PROGRAM

John Field on the history of bicycle racing.

John, current president of Modesto Kiwanis, the 'other' club gave a presentation on the history of bicycling. Bicycles have been a hugely important form of transport all around the world.

1815 Mount Tambora exploded in a volcanic eruption. The dust and debris caused a worldwide dimming of the sun and crop failures. Many horses died. In order to replace the horses a 2 wheeled bicycle like device was built. No pedals or chain. Called the hobby horse.

1870 Pedals were added to the front wheel and to increase speed the front wheel was made bigger. This led to the 'Penny Farthing' bike with a huge front wheel. Very dangerous if you fell and many broken wrists and shoulders. The term 'breakneck speed' probably coined in this period.



1885 'Safety Bikes' invented with smaller wheels and pedals and a chain which allowed a gear to be used to increase speed rather than a huge wheel.

1895 Pneumatic tires and brakes were added.

1870 As with any vehicle, someone wanted to race. In Europe a newspaper offered a bet to anyone who could ride 1000 miles in 6 days. Monday through Saturday and rest on Sunday. It was done.

1879 A 6-day race was inaugurated.

1885 The 6-day cycle race was a spectator sport. With participants not sleeping they saw many accidents and falls.

1880 In the US, safety bike racing was started.

1889 Madison Square Gardens was built to host bicycle racing. 8000 spectators would watch the 6-day races. Riders could win \$100 a day or \$5000 for an overall win – big money back then. When it was deemed inhumane to have riders compete for 6 days straight with sleep deprivation and hallucinations, the format was changed to a two-person team – each rider races for 12 hours a day – this format is still raced today and called a 'Madison'. In 6 days, they could ride 2100 miles. And eventually 2800 miles, a 20-mph average. This format continued until 1930.

Road races were held. When riders came to a climb they would dismount, use a wrench to remove their rear wheel, turn it around to access a lower gear, reattach the wheel and continue on the climb.

1903 The Tour De France began. The most famous race in modern cycling. Riders had to still switch their wheel around to get a different gear.

1905 The variable gear system 'derailleur' was invented. Allowed the rider to switch gears without dismounting.

1939 The Tour De France allowed the use of a 'derailleur'.

Since then, many refinements like aluminum. Carbon fiber, electronic shifting but basically the same familiar bike. Mountain bikes invented in the 1870 here in Northern California.
