

Heart of Monument Play Park Update

Scott Ross gave a Heart of Monument Play Park Update. We have recently received some significant contributions to bring the park closer to the finish line. We began this summer with approximately \$350,000 contributed. The town of Monument received a \$100,000 grant and has been placed toward the Play Park. Then, a husband and wife of club members contributed \$50,000 apiece, and this week another Kiwanian contributed another \$50,000. That brings the total committed to \$600,000. Scott announced, then requested club members consider donating to the Heart of Monument Play Park by September 30th to take advantage of the Ross family's matching donation. The Ross family will match donations up to \$50,000 for the Heart of Monument Play Park by September 30th.

Scott also had an early happy buck from his time last week at his high school's (Iowa City's City High School) 50th reunion. He brought back CaityIn Clark Hy-Vee cereal and auctioned off the box (matching the \$30 this collector's item box brought), with proceeds going to HOMPP.

Happy Bucks





Kaylie Fields – 2023 Palmer Ridge Graduate. She was a member of Key Club (president her senior year). Completed over 75 hours of volunteer work in both junior and senior years. Complete her Associate Degree (Criminal Justice) at Pikes Peak College. Currently enrolled at UCCS in Criminal Justice and Psychology. After graduation, she will apply to the Police Academy with hopes of working in Colorado Springs or Castle Rock.

Eden Cobas Ortega – 2025 Lewis Palmer Graduate. Four-year letterman in wrestling. Team captain, twice team MVP and finished 4th in the state of Colorado High School competition. Awarded a wrestling scholarship @ Otero Junior College in La Hunta, Colorado. He is the second in his family to graduate from high school

and the first to attend college. He plans on majoring in construction management and business with the goal of assisting the Spanish-speaking community in developing their business. He worked part-time landscaping & furniture repair as well as volunteering at the Monument Goodwill. His hobby is bird watching.





Jay Olgren – 2025 Palmer Ridge Graduate. She struggled with ADHD and school was difficult until she found the Zoo Keeping Program through PRHS. Now she as all As & Bs and last semester was on the Deans list. She always liked animals, especially birds of prey, reptiles and invertebrates. She has volunteered or completed internships at the Black Bird Sanctuary, Wild Animal Sanctuary & the Pueblo Raptor Center. She worked as a lifeguard @ the Monument Y and the Farms. Last week she was involved in saving a woman and her young child. She also was a member of the set crew and lighting crew at PR. She was instrumental in assisting the MHKC in the Stars of Tomorrow production the last two years.

Hayden Fields – 2025 Palmer Ridge Graduate and younger sister of Kaylie. She plays the flute and in her senior year was awarded to the All-State Band of Colorado and a part of the Colorado Springs Youth Symphany. She currently is enrolled in the Pikes Peak College Certified Nurse Assistant Program (CNA). Career Innovation Center – Scheduled to open Aug 25th. The programs will include engineering management, welding, construction/home building, IT, Cyber, and health care (within the next two years). While the health care program is developed the Transition program will occupy their space. The plan is to develop and find space for the Transition Program.

Home School Enrichment Academy – with Grace Best closing need to build space for this program. D-38 will use a POD on their space to house this program – currently ~160 students.
