In Honor of Labor Day: Best & Worst Job Stories

Our program (what were your best and worst jobs) was informative and fun. Everyone in the room and online contributed. The responses would be too lengthy to capture here, but there were threads that tell us something about who we are as individuals and as a club.

Two of our members, past president RF Smith and president elect Scott Ross, delivered newspapers as a first job. Both credited the experience of working seven days a week and being required to collect the subscriptions to forming a respect for their work and developing a sense of financial responsibility. This job has largely (if not entirely) disappeared and the outlook for newspapers is none too rosy.

A remarkable number of members were raised in small towns and, of those who remarked, a clear majority were from Iowa (including Smith and Ross). Not surprisingly, a number of members detasseled corn as a first job. Today, machines remove most of the tassel, the pollen-producing flowers from the top of the corn plant. Laborers walk the fields to remove tassels which machines miss.

Three members mentioned human (Greg Bielanski and Rob Knoth) and animal (Mahlon Lang) waste as a memorable job. Greg and Rob thought it as the worst job and Mahlon actually didn't mind it because he was learning to drive a tractor (there's a pony among all the horse manure in that closet, Mahlon). These jobs are still in existence. Maybe machines refuse to do the work.

Mahlon Lang and Benny Nasser work in family businesses. Mahlon on an afore mentioned dairy farm and Benny as among other things skinning deer in the family grocery business. Benny could skin 4 to six deer an hour. Sounds like he's a goal setter.
