

# Weekly 50-50 Drawing



## Program

Monument Fire Department and Fire Mitigation

Jonathan Bradley and Dr. Gayle Humm

Jonathan Bradley of the Monument Fire Department spoke to the club about wildfire safety and community hazards and risk assessment. He was accompanied by Dr. Gayle Humm, a retired army surgeon and community ambassador for fire mitigation.

Jonathan's talk focused on four topics:

Hazard management

Vegetation management

Area features and challenges

Problems with ingress and egress of firefighting equipment Negotiating the challenges around property insurance

Jonathan began by noting how firefighting has changed since he began his career. At that time training was centered around fighting structure fires, when the focus was on taking away heat. Now, however, with increasing frequency of forest and grass fires, the focus is on taking away the fuel.

In a forest fire the greatest threat to homes is not from the flames but from the embers. Embers can travel as 1.5 miles to land on or near a house and initiate a fire. It is therefore critical to minimize the fuel around your home and harden the structure of the house against the risk of fire. Of major importance is the management of vegetation around the house. We are all likely to be familiar with the three zones of vegetation management:



1) Zone 1 – zero to five feet from the structure. There should be no vegetation or other fuel in this area. Yew trees are especially bad. Pay attention to the space underneath decks. Take note of where the snow accumulates in the winter – that is where embers will go. If you need to replace windows, consider using tempered windows. These break at 400° F versus 200° F of untampered windows.

2) Zone 2 – five to thirty feet from the house. In this zone there should be limited vegetation with good separation of trees and attention to "crown spacing". Trees or groups of trees should have a minimum of 18 feet between treetops. Larger trees should be pruned so that the lowest limb is 15 feet from the ground. Smaller trees should be limbed to one-third of their height from the ground. Ponderosa pine growths are often much too dense. Not only does this present a fire hazard, but it is also unhealthy for the trees. Ideally, there should be no more than 60 trees per acre. Jonathan noted that after a fire it take hundreds of years for Ponderosa pines to regrow. When culling large trees, consider leaving a variety of species and leave some dead vegetation for the benefit of wildlife.

3) Zone 3 – thirty to 100 feet from the home. The focus in this space should be on removing "ladder fuels", scrub oak in particular. The scrub oak bushes should have the appearance of lollipops after pruning. Dead bushes should be removed. The crowns of larger trees should be at least 12 feet apart (zone 30 to 60 feet) and at least six feet (zone 61-100 feet).



Jonathan also discussed ways to harden a home against fire. These include:

- 1) Favor asphalt shingles when replacing your roof
- 2) Cover vents/eaves with mesh (1/8 inch or smaller) to prevent embers from entering the house
- 3) Clean out gutters at least twice per year. Pay special attention to the corners.

4) House siding – wood shake is the worst. Concrete fiber, stucco, steel, and stone are better. Make sure that paint is not peeling.

5) Outdoor furniture and fences should be fire resistant. This applies especially to the fencing sections closest to your home.

Problems with ingress and egress:

1) Access roads should be as wide open as possible. The dog-hair pines that line the roads should be culled. During a fire, if access roads are overgrown, fire trucks will not risk using them. They will bypass your street. It is also difficult to evacuate residents if access routes are too narrow.

Insurance issues:

1) Colorado is in the top five states with highest insurance premiums. More than 50% of the population lives in areas at risk for wildfires. Northern El Paso County is a high-risk region.

2) Insurance companies say that they have lost money in five of the seven years on the property insurance business. The insurance companies look at regions, not individual houses, when making decisions about insurance.

3) The state is considering ways to support the insurance companies. California currently subsidizes their providers.

4) Solutions are not easy to come by. Funding is limited for fire mitigation. Community chipping days are too infrequent, and it can be difficult to transport brush and logs to the chipping location.

Jonathan reassured us that they are doing all that they can. Our fire district is rated in the top 10% across the country in terms of fire protection.
