Our program on March 11th was presented by Art Brownstein, the Founder & CEO of the No White Flags Project. Their mission is to remove barriers to personal hygiene by delivering life-changing solutions that promote safety, autonomy, and an improved quality of life.

For most people, brushing teeth or taking a shower takes a few minutes. But for someone with limited mobility, even simple bathroom tasks can feel hard. What seems small to one person can be a daily struggle for another. Bathroom accessibility for people with disabilities is not about comfort. It is about dignity and

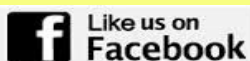
safety.

Standing up from the toilet may require strength and balance. Stepping into a shower may feel risky. Drying off may not even be possible without help.

These are challenges many families do not see. When bathroom accessibility for people with disabilities is missing, independence fades.

Since 2022, the No White Flags Project has provided Tornado Body Dryers, Toto Bidets, Delta Touchless Faucets, and tub-to-shower conversions at no cost to their clients.

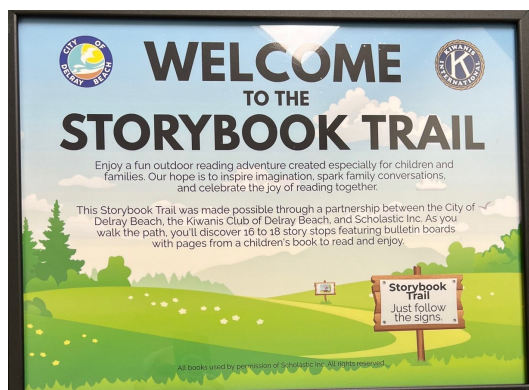


In early March, our club answered the call and supplied 40 pairs of shorts to Orchard View Elementary.

The Newspaper Business Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow



Our program on March 18th was presented by our own Rich Pollack, who led a discussion about the newspaper business. Here is a synopsis of that discussion.

How many people read newspapers today, whether in print or online, and whether they are local or national? How many still prefer printed newspapers, and how many have switched to reading them online?

The newspaper industry has changed over time, but in many ways, it still works much like it did before. New technology has changed how newspapers are produced, and tools like Google have made gathering content easier. However, the way newspapers are delivered has stayed about the same for the past 50 years. Delivery still depends on people willing to get up early and deliver papers for just a few cents each. Because of this, it makes sense both logically and financially that some newspapers have closed.

The middle of the market is getting smaller, much like what has happened with grocery stores. Businesses at the high and low ends tend to survive. For example, the Coastal Star is having its best year and best month ever. So, how can those in the middle keep going? One way is through consolidation. The Sun Sentinel, for instance, now does all the printing for the Miami Herald and the Palm Beach Post. Those papers have seen their profit margins shrink compared to the past.

What have we lost, and why is it important? One loss is a sense of community. Local publications like the Delray Beach News Journal once helped bring people together, but now it is gone. People used to read articles they could connect with, even if the stories were not meant just for them. This helped everyone understand important issues better. There has also been a drop in the overall skill level of journalists.

Looking to the future, community newspapers and national papers will probably keep going. The industry will likely see even more consolidation. We can expect more daily newspapers to close, with weekly or monthly publications taking their place. There will also be more online newspapers, like STETnews.org.

Rich has been a writer and editor since 1980, working for publications like the Sun-Sentinel, Delray Beach News Journal and Coastal Star. He also applies his communication skills helping businesses, non-profit organizations and other publications.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE?

This comes from Dr. Patrick Teefy, Cardiology Head at the Nuclear Medicine Institute University Hospital, London Ont.

1. Let's say it's 7:25 pm and you're going home (alone of course) after an unusually hard day on the job.
2. You're really tired, upset and frustrated.
3. Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to drag out into your arm and up into your jaw. You are only about five km from the hospital nearest your home.
4. Unfortunately, you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far.
5. You have been trained in CPR, but the guy that taught the course did not tell you how to perform it on yourself.
6. Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness.
7. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest. A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again.
8. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it to regain a normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get help or to a hospital.

HEALTHY LIVING TIP



Yoga for Stability

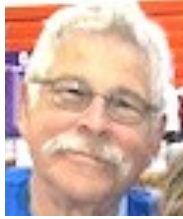
You don't have to pull out the yoga mat or put on your designer leggings to enjoy this practice's many benefits. Even if you've never done yoga before, these poses may help you improve your balance and stability:

- **Knee to Chest** - Start by standing with your feet hip-width apart and your hands on your hips, in mountain pose. Now, lift your left knee to hip height so that your upper leg (thigh) is parallel to the floor. Flex your left foot and hold this pose for three deep breaths. Repeat on the other side.
- **Tree Pose** - Start with the same mountain pose as the first movement. Now, shift your weight into your left foot, and allow your right knee to turn out to the side as you bring your right foot in to rest at your left ankle, shin, or thigh, depending on what's comfortable. Make sure you're not putting your foot on the joint itself.
- **Dancer Pose** - Start in mountain pose. Bend your right knee and slowly lift your right foot off the ground. As you do that, lift your left arm to balance yourself. Hold for three breaths and repeat on the other side.

March 4:

1789, the Constitution of the United States took effect as the first Federal Congress met in New York.
1801, Thomas Jefferson became the first president to be inaugurated in Washington, D.C.
1933, Franklin D. Roosevelt was inaugurated for his first term as president; he was the last U.S. president to be inaugurated on this date. In his inaugural speech, Roosevelt stated, "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself."
1987, President Ronald Reagan addressed the nation on the Iran-Contra affair, acknowledging that his overtures to Iran had "deteriorated" into an arms-for-hostages deal.
1998, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that workplace sexual harassment laws are applicable when the offender and victim are of the same sex.
2020, daredevil Nik Wallenda successfully walked across a 1,800-foot tightrope spanning the active Masaya Volcano in Nicaragua, completing the trip across the steel cable in just over 31 minutes.

March 11:

1918, what were believed to be the first confirmed U.S. cases of a deadly global flu pandemic were reported among U.S. Army soldiers stationed at Fort Riley, Kansas; 46 soldiers would die. (The influenza outbreak would ultimately kill an estimated 20 million to 40 million people worldwide.)
1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Lend-Lease Act, which provided war supplies to Allied countries during World War II.
1985, Mikhail Gorbachev was chosen to succeed the late Konstantin Chernenko as general secretary of the Soviet Communist Party.
2010, a federal appeals court in San Francisco upheld the use of the words "under God" in the Pledge of Allegiance and "In God We Trust" on U.S. currency.
2011, a magnitude 9 earthquake and resulting tsunami struck Japan's northeastern coast, killing nearly 20,000 people and severely damaging the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power station.
2021, President Joe Biden signed into law a \$1.9 trillion COVID relief package that he said would help defeat the virus and nurse the economy back to health.

March 18:

1925, nearly 700 people died when the Tri-State Tornado struck southeastern Missouri, southern Illinois and southwestern Indiana; it remains the deadliest single tornado in U.S. history.
1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed an executive order authorizing the War Relocation Authority, which forced Japanese Americans into internment camps during World War II.
1965, the first spacewalk took place as Soviet cosmonaut Alexei Leonov went outside his Voskhod 2 capsule, secured by a tether.
1990, two thieves posing as police officers subdued security guards at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum of Art in Boston and stole 13 works of art valued at over \$500 million in the biggest art heist in history; the works have not been recovered.
2014, Russia under President Vladimir Putin illegally annexed the Crimean Peninsula from Ukraine, a bold land grab that set the stage for Russia's eventual full-scale invasion of Ukraine in 2022.

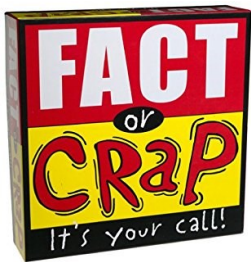
March 25:

1894, Jacob S. Coxey began a march from Massillon, Ohio, to Washington, leading an "army" of as many as 500 unemployed workers to demand help from the federal government following the Panic of 1893 and ensuing depression.
1911, 146 people, mostly young female immigrants, were killed when a fire broke out at the Triangle Shirtwaist Co. garment factory in New York; the tragedy led to legal reforms for workers' rights and workplace safety.
1931, in the so-called Scottsboro Boys case, nine young Black men were taken off a train in Alabama and accused of raping two white women; after years of convictions, death sentences and imprisonment, they were eventually vindicated.
1965, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. led 25,000 people to the Alabama state Capitol in Montgomery, completing a five-day march from Selma to protest the denial of voting rights to Black Americans.
1990, 87 people were killed when fire raced through the Happy Land social club in New York City. (The fire was set by patron Julio Gonzalez, who had been thrown out of the club following an argument with his girlfriend; Gonzalez died in prison in 2016.)

Answers.....

1. Fact - Besides having 132 rooms, 35 bathrooms, and 8 staircases it also has a tennis court, jogging track and swimming pool. The original pool commissioned by FDR in the 1930's was covered by Richard Nixon in 1969 to accommodate White House reporters in what is now the press center. Gerald Ford had an outdoor pool installed in 1975.
2. Crap - Only 2 countries, the USA and Soviet Union, had launched manned spacecraft in to orbit. It was not until October 15, 2003 that China became the third country to claim this status, sending 38 year old Yang Liwei on his historic journey.

3. Crap - Louise Joy Brown of England was the first on 7/25/78. Since then more than 1 Million have been born via the in vitro process.

4. Fact - The tin can used to preserve food was invented in 1810 by Peter Durand of London. It was not until 1858 that Ezra Warner invented a way to open these contraptions. Until then, people were instructed to use a chisel and hammer. Beer cans were introduced in 1935.

5. Fact - In 1752 the Gregorian calendar replaced the Julian calendar in Great Britain and the American Colonies. The day the change took place was September 2, 1752. Because the Julian calendar was 11 days BEHIND the Gregorian calendar, the next day was September 14, thereby completely skipping September 3 through 13, 1752.

6. Crap - Orville was involved in a flying accident in 1908 that killed his copilot. Orville died of a heart attack in 1948. Amelia Earhart's plane disappeared in 1937 over the Atlantic ocean. It is believed she crashed but no one knows for sure.
