Welby School Donations



Interview with Jim Terpstra



- **1. Why did you join Kiwanis in Arizona, and now Kiwanis SEMD?** Kiwanis affords me the opportunity to make the world better for children.
- 2. What have you most enjoyed about being a member of the Kiwanis organization? Being in Kiwanis has given me the opportunity to raise money for children's playground equipment and work at food relief organizations to help feed impoverished children.
- **3. What events/projects are you looking forward to?** I look forward to the Pints and Pinots to help raise money for the Kiwanis' programs.
- 4. What roles have you played in the Kiwanis organization? How would you like to get involved in SEMD? As a member of the Fountain Hills (AZ) club, I was on the Board for a couple of terms. I also was part of a team that helped to clean up the landscape of some shut in people. We also spread materials around a playground to help keep children from hurting themselves.
- 5. Tell us a little about your background, family, education, etc. I am married (60 years in December) and have two daughters who each have three children so six grandchildren and spouses, and have one great grandson and a second on the way in a couple of weeks. I grew up in Bozeman, MT, was in the Army Band, two years of college in Michigan and graduated with a Bachelor's Degree as a Music Educator. Became a flight instructor at Midway Airport in Chicago, then went to work at Jeppesen as a text book writer. Then promoted to aeronautical chart design and aeronautical databases. Retired after 36 years at Jeppesen and then 10 more years consulting for Jeppesen. I chaired or co-chaired number international aeronautical standardization committees and was the speaker Jeppesen sent to respond to all requests for an aeronautical speaker.
- 6. What are your passions/hobbies? My passion is singing. I belong to the Cherry Creek Presbyterian Church Sanctuary Choir. I also belonged to the Mountain View Presbyterian Church Sanctuary Choir in Scottsdale, AZ where I also played my Euphonium as a solo instrument and also part

of the church choir. I also was a member of the Fountain Hills, AZ Concert Band where I played my Euphonium.

7. What gets you up and excited about the day? What gets me up today is my current flight instructor students and working on my 32,000 pictures on my computer. I also love working on my computer and helping others who need computer help.

Additional bio information on Jim Terpstra:

After 36 years with Jeppesen, Jim retired May 2004 from his position as Senior Vice President and Flight Safety Officer. He continued as an Executive Aviation Consultant working for Jeppesen for ten years about half time and pursuing hobbies in his remaining time.

Before working for Jeppesen, Jim was a full-time instrument and ATP flight instructor and holds an Airline Transport Pilot Certificate, Instrument and multi-engine flight instructor certificate, advanced ground instructor certificate and has over 7,000 hours of flight time, including about 3,800 hours of flight instructing.

Jim was responsible for the early days of Jeppesen's new NavData business and was also responsible for the design of Jeppesen charts and databases for over 30 years. During his career, he was responsible for the production of Jeppesen's Flight Information services.

Jim was the author and editor of many Jeppesen Sanderson training materials including the Airline Transport Pilot textbook and co-author of the Cessna Pilot Center Training Program. Additionally, Jim has written over 100 articles published in various aviation magazines. His most recent series were articles on paper and electronic charts and databases that appeared in the AOPA Pilot Magazine.

Jim was an advisor to the FAA on the ICAO IFPP (instrument flight procedures panel) and was responsible for writing the international standards for instrument approach procedure titles, magnetic variation standards, worldwide MEA, MOCA, and MAA standards, and consulted on numerous other international standards.

In addition to Jim's Jeppesen work, he was the chairman or co-chairman of many industry committees such as the ARINC 424 Navigation Standards, ATA Charts, Database, and Avionics Harmonization Task Force, RTCA SC-181 WG2, Industry Requirements for Aeronautical Information, RTCA SC-206 AIS Data Link, RTCA SC-217 Terrain and Airport Database Requirements, the SAE G-10 Aeronautical Charting Standards Committee, and the Flight Safety Foundation International Advisory Council.

Jim was asked by the FAA and chaired the committee that established Advisory Circular 20-153B that sets the standard for the processes of aeronautical database integrity.

Jim is currently a part time flight instructor for Southwest Flight Center in Scottsdale, AZ and has two active instrument students as well as is conducting many IPCs, BFRs, and airplane checkouts. Jim's most recent students just passed their CFI check ride, instrument, and private pilot check rides. Jim also teaches a week long class on international aeronautical database standards every year in Interlaken, Switzerland.

911 Cell Phone Bank

<u>Cell Phone Donation Program – Teaming up with Thunder Ridge Key Club school year 2022-2023</u>

Our program relies on the donation of cell phones, smartphones, and other electronic devices that are left. We can handle all lost and found as well as collecting unclaimed electronics.

We work with many venues that send us unclaimed cell phones and other electronic devices lost on their properties. This is free to you and helps the community. We help manage this very important part of your lost and found.

When there are victims of natural disasters, COVID, victims of abuse, including human trafficking, we help by providing cell phones and airtime. As you may know victims quite often have no means of communication. We work with shelters and law enforcement agencies nationwide to provide cell phones at no cost to victims.

Data Security

We utilize third-party verification software to guarantee data erasure of all electronic devices according to the DOD NIST 800-88 Rev. 1 guidelines.

 Devices that cannot be erased are disassembled for parts and sent to our certified EPA R2 Recycler to reclaim precious metals. This keeps landfills free of e-waste.
