Suicide Prevention Partnership

Jeff Baker told us about the Colorado Springs Suicide Prevention Partnership. On September 15th they are sponsoring a race against suicide at El Pomar Youth Sports Park that begins at 9:15. a.m. Jeff said suicide is an underappreciated cause of mortality in the United States among the population between the ages of 10 and 24 and is the second leading cause of death. The group of people with the highest rates of suicide are men over the age of 80. The rates across the country are about 14 per 100,000 but the rate in man over the age of 80 is 55 per 100,000. This under



recognized problem one that still carries a stigma and the Pikes Peak Suicide. Prevention Partnerships are working hard to support people who have been affected by suicide. Benny Nasser, Coordinator of Granting Program for Monument Hill Kiwanis Foundation, presented a review of **granting done for the 2023-2024 period**.

There are 2 committees that handle granting. The first committee makes people aware of our granting and requests applications reviews them and awards the grants. The Granting Committee consists of Benny Nasser Chairman and committee members; Heidi Baker; Mike Luginbuhl; Doni Gourley; Mark Zeiger; Paul Gourley; Diane Everett and Ted Bauman.

The second is the Career Stater Committee that is co-chaired by Benny Nasser and Ted Bauman with members Sue Reinecke, Dave Wittman and Mike Luginbuhl. The Career Starter group works with scholarships for students that aren't going to a four year college but may look towards a 2 year program or another career such as firefighter, cybersecurity or cosmetologist.

A change has been made in how grants are disbursed. All grantees are now funded in mid to late August. This allows for grantees to fully utilize granted funds, particularly D-38 schools. The funding of Rocky Mountain Youth Leadership Conference and Career Starter

Scholarships are disbursed in June and July when funds are needed. The granting philosophy is to support youth and the community with a particular focus on the Tri-Lakes area of northern El Paso County.

In 2023-2024 we received 38 applications for grants and in 2024-2025 we received 54.

The granting process is as follows:

- As applications are received they are forwarded to all committee members for review.
- Once application period has closed, a committee meeting is held to evaluate the applications.
- This initial pass through selects those applications that will be awarded.
- A final review is made to confirm the level of support for each selected application to allocate funds.

For Career Starter scholarships, each applicant is interviewed, and this is the basis for award funding. This occurs in April/May.

The results of the efforts to support the youth of our community is something we should all be very proud of as Monument Hill Kiwanians Here are the results for the past 2 funding periods

Total \$ requested: 2023-24 = \$140,30

2024-25 = \$151,867

Amount of funds Available: \$62,567

Average grant request \$2,812 this year





Loyd Mowrey gave a presentation on the importance of Interclub participation between multiple Kiwanis clubs. Loyd describes meeting the past Governor of the Rocky Mountain District Tim Sheppard where he describes that the Kiwanis club in Cheyanne needed volunteers to support Cheyenne Frontier Days. Frontier Days is the largest outdoor rodeo in the world. The city of Cheyenne provided a pancake breakfast on Mondays, Wednesday and Friday, but due to budget cuts needed to reduce it to just on Monday. So, Cheyenne Kiwanis decided to take over the breakfast from the city.

They feed over 40,000 people over the 6 hours they work for the 3 days. They provide pancakes, coffee, milk and this year blueberries. They used 5000 lbs. cake batter, 650 lbs. butter and 450 gallons of syrup to provided breakfast for the rodeo attendees. At 6 am in the morning it requires 260 hands on volunteers to put on this breakfast. The club provides a celebratory interclub luncheon for Kiwanis members on Thursday with native American dancers.

They are asking for volunteers and it's a lot of fun! There will be a sign-up available sometime in June and if you are interested see Loyd and he will get you connected.





Scott's Bully Pulpit

I gave us five goals this year under the banner of "Make a Moment - Change a Life" Here is where we stand near the end of this Kiwanis administrative year.

Goal #1 Grow Our SLP Program – With 9 Service Leadership Clubs, we have the most SLPs in the RMD. We currently support around 250 students at our 9 schools who learn hands-on about service and leadership. This is our biggest and most important effort.

Overall – Mike Luginbuhl has stepped into the leadership role this year has and done outstanding work in keeping our club and our SLPs moving forward.

- <u>Provide 2-Deep Leadership for Each Club</u> We have done well keeping and growing our team of Kiwanis advisors, but SLP Director Mike Luginbuhl is looking for back-up advisors for five of our clubs at the Middle and Elementary level. Please contact Mike with questions about this great way to make a difference and have fun doing it.
- <u>Complete Startups at Monument Academy?</u> This looked promising spring of 2024, not so much last fall as faculty had had other priorities. This is not on our current objectives list.
- <u>Encourage every member to attend at least one SLP activity</u> We have seen a number of our newer members step up to attend, and now participate in our SLP programs. This is an ongoing objective as our club membership changes.
- Engage with the D38 Transitions Students and Home School Enrichment program. We have maintained our excellent work with the Transitions team and working with them this fall toward sponsoring an Aktion Club an SLP for adults with disabilities. We have several club members who are helping Mike get this started and you will hear more as this progresses.
- <u>Support and grow KC Graduate</u>. No progress here, though we have raised this with our District leadership.

Goal #2 – Support Div 4, RMD & KI – We are the largest Kiwanis Club in Colorado and are 40% of Division 4s members.

- <u>Support RMD at the KI Convention in Denver</u> July 3-6, 2024. Yes we did, though not in the numbers I had hoped for. I was on the team of volunteers helping with guests during a couple of days. Mike and I cast our votes during the annual business meeting on Saturday.
- Interclub with all 6 Div 4 Clubs We did interclub with four of the clubs and this remains an ongoing objective going forward to grow our connections with our partner clubs.

- <u>Grow our Konnectors Club</u> – We maintained Konnectors and did several noteworthy things with them. We have gained some participants and members, but attendance is down from when we launched this monthly meeting. We used Konnectors to host a number of productive meetings with area services clubs – Lions, Rotary, Sertoma, Tri-Lakes Women's.

Tied to this outreach, RF Smith refreshed the Memorandums of Agreement with D38, Tri-Lakes Cares, our Chamber of Commerce, and Tri-Lakes Women's Clubs. These relationships are important to our efforts, whether it be staffing Empty Bowls, access to schools, staff, and students, or providing visibility to our Club in the community. Kudos to RF for his many efforts in this area.

- <u>Continue Key Leader Support</u> – 2+ Volunteers. Another topic for Governor Anne's visit. We have supported our Rocky Mtn District in several ways including helping fund the Key Leader program, \$3,400 budgeted for this year, (https://rmdkeyleader.org) which is a fall weekend leadership program. Mike Luginbuhl is our primary connection with this program and could use a couple of people to help him with this worthy project.
