
Guests and Visiting Kiwanians

Native American Tribes of Colorado

The opening photo, taken at the last Ute Shan Kive in Garden of the Gods around 1913, features 56 people whose names are listed at the bottom of the image. This historic photograph is also reproduced in John's book, *Ute Indian Prayer Trees of The Pikes Peak Region*.

John talked about two notable arrowheads: one he discovered on his family's ranch south of Callahan, and a clear quartz crystal ceremonial arrowhead found by a friend near Parker, thought to originate from the Cheyenne.



As he travels around the state he often wonders who was here before us. There is document evidence of projectile points from thousands of years ago. The Clovis point from 11,200-10,900 BCE and the Folsom point from 9,500-8,000 BCE. One of the earliest kill sites is the Snowmastodon site (45,000 BCE) near Aspen. Although it has been question of the years as to its authenticity. But the Dent site (11,000 BCE) and the Lindenmeier site (10,350 BCE) in northern Colorado have been confirmed through multiple projectiles in many species of animals plus carbon dating.



CULTURALLY MODIFIED TREES - PRAYER TREES⁶

Culturally Modified Trees (CMT), also known as Prayer Trees or Spirit Trees, provide evidence of tribal presence over long periods, as these trees were intentionally shaped. For instance, in Fox Run, there is a tree—actually two trees believed to be Ute Spirit Trees. One tree points directly at Tava (Pikes Peak, considered sacred by the Ute), while the other resembles a goal post. Looking through these trees during the equinox reveals the rising sun. The Ute used such trees as natural clocks, calendars, and compasses. All the modifications were made in a sensitive manner respecting the spirit of the tree.





John was fascinated by the idea of a spirit inhabiting a tree. Dr. James Jefferson, a Southern Ute Tribal Elder, shared that Ute tradition holds everything created by the creator has a spirit—whether eagle, buffalo, or tree—and their culture does not have a word for "goodbye," believing instead they will meet again. John recalled sitting with Dr. Jefferson around a campfire, hearing stories later published in his book *A to Z Colorado's Nearly Forgotten History 1776-1876*, including how Yellow Nose, a Ute boy taken by the Cheyenne, is said to have killed General Custer—a story found in chapter Y.

He showed a photo of Dr. Jefferson's great-grandfather, Chief Sevara, with his family. One son wore a single feather to signify killing a warrior. He noted that women's attire, including cradle boards, was decorated with beads, while men's clothing was plain. Another tradition involved briefly dropping infants, especially boys, into snow before mothers retrieved and comforted them, teaching that pain is temporary.



The Ute creation story holds that their creator placed them in Colorado's Shining Mountains at the dawn of time, rather than migrating from elsewhere. As Colorado's earliest Indigenous people (around 14,000 years ago by DNA evidence), the Ute mainly lived in Colorado and Utah but also hunted in Wyoming, Kansas, Texas, and Oklahoma. The Ute language was traditionally transmitted orally and through pictographs, known as Rock Art, rather than written form. Dr Jefferson described these pictographs not as art, but as a form of storytelling. The first recorded contact with the Ute people occurred during the Spanish Expedition of the 1500s, led by Spanish Conquistador Francisco Vazquez de Coronado y Lujan (1510–1554). Throughout the late 1800s, Colorado was home to many Native American tribes, including the primary groups: UTE (SHOSHONE), CHEYENNE, ARAPAHO, APACHE (JICARILLA), COMANCHE, KIOWA, and NAVAJO (DINÉ). According to the Ute, the word Comanche means, "he who wants to fight me all the time."

There are 574 federally recognized Native American Tribes, with many tracing their roots to present-day Colorado. John's research centers on the Ute, Pueblo, Apache, Comanche, Cheyenne, Arapahoe, Navajo, and Wyandotte Tribal Nations. The Ute are currently the only Indian Tribe in Colorado.
