

MHKC Service Leadership Programs

The Monument Hill Kiwanis and Kiwanis International directive is to serve youth. We serve kids in School District 38 with our Service Leadership Programs. The programs are student-led, supported by faculty advisors and Kiwanis volunteers. The program is a voluntary student program designed to develop competent, capable, and compassionate student leaders by helping them learn leadership skills and to help others. These clubs are community service organizations which operate under school regulations.

School District 38 operates programs in all the schools except Monument Academy. Efforts are under way to include Monument Academy in SLP for their students. These programs were started by Jerry Losey and Al Duhan in 1993 as Sertoma youth clubs. Since then, these programs have grown to 5 elementary K Kids Clubs, 1 middle school Builders Club, 2 high school Key Clubs, and one CKI Club at UCCS. It's interesting to note that D38 has the largest Service Leadership Program in our Kiwanis district. Also, the CKI Club is the largest and most prominent club at UCCS.

There are 292 members in these programs and we are working to increase membership. Prior to COVID there were approximately 600 students participating. As of May 31, 2023, \$11,315.68 has been raised by SLP clubs with expenses to that date of \$1,637.

Some club activities include the 4th of July Parade, town gardens, Harvest of Love, Snack Packs, various school fall and winter family events, chess tournaments, CLC volunteering, Empty Bowls, bell ringing, Ronald McDonald House, homeless food packages, Night to Shine, Cool Science Festival, and many more!

WHY IT MATTERS:

Experiencing sexual abuse and other forms of abuse can result in short- and long-term physical, mental, and emotional health consequences, such as:

- post-traumatic and high order stress,
- substance abuse,
- increased risk for suicide or suicide attempts,
- · increased risk of re-victimization, and
- twice the risk of intimate partner violence later in life.

WHY YOUTH PROTECTION:

When people know youth have been educated on this topic, they are less likely to target those youth. Everyone needs to know what is OK and what is not OK for adults to do. When adults know this information, they can share it with youth. Education increases the number of disclosures, which leads to interrupting additional abuse, and for more youth getting the help they need.

OUR OBLIGATIONS

Prevent adult-to-youth abuse and peer-to-peer abuse

- Identify concerning behaviors
- Monitor and supervise youth
- Report emergencies or red flag incidents
- Model safe appropriate behaviors

WHO EXPERIENCES ABUSE

Worldwide: during childhood, across all ages and socioeconomic levels, ethnicities, genders, and big or small communities:

- 1 in 5 girls
- 1in13 boys

(Actual numbers may be higher)

It is important to remember never to be alone with a kid when volunteering. Preferably, always have another adult with you. Someday it may be a requirement that all Kiwanis members have background checks.
