


Empty Bowls

Rich Hicks announced that the nomination period is open for our annual Kiwanian of the Year award.


 This is a onetime only award and is the top recognition of a club member from the Club. The President and Immediate Past President may not be nominated.







Gen Z Slang Chrissy Reason

Today's presenter was Chrissy Reason of the Woodland Park Kiwanis Club. Chrissy has been a Kiwanian for over 25-years. Chrissy's presentation educated and entertained our Saturday morning meeting on a vocabulary new to most-all of us. That new vocabulary is used by Generation Z, or GEN Z, young Americans. She is self-taught (and well qualified) in this language used by those Americans in the age group from 1995 to 2012...again, better known as 'GEN Z'. Chrissy is actually a member of Gen V (millenial) being born between the years 1980 to 1994.

Chrissy defines today's topic as slang (or lingo) from the Gen Z age group. Historically, all age groups have had, and generally continue to use, the slang of their particular age generation. Gen Z is no different by utilizing the slang conformable to, and created by, them.

The age groups are broken down into the following categories: 1946-1964 Boomers; 1965-1979 Gen X; 1980-1994 Gen V; 1995-2012 Gen Z; 1996-2025 Gen Alpha.

Laughter was abound when Chrissy was asked the name/title bestowed upon those folks born prior to 1946?!?!? She replied "The Silent Generation", to which those Kiwanians before 1946 were not so "silent". When asked who in the audience was not a "Boomer", or earlier, only one Kiwanian present raised their hand. To keep that person anonymous, we won't disclose Frank's name in this paragraph.

The Gen Z vocabulary was broken down into categories for today's presentation. The categories were: <u>Compliments & Hype</u>; <u>Insults, Shade & Roasts</u>; <u>Reactions & Expressions</u>; <u>Relationship and Social Slang</u>.

Some examples of "Compliments & Hype" included: fit/drip which means outfit or style; Gucci means good or chill; slay means doing amazing; and fire means really good. Some examples of "Insults, Shade & Roasts" slang include: salty, which means bitter, or upset; out of pocket which means inappropriate or out of line; clapped which means unattractive. Some examples of "Reactions & Expressions" include: touch grass, which is to go outside or get real; delulu which means delusional; bet which means agreement or OK. Some examples of "Relationship & Social Slang" include: fam, which is close friends or family like; ghosted, which means cut off contact suddenly; thirsty, which means desperate for attention.
