

Harvest of Love

Mike Luginbuhl updated us about the Harvest of Love program. We will be picking up donated food from all of the local schools on Wednesday, November 6th and Friday, November 8th. Harvest of Love is our big food collection effort for Tri-Lakes Cares with huge participation by local schools. Mike passed around a signup sheet for drivers to pick up from the schools and deliver to Tri-Lake Cares. An SUV or pickup truck is needed. It's amazing the amount of food these kids are able to bring in.



Tutors

Mike Luginbuhl had a list of the tutoring requirements for Palmer Lake Elementary School and a list of previous/current volunteers. You can add your name to this list if you are available and want to help. When Mike has the list of names, he will look at assigning volunteers with teachers to figure out his schedule.

Separately, D38 is starting up a homework help session for Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4:00

to 5:00 p.m. Mike is also working with the Key Clubs to support this effort. The main focus is tutoring in reading but can also involve math.

Bell Ringing

Jeff Baker talked about the Salvation Army Bell ringing campaign that we do every year. Jeff told us he will be the lead for the project, with technical and computer assistance from Mark Zeiger. We will begin Bell Ringing the day after Thanksgiving and ring on Saturdays, Sundays and Wednesdays including Christmas Eve.



Again, this year we will have assistance from Tri-Lakes
Cares, Kiwanis Key Clubs, and Lewis Palmer Middle
School. The Salvation Army will be ringing on alternate
days and also at Safeway. The top bell ringers last year were Rob Knoth, Mahlon Lang,
and Heidi Baker. Jeff said that Heidi's name has an asterisk beside it because he filled in
for her on several occasions.

Last year we raised about \$35,000 for Salvation Army which Jeff sees as a good goal to shoot for this year. Mark Zeiger said he will be using the same software program as last year to schedule bellringers and money collectors. Mark thanked Jeff for taking this project on. We all agreed!



Secondly, Bill was happy for the lowa


State Cyclones, who are 6 and 0. Cyclone fans know how rare that is and that it is a true cosmic celebration.


Behaviors of Effective Team Leaders

Here's a flash of insight into the obvious. Organizations large and small exist to be successful. And, at the micro and macro level, they rise and fall in accordance with the effectiveness of the leadership teams. What's not obvious is what it takes to be an effective team and team leader, and conversely, what usually leads to time and energy being wasted when team leadership fails.

Robert Ginnett earned two master degrees and a PhD from Yale University. He is a fellow at the Center for Creative Leadership and is one of three authors of Leadership: Enhancing the Lessons of Experience. His keen ability to observe teams in action, the skill to decern which actions have a causal relationship to the task at hand and the ability to relate those experiences in a form that creates actionable activities and conscious communications to other groups that are necessary for success.



Ginnett's presentation focused on what leadership is and isn't. What it isn't is a set of traits. Traits are something that a person is born with (like blue eyes). On the other hand, leadership is behaviors – it's what you do. His definition is, "the leader's job is to create the conditions for the team to be successful." And that requires a conscious effort to create an atmosphere that informs and support team efforts.

Four Behaviors of Effective Team Leaders

• Spend time up front creating the team. It's not talking about what we're going to do today. That's task. Leaders create the conditions for the team to be successful. Predominantly, in team meetings the better teams are characterized

by most of the time being used by members of the team talking and not necessarily about the tasks. With less effective teams, the leader does most of the talking.

- Stay calm when the going gets tough. When unexpected things crop up good leaders don't overreact. They put stability into the situation. When things go bad, everyone wants to help. That introduces fragility into the situation. Everyone had a job to do and that doesn't change. Do your job and a leader who demonstrates composure, inspires others to do theirs.
- Create an environment of learning from mistakes. Every team makes mistakes. Not in individual mistakes, a team mistake. Good leaders don't blame, they create conditions where the mistake doesn't happen again. Focus on what went right before launching into fixing the mistakes.
- Develop team members through effective coaching. Spend most of the time supporting the good things that are going on. Pay attention to the things that are going right. People respond much better when they know you're seeing all the things that are going right before getting to the correcting of the thing that needs to be fixed.
