scams and fraud in Florida, visit Scams and Fraud. Florida residents who have placed their residential or mobile telephone number on the Florida Do Not Call list and continue to receive unsolicited or prerecorded sales calls and text messages are encouraged to file a complaint.

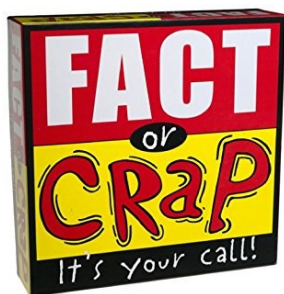

As a regular feature of our weekly meetings, **Ezra Krieg** brings us up to date with what happened on **"This Date in History"**. Here are a few interesting items from the past month:



October 1:

1890, Yosemite National Park was established by the U.S. Congress.
1903, the first modern baseball World Series began, with the National League's Pittsburgh Pirates defeating the American League's Boston Americans in Game 1; Boston would ultimately win the series 5-3.
1908, Henry Ford introduced his mass-produced Model T automobile to the market. Between 1908-1927, Ford would build more than 15 million Model T cars.
1949, Mao Zedong, leader of the communist People's Liberation Army, proclaimed the People's Republic of China during a ceremony in Beijing.
1957, the motto "In God We Trust" began appearing on U.S. paper currency.
1964, the Free Speech Movement began at the University of California, Berkeley, as students surrounded a police car containing an arrested campus activist for more than 30 hours.
1971, Walt Disney World opened near Orlando, Florida.
1975, Muhammad Ali defeated Joe Frazier in the "Thrilla in Manila," the last of their three boxing bouts for the heavyweight championship.
2017, in the deadliest mass shooting in modern U.S. history, a gunman opened fire from a room at the high-rise Mandalay Bay casino hotel in Las Vegas on a crowd of 22,000 fans at a country music concert below, causing 60 deaths and more than 850 injuries.

Actor Zach Galifianakis is 56.
Actor Brie Larson (Capt. Marvel) is 36.

October 8:

1871, the Great Chicago Fire began; more than 300 people died and more than 17,000 structures were destroyed during the three-day blaze.
1956, Don Larsen pitched the only perfect game in a World Series as the New York Yankees beat the Brooklyn Dodgers in Game 5, 2-0.
1997, scientists reported the Mars Pathfinder had yielded what could be the strongest evidence yet that Mars might once have been hospitable to life.
2016, Donald Trump vowed to continue his campaign after many Republicans called on him to abandon his presidential bid in the wake of the release of a 2005 video in which he made lewd remarks about women and appeared to condone sexual assault.
2024, two pioneers of artificial intelligence — Canadian John Hopfield and American Geoffrey Hinton — won the Nobel Prize in physics for helping create the building blocks of machine learning that is revolutionizing the way people work and live.

October 15:

1815, Napoleon Bonaparte, the deposed French emperor, arrived on the British-ruled South Atlantic island of St. Helena, where he spent the last 5 1/2 years of his life in exile.
1946, Nazi war criminal Hermann Goering fatally poisoned himself hours before he was to have been executed.
1954, Hurricane Hazel made landfall on the Carolina coast as a Category 4 storm; Hazel was blamed for about 1,000 deaths in the Caribbean, 95 in the U.S. and 81 in Canada.
1976, the first debate of its kind took place between vice-presidential nominees. Democrat Walter F. Mondale and Republican Bob Dole faced off in Houston.
1991, despite sexual harassment allegations by Anita Hill, the Senate narrowly confirmed the nomination of Clarence Thomas to the U.S. Supreme Court, 52-48.
1997, British Royal Air Force pilot Andy Green twice drove a jet-powered car in the Nevada desert faster than the speed of sound, officially shattering the world's land-speed record.
2003, 11 people were killed and 70 were injured when a Staten Island ferry slammed into a maintenance pier. (The ferry's pilot, who had blacked out at the controls, later pleaded guilty to 11 counts of manslaughter.)
2017, actor and activist Alyssa Milano tweeted that women who had been sexually harassed or assaulted should write "Me too" as a status. Within hours, tens of thousands had taken up the #MeToo hashtag (using a phrase that had been introduced a decade earlier by social activist Tarana Burke).

Actor Dominic West is 56.
Singer-TV personality Keyshia Cole is 44.

October 22:

1836, Sam Houston was inaugurated as the first elected president of the Republic of Texas, which earned its independence from Mexico that year in a military rebellion.
1934, bank robber Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd was shot to death by federal agents and local police at a farm near East Liverpool, Ohio.
1962, in a nationally televised address, President John F. Kennedy revealed the presence of Soviet missile bases under construction in Cuba and announced a naval blockade of all offensive military equipment shipped to Cuba.
1968, Apollo 7, the first crewed mission of NASA's Apollo space program, returned safely from Earth orbit, splashing down in the Atlantic Ocean.
2012, cyclist Lance Armstrong was formally stripped of his seven Tour de France victories and received a lifetime ban from Olympic sports after the International Cycling Union chose not to appeal doping charges against Armstrong by the United States Anti-Doping Agency.
2016, the Chicago Cubs won their first pennant since 1945, beating the Los Angeles Dodgers in Game 6 of the National League Championship Series. (The Cubs would go on to beat Cleveland in the World Series in seven games, their first series championship since 1908.)

Black Panthers co-founder Bobby Seale is 89.
Actor Christopher Lloyd is 87.
Actor Catherine Deneuve is 72.
Actor Jeff Goldblum is 73.
Olympic gold medal figure skater Brian Boitano is 62.
Reggae deejay and singer Shaggy is 57.
Former MLB All-Star Ichiro Suzuki is 52.

October 29:

1618, Sir Walter Raleigh, the English courtier, military adventurer and poet, was executed in London for allegedly conspiring against King James I.
1929, 'Black Tuesday' descended on the New York Stock Exchange. Stock prices collapsed amid panicked selling, \$14 billion in value was lost, and thousands of investors were wiped out, triggering America's Great Depression.
1922, Benito Mussolini, the founder of fascism, is appointed Italian prime minister by King Victor Emmanuel III. (He was dismissed by Emmanuel in 1943 after the Allied invasion of Italy and was executed by partisans in 1945).
1940, a blindfolded Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson drew the first number — 158 — from a glass bowl in America's first peacetime military draft.
1998, Sen. John Glenn, at age 77, returned to space aboard the shuttle Discovery, retracing the trail he had blazed as the first American to orbit the Earth in the Friendship 7 Mercury space capsule in 1962.
2012, Superstorm Sandy slammed ashore in New Jersey and slowly marched inland, devastating coastal communities and causing widespread power outages; the storm and its aftermath were blamed for at least 182 deaths in the U.S.

Answers.....
