

Rich Strom reminded us that the end of the year is coming up and it is an important time to think about charitable donations. Rich asked us to consider donating to our Monument Hill Foundation, which does great work in our community. The Foundation has already received a couple of checks for \$5,000!

North Pole Craft Fair

Bob Nissen said we had another fun craft fair. Some numbers: There were 71 total vendors, two elementary school choirs, Ted Bauman's brass group, 1,205 people at the fair, revenue \$6,591. Tri-Lakes Cares received \$1,009 in donations, collected 540 lb of food, and three boxes of donated toys. There were 2,500 cookies at the Cookie Walk resulting in \$1,480 in revenue. Bob said we had exceptional support from the Club this year, which he and the venders greatly appreciated. Dave Foley was Santa, Ted Bauman helped with the entertainment, Ofie Lopez + Kathy Strom did a



great job in the break room. Additional standouts were Jim "The Mule" Murphy, Chuck "I Can Lift It" Leggiero, Sue "The Enforcer" Reinecke, and Dan "The Vacuum Man" Lopez. Next year, Bob is handing the Craft Fair over to Jim Ward and Dick Salverson. For next year, there are questions about what is going to happen to Grace Best Education Center, so keep an ear to the ground. Larry Vliet said we sold 55 bags of coffee at the Craft Fair and he thanked all of those who helped man the table selling coffee.



Blue Ink Studio Donation

Scott Ross told us that they received eight van loads of products from Blueink Studios, courtesy of Jane and John Kerr. Our Club, the Rotary Club and Tri-Lakes Womens Club helped sort and price all these paper products, and they sold \$3,290 worth of goods at the Craft Fair. In addition, there were \$600 donations from our members. All of this is to benefit the Heart of Monument Play Park. Scott thanked all the volunteers for their help!

Service Leadership Programs

Mike Luginbuhl reports that he and Dan Lopez went to Lewis Palmer Middle School to find out more about their leadership program. They met with Raquel Vasquez, who is teaching this program, and she was excited about trying to incorporate our Kiwanis Builders Club into her classes. She has three 8th grade classes and two 7th grade classes in this subject. Mike and Dan believe this has a lot of potential for our work in the middle school and that it will require additional Kiwanis support. Please see them to help.



Super Bowl Boards





Integrity Bank

Integrity Bank & Trust is a local business. It was conceived on a golf course, came to life in Colorado Springs and has been mindful of its moto "To Have an Enduring Impact" ever since.

Its history was and remains intimate. The Principals, Jim Wyss and Randy Rush (notice that familiar form for their first names) met when Randy was in high school. Randy's sister was dating Jim and later became his wife. Jim and Randy even overlapped one year in college when they played on the golf team together.

As you would expect, banking isn't a casual undertaking. We only have to look back to 2008 to see the dangers inherent in respecting and managing the risks

presented by market conditions. Fortunately, Jim and Randy were committed to "enduring".

Additionally, the requirements for starting a bank are many and challenging. Jim's career included 25 years with another local bank. The Federal Reserve requirements for approving a filing for a new bank are many and thorough. Including in those is the requirement to not be employed by another bank. Jim had to quit his job and was facing a year until the application was approved.

Then there was the reserve requirement. It was \$4.3 million when Integrity opened and would probably be \$25 to \$35 million today.





Then there's the history of locations. The current location at 1430 Cipriani Loop (near Knollwood and 105) was to be the initial location, but it was derailed by the presence of a colony of Preble Jumping Mice. Another building was found in which to begin business, and later the mice were successfully relocated and Integrity occupies the building today. Additionally, they operate from three other locations.

Kiwanis isn't the only beneficiary of Integrity's corporate involvement. Each year the bank sponsors a local golf tournament with proceeds going to a different nonprofit each year.

And finally, there's sharing expertise on the Boards of both organizations. Kiwanian Ted Bauman was a long serving member of Integrity's board and Jim Wyss continues to be an active member on the board of our Monument Hill Foundation.
