Last year, a small army of about 200 young people and adults turned out to pull rakes, bag leaves and clean up the yards of more than 75 senior citizens in the Pueblo area Saturday morning.

The first Rake Up Pueblo was organized by SRDA and Concerned Parents of Pueblo. But the volunteer manpower extended beyond those two organizations, with teams from 22 agencies, companies, and even individuals, such as a team representing newly elected state Rep. Abel Tapia, D-District 46.

Key Leader has served more than 33,000 students at over 660 Key Leader events around the world. The program teaches service leadership and social-emotional skills essential for students to become values-driven leaders in their communities. Based in part on Robert Greenleaf's "Servant Leadership" model, the program is designed to break down the isolation many students face in an era of smartphones and social media while teaching critical leadership skills.
