1-24-2023 PGK Kiwanis Meeting – Proceedings

30 members present – including 3 on Zoom plus 1 speaker (plus, husband Carl)

President Mark Tobin, rang the bell at 9:02 AM, and opened the PGK's person-to-person meeting with the assistance of **Bill See/Burr Bridge/Bill Robertson** on Zoom duty. **Tobin** reminded members to turn off their cell phones. **Tobin** led the Pledge of Allegiance and **Don Edminister** gave the invocation. **Tom Trebon** led the membership in singing "My Bonnie."

Tobin thanked Mike Martin as door monitor and appointed Lloyd Wilson for next week (01/31/23).

Tobin asked if any guests were present - From the "Eyeopeners": Jack Gianola, Bill, Dale, Jim, and Carol (maybe one other?). Jack mentioned knowing some of the former charter members (who are no longer here) of PGK when the group first got started.

Tobin inquired as to Welfare of Members: No report

Mark Tobin requested the **Secretary's report:** Assistant Secretary Stuart Hirai mentioned three (3) members having birthday's; January 28 (Ken Tharp), January 30 (Allen Green), and Bob Viscount (January 31). No known wedding anniversaries.

Mark Tobin asked for the **Treasurer's report**: **Bob Main** indicated PGK finances are fine and waiting on tax statements from the Community Foundation to close the books for December. **Stephen Andersen** mentioned a couple of members making charitable donations.

Tobin requested **Committee reports: Jeannie Craft** reported on the Pizza party at Putnam went very well. She also mentioned Laurel Elementary School having their Pizza party on the 26th. She also mentioned McBackPack where 368 backpacks were given away at 44-schools. Bill Robertson mentioned the Food Bank on February 6 at 0900 can use a few more volunteers. He also mentioned there are 16-VIP tickets for their annual **Empty Bowls** fundraising event.

Tobin requested **Special Events/Announcements:** Bill See attended the memorial service for Karen O'Connor this past weekend.

Don Edminster is coordinating the Valentine's event on February 14. Old and current pictures of you and your spouse be sent to **Bill See** (wsee252@aol.com) is requested so he can put together a PowerPoint slide show.

Jack Gianola of the Fort Collins Kiwanis "Eyeopener's" invited PGK members to RSVP by March 10 for \$25 to attend their 50th anniversary event at the Fort Collins Country Club on March 25 from 11:00 - 2:00 PM. He also mentioned Key Clubs that the Eyeopener's support and thanked the PGK for their \$1,500 donation last year in support of the Key Leader program training.

On March 7, Allen Green will be giving a presentation about the PGK which should enlighten old and new members.

Tobin asked for **Good News/Bad News: Lloyd Wilson's** prosthetic leg finally caught up with him. It was quite a "leg-a-cy" (pun intended) in that it took 6-months for his leg to finally catch-up to Lloyd.

President Mark Tobin then introduced this week's speaker: **Jan Gueswel** is the 5th generation of the original family settlers to the Fort Collins area that arrived from Nebraska in 1899. She has been married to **Carl** (a barbed-wire artist) for 62-years, have 3-children and 2 grandchildren. She is an avid researcher and historian and has written many articles for a local newsletter and have been published in a book about Gould, Colorado. An article was also used by the North Park Tourism Board. She is currently serving as President of the Auntie Stone Chapter of Questers International, a group that is involved in history, restoration, and preservation. Jan was an office manager for a construction company for 25-years, lives in the Poudre Canyon for 36-years and has served as President for several years on the Lower Poudre Canyon Board as well as other offices in that organization. She was also an EMT and firefighter for the Poudre Canyon Fire Protection District for 20-years. She has also traveled with a medical team on short term missions to Central and South America.

Her presentation today is about Stout, Colorado currently submerged by Horsetooth Reservoir; some partial dwellings and foundations can still be seen at the south end of Horsetooth Reservoir (population 47½). Jan talked briefly about the history of the area which was named Petra (Jordanian city carved from stone) and a sheepherder by the name of William Bachelder (early 1870's) who set-up a sandstone quarry at the western end of Spring Canyon. The sandstone attracted others to the area including William H.B. Stout of Washington County, Nebraska. In 1882, Stout took over the quarries (leased from Union Pacific Railroad), established a Post Office and renamed the town Stout. Stout, at its peak, boasted a boarding house, school, saloon (3), and stores to serve the miners and their families, including a blacksmith shop, livery stable, feed store, courthouse, and community center; and several hundred people by the 1880's. Sandstone from the quarries was used to build homes in Fort Collins, Denver (including the Tabor Grand Opera House), the Capitol Building, sidewalks in Denver, Omaha, Lincoln; and in other locations in the State and as far away as Chicago (The Chicago World's Fair buildings (1893).

William H.B. Stout was instrumental in securing construction contracts to construct portions of the Nebraska State Penitentiary in the mid-1870's. it was said that he used convict labor to construct facilities, which lowered the construction estimates/costs, which is how he and J.M. Jamison were successful in getting these contracts. Jan mentioned that Stout was a "shady person" and, if politics had anything to do with it (he served several terms in the Nebraska House), which was successful in moving the capitol of Nebraska from Omaha to Lincoln (Stout was the contractor for the new capitol building). Further research showed that he may have used his influence as Warden (could not fully verify that he was) to use convict labor to build a number of homes with sandstone in Lincoln (including his home-a 3-story stone house near Louisville). In the 1900's, his home had to be dynamited in 1928 to build a different kind of home at the same location. The sandstone used to build the walls of the Nebraska State Penitentiary in Lincoln came from the quarries at Saltello about 12-miles south of Lincoln. In 1883, Stout released his lease from the Union Pacific Railroad and shortly afterward, the town of Stout began its steady decline until the construction of Horsetooth Reservoir from 1946-1949 sealed its fate. Even though Stout was in Colorado for a couple of years, he did have an impact in northern Colorado. Additional research revealed that Stout was twice a millionaire but died in 1902 nearly penniless in Washington, D.C. According to another researcher/writer (Jim McKee-Lincoln Journal Star); "...probably no man has done more for Lincoln than W.H.B. Stout."

Mark Tobin adjourned the meeting at 10:00 AM.
