

## Service Leadership Program

Mike Luginbuhl said things are winding down for SLP as the school year ends. SLP kids will participate in the 4th of July parade. There is one area the Palmer Ridge High School could use volunteer help is their Outdoor Learning Lab. It is up and running and summer is the growing season. They could use help on a regular basis. The Outdoor Learning Lab (OLL) is an experiential learning space that engages students in multiple disciplines, including science, construction, engineering, world languages, art, digital media, marketing, special education, math, and more. Classes use the space to engage and excite students with authentic learning experiences with a cross-categorical reach. The OLL contains several different areas and gardens, including a pollinator garden, a cover crop demonstration area, an ornamental garden, a Colorado native plant garden, a transect area for year-to-year research, two greenhouses, and raised and elevated garden beds. They will also have a weather station. PRHS carpentry classes built the greenhouses, raised beds, and seating for the OLL. # Care and Share Nate Springer

Our speaker was Col. Nate Springer, currently CEO and President of Care & Share.

Nate is a veteran of 24 years in the US Army, serving in 44 nations and living at various times in the Middle East, Africa and South Asia as well as in the Pacific area. Nate's service included multiple deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan. His involvement in Afghanistan earned him several mentions in the book The Outpost that was eventually made into a movie. Nate also contributed to the book Leadership, the Warrior's Art by coauthoring the final chapter titled Eight Leadership Lessons We Learned in Combat. Nate retired as Garrison Commander at Fort Carson and managed to stay retired for about 1 week before taking his current position. Nate began his presentation by telling us about his personal Memorial Day observance, which included honoring the 121 men and women who were killed in the units that he served with in Iraq and Afghanistan. He and many others who served with those units meet at Arlington National Cemetery where 38 of those men and women are buried. They visit each of the grave sites and share the honor of having been able to serve with people like that. Nate offered his hope that each of us would remember this weekend somebody special that made the ultimate sacrifice for our country.

When Nate retired from the Army in the summer of 2022, he was about to choose from two or three for-profit opportunities he had been researching when he was speaking in Washington D.C. about defense communities. It turned out that the Chamber and the Economic Development Council from Colorado Springs were there in the audience. They were about 60 days into their search for a new CEO and decided that Nate fit the bill best. So, Nate passed the flag of Fort Carson, on a Wednesday, and started at Care and Share on a Monday.

About to start his fourth year with Care & Share, Nate told us about the organization. Care & Share is a food-based member of Feeding America. Feeding America is a nonpartisan organization that provides food to the whole country. It's the largest non-profit in the country. It touches every county in the United States, and in our U.S. Territories, with 198 food banks in the network.



Care & Share touches 29 counties in southern Colorado, from Monument, south to the border into Mexico, about 47,000 square miles. That's about 1,000 square miles larger than the state of Pennsylvania. They have the honor of supporting 289 partner agencies in their half the state, including Tri-Lakes Cares. Nate explained that every one of the Feeding America food banks is a separate 501c3 non-profit and served by Feeding America in 3 ways. First, Feeding America does the high-end fundraising. As an example, about 2 years ago, Mackenzie Scott gave Feeding America \$100 million. Second, because Feeding America is the largest non-profit and charitable food system in the country, they are able to develop cost saving relationships with almost every big food distributor—like Tyson, Del Monte, Big Ag, Big Farms. In this way, Care & Share can usually take a dollar and purchase \$5 worth of food through Feeding America. Thirdly, Feeding America manages government policy. As the largest nonprofit in the country, they have a big voice in Washington, D.C, about the importance of the food security. Nate explained that, as a member of the Feeding America government policy team, he is one of only 10 of the 198 food banks represented on that government policy team which gives our Care & Share a direct input to that policy.

Working with 289 partner agencies, Care & Share sends out about 25 million pounds of food from their three distribution centers every year—about 21 million meals. Their largest distribution center is here in Colorado Springs—a 60,000 square foot facility with capacity to store 2.5 million pounds of food. They have a smaller facility in Pueblo, which supports the Pueblo community and the five surrounding counties. In 2023, we added our third distribution center in Alamosa, west of the La Veta Pass, which cuts their distribution time to the four corners area of western Colorado by half.

Nate told us that he has been working to help Feeding America touch the military in a more meaningful way. In 2023, they ran their first ever conference on military hunger in Savannah, Georgia, working with 35 food banks in from across the country that are near military installations, helping those food banks connect to the leadership of their installations. To assist with this effort, C&S recently began a partnership with Raytheon Technologies and with net \$1.5 million a year over the next 3 years for military and veteran hunger. Locally,

Care & Share will get about \$75,000 a year from that, to sustain our veteran and active program over the next 3 years.

Nate talked about organizations like Tri-Lakes Cares, where there the need has exploded in southern Colorado and across the country because of inflation, because of how expensive things have become. He spent some time talking about SNAP, the food stamp program, and how recent legislation that is going through Congress will impact that program. SNAP is implemented with an EBT card that's charged with money every month, and a family can use at a grocery store. It's 9 times more powerful than our Feeding America network. SNAP is the most important program in the country. It's our number one nutrition program. Food banks like Tri-Lakes Cares, are the safety net, not the primary. The Senate is considering a \$286 billion reduction to SNAP. The fear is that this will raise the demand on the other 288 food pantries across the state, and there is no magic lever to go from 25 million pounds to 30 million pounds. Tri-Lakes Cares is likely to need even more help this year, because they are going to face unprecedented number of people that need help.



Nate assured us that Care & Share been around for 51 years and is a strong organization that will weather whatever economic storms arise from current conditions. They have just under 5,000 unduplicated volunteers that walk into the doors of our distribution centers every day to help us. They are in a good financial position. However, reductions in SNAP will have other impacts across the state, especially in rural communities where the SNAP income may represent 30% of the income for the only store serving people in a large rural area. Losing this income may mean that some of those stores may have to close, further deepening the impact on the people who need SNAP. Subsidies to farmers will be reduced, farmers who provide food to our local food banks at little or no cost. Several other smaller programs could be cut that will not return. The local impact is about a \$1 million reduction in the \$11.9 million budget for Care & Share.

Nate entertained some questions, explaining in some more detail how SNAP works and how proposed changes in minimum wage thresholds and purchase restrictions could further impact that program, reducing purchasing power by 20-30%. He also gave us a very good rundown on his efforts to make the organization more efficient and to support his employees, paid and volunteer, extolling the value of his dedicated force of 100 full time volunteers. We were encouraged to continue our support for Tri-Lakes Cares in both food drives

and cash donation collection. Overall, Nate gave us a great view of the work he and Care & Share are doing in Colorado and across the nation. Thank you, Nate Springer for your continuing service to our nation.
