U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary

Our program on August 5th was presented by Shari Forman, Division Commander of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary (CGA).

When the Coast Guard "Reserve" was authorized by act of Congress on June 23, 1939, the Coast Guard was given a legislative mandate to use civilians to promote safety on and over the high seas and the nation's navigable waters. Two years later, Passage of another act designated the Reserve as a military branch of the active service, while the civilian section, formerly referred to as the Coast Guard Reserve, became the Auxiliary.

Today's U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, with nearly 21,000 men and women,

is a unique force that carries out an array of responsibilities touching almost every facet of the U.S. maritime environment. When you join the Coast Guard Auxiliary, you could find yourself on patrol saving lives and property, assisting in marine safety and environmental protection, radio watch standing, educating the public in boating safety and much more. That's what their members do. They don't just train. They train and perform. Advanced training is available in Patrols, Search & Rescue, Navigation, Weather, Seamanship, and Communications.

Helping Students Overcome Barriers

Our program on August 12th was presented by Donna Sauer, CEO of Bound For College. Bound for College was born from the belief that every student, no matter their background, deserves a fair chance to pursue higher education and a brighter future. What began in 2012 as Delray Students First, under the leadership of their founder, Mark Sauer, was never simply about tutoring or test prep—it was about instilling hope, raising expectations, and opening doors that had long seemed closed.

Bound For College identifies motivated students early in their high school years.

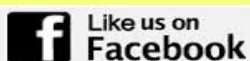
Hire Certified Teachers to tutor students after school on ACT/SAT exams for an average of two years. They ensure their students take the ACT/SAT multiple times, creating a path for improvement in exam scores. They facilitate college readiness enrichment activities including college tours to Florida's public universities. They also provide college and scholarship application support with the guidance of teachers and advisors.

Since 2022, over 1,000 students have participated in 22 college tours, with 45-50 students per trip. Their impact includes 5,300 Hours of ACT/SAT tutoring delivered annually to their students.

I. Secretary's Report: Minutes from July 6, 2026 meeting. Joel stated that the minutes should reference certain items that need follow up action. Moved to approve: Alperin; Second by Colonna: Passed (Krieg opposed)

II. Financial Report: Admin. \$5,058, Foundation \$25,516.87

III. Old Business:

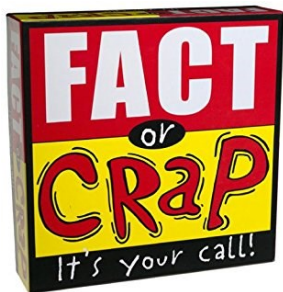


Adopt-A-Precinct

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

New Laws Protecting Consumers

Florida has more than a few new laws designed to protect consumers. Effective as of July 1, 2026, the laws below add or enhance current consumer protection efforts.

Here's a snapshot of some of those new laws:

- **Gas-Powered Equipment:** Local county or municipal governments are prohibited from enacting ordinances that restrict the use of gasoline-powered farm or landscape equipment. This does not restrict encouragement to use alternative fuels.
- **Commercial Solicitation:** A person may not engage in commercial solicitation at a dwelling that clearly displays a compliant "No Commercial Solicitation" sign. The sign must:
 - be at least 8.5 inches by 11 inches in size.
 - be clearly visible to approaching individuals.
 - contain the following language, or substantially similar language, in letters that are at least 1 inch high:

"THIS DWELLING IS DESIGNATED PRIVATE PROPERTY.
NO COMMERCIAL SOLICITATION IS PERMITTED
PURSUANT TO SECTION 501.062, FLORIDA STATUTES."

Consumers can report violations related to commercial solicitation to local law enforcement; providing the salesperson's name and the company name will assist in the investigation.

- **Fumigation Insurance:** Insurance requirements have increased for pest control businesses who perform fumigations. These licensees must now meet the requirements for minimum financial responsibility for bodily injury and property damage, consisting of (a)

bodily injury coverage of \$1 million per person and \$2 million per occurrence; and property damage coverage of \$1 million per occurrence and \$2 million in the aggregate; or (b) combined single-limit coverage of \$2 million in the aggregate.

Approved in June 2025 but effective July 1, 2026, SB 606 revised section 509.214, Florida Statutes. Restaurants in Florida which include an "operations charge" on their bill must divulge the amount or percentage of the fee and explain the purpose of the fee to the public on menus, websites, mobile apps and the customers' tab. Think credit card surcharges, delivery fees, automatic tips and other charges added, excluding taxes. Violations of this law can be reported at General Complaint Form – MyFloridaLicense.com.

Next is SB 386, which allows consumers to report defective farm equipment to the manufacturer or its authorized service agent and requires the manufacturer or service agent to replace or repair the equipment at no cost to the consumer. Violations of this law can be enforced by civil suit or you can enter a complaint for mediation on the Fdacs.gov website.

Lastly, there are updates to the Florida Pet Law, Section 828.29, Florida Statutes, which provides standardized health requirements for dogs and cats sold within Florida. These updates require that financing terms be disclosed to consumers before purchasing a new pet and allow consumers to terminate any financing agreements without penalty if the animal is later determined to be unfit for purchase due to disease or illness. It also requires pet dealers to provide veterinary records and written notices informing buyers of their consumer rights under Florida Law.

1861, Abraham Lincoln signed the Revenue Act of 1861, which levied the first income tax on Americans (a flat tax of 3% on those making over \$800/year) to help fund the Union's Civil War effort.
1864, during the Civil War, Union Adm. David G. Farragut led his fleet to victory in the Battle of Mobile Bay, Alabama.
1884, the cornerstone for the Statue of Liberty's pedestal was laid on Bedloe's Island in New York Harbor.
1914, the first electric traffic light system was installed in Cleveland, Ohio, at the intersection of East 105th Street and Euclid Avenue.
1936, Jesse Owens of the United States won the 200-meter dash at the Berlin Olympics, collecting the third of his four gold medals.
1957, the music and dance show "American Bandstand," hosted by Dick Clark, made its national network debut, beginning a 30-year run on ABC.
1962, South African anti-apartheid activist Nelson Mandela was arrested on charges of leaving the country without a valid passport and inciting workers to strike; it was the beginning of 27 years of imprisonment.
1962, Marilyn Monroe, 36, was found dead in her Los Angeles home; her death was ruled a probable suicide from "acute barbiturate poisoning."
2010, 33 workers were trapped in a copper mine in northern Chile after a tunnel caved in (all were rescued 69 days later).

1960, the first balloon communications satellite — the Echo 1 — was launched by the United States from Cape Canaveral.
1981, IBM introduced its first personal computer, the model 5150, at a press conference in New York.
1985, the world's worst single-aircraft disaster occurred as a crippled Japan Airlines Boeing 747 on a domestic flight crashed into a mountain, killing 520 people. Four passengers survived.
1990, fossil collector Sue Hendrickson found one of the largest and best preserved Tyrannosaurus Rex skeletons ever discovered; nicknamed "Sue" after Hendrickson, the skeleton, found in South Dakota, is now on display at Chicago's Field Museum.
2013, James "Whitey" Bulger, the feared Boston mob boss who became one of the nation's most-wanted fugitives, was convicted in a string of 11 killings and dozens of other gangland crimes, many of them committed while he was said to be an FBI informant. (Bulger was sentenced to life; he was fatally beaten at a West Virginia prison in 2018, hours after being transferred from a facility in Florida.)

1814, during the War of 1812, British forces landed at Benedict, Maryland, with the objective of capturing Washington, D.C.
1854, 31 U.S. soldiers were killed after one of the soldiers fatally shot Brule Lakota Chief Conquering Bear, sparking the First Sioux War.

2022, armed Islamic militants stormed a hotel in Somalia's capital, engaging in an hourslong firefight with security forces that left at least 20 people dead and dozens wounded. Authorities said more than 100 hostages were rescued during the 30-hour siege in Mogadishu.

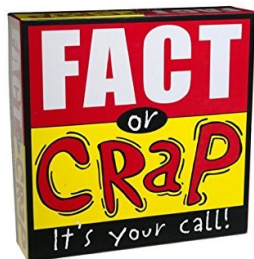
"None," replied Johnny, "cause the rest would fly away."

The Kiwanis Children's Fund supported 31 service projects through the Youth Opportunities Fund. **By Erin Chandler**



Key Club has been making a difference in schools and communities around the world for over 100 years. The Kiwanis Children's Fund established the Youth Opportunities Fund so that Key Club leaders can continue taking action for

the next 100 years and beyond.

In April, the Children's Fund awarded Youth Opportunities Fund grants for 31 outstanding Key Club projects that increase access to food, water and hygiene supplies; plant gardens; celebrate art and culture; and inspire other young people on the path to leadership.

Here are some of the top projects — as determined by the Key Club International Board committee and Children's Fund representatives:

Hygiene Drive

Fremont Senior High School Key Club, Nebraska, U.S.

In a school with a 37% rate of chronic absenteeism, the Fremont High School Key Club hopes to help students with financial needs or mental health challenges feel more prepared — and more confident about coming to school. The club will work with other clubs to make personal hygiene supplies available, assembling the supplies into bags for their fellow students to pick up in the school's guidance office, social worker's office, nurse's office, athletic office and at a Key Club Health Fair. The supplies will be purchased by the club — with help from a Youth Opportunities Fund grant — and donated by individuals or local businesses.

Walk for Clean Water

Hershey High School Key Club, Pennsylvania, U.S.

A past Youth Opportunities Fund grant recipient, the Hershey High School Key Club will use this year's grant to increase attendance at its annual Walk for Clean Water. Members plan to launch a new online advertising platform and add more games and activities for event attendees. The club partners with [Thirst Project](#) each year to bring the community together for a 3.75-mile walk — the average distance that people in communities without clean water walk to the nearest well. Since 2016, the club has raised over US\$202,000 to fund more than 17 wells in the African nation of Eswatini, improving health outcomes while freeing up more time for children to attend school and for mothers to pursue careers.

AAPI (Asian American Pacific Islander) Community Day

Hmong American Peace Academy Key Club, Wisconsin, U.S.

The Hmong American Peace Academy Key Club has only existed for three years, but this is already its second Youth Opportunities Fund grant for AAPI Community Day. The event kicks off AAPI Month in May with an event that celebrates the cultures and interests of students from kindergarten through high school. The entire Key Club participates in displaying members' art, making or bringing cultural foods, leading activities ranging from Hmong dance lessons to Esports, and participating in the event highlight: the talent show. The student performers sing in multiple languages, dance, play instruments, put on a fashion show, juggle, do card tricks and more. Funds go to organizations that support the AAPI community, such as the [Hmong American Women's Association](#) and the [Hmong American Friendship Association](#).

Pillars Create Pathways

Lincoln High School Key Club, Iowa, U.S.

When members of the Lincoln High School Key Club received funds to attend a district event from their sponsoring Kiwanis club, they came back inspired — but realized that, in an area with limited economic resources, most would not be able to access a similar experience. That's why they decided to launch their own daylong leadership seminar and workshop based on the Pillars of Key Club (Leadership, Character Building, Caring and Inclusiveness). The event will feature lectures and presentations from "local celebrity" guest speakers, each of whom also will lead a small group discussion. With help from a Youth Opportunities Fund grant, students from six area schools will be able to attend the event at Lincoln High School free of charge. The club hopes attendees will be inspired and motivated to achieve their life goals.
