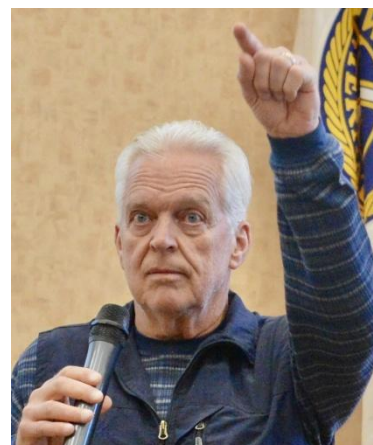

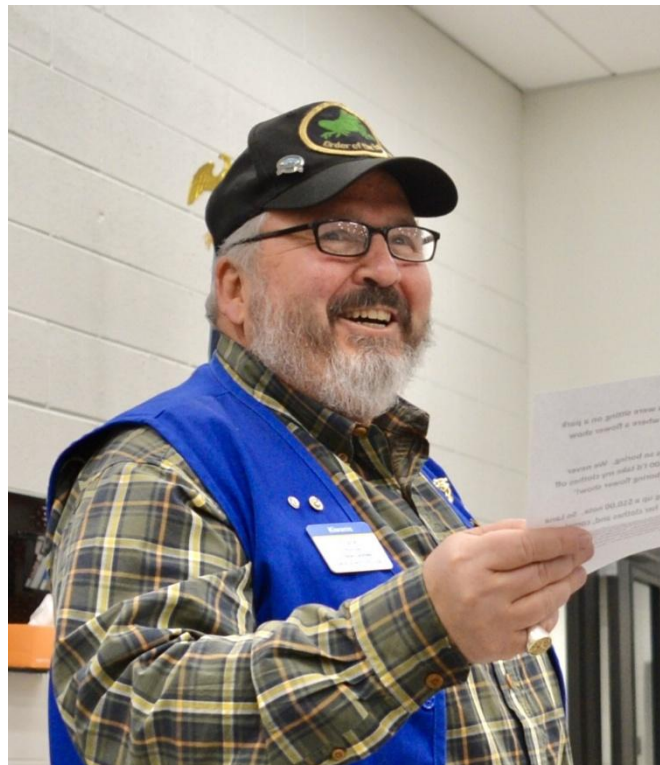

Program



District 38's Career and Innovation Center

Club members were given a fact filled tour of District 38's newly opened Career and Innovation Center (CIC). The CIC Director of Innovative Programs, led club members on a tour of the building, which opened at the beginning of the 2025-6 school year in August. Amber Whetstone, D38 Superintendent, was also with us for the tour and helped answer the many questions club members asked as we went through this amazing new facility.

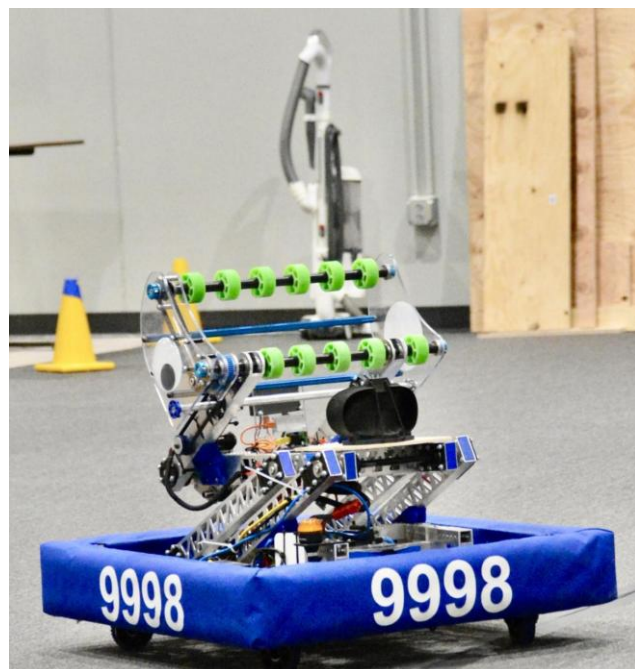


The CIC was developed at the new facility, which will provide relevant, work-based learning opportunities for secondary students and hands-on experiences that will connect learning to high-demand careers. In particular, there will be classes in advanced manufacturing, engineering, healthcare, information technology, and skilled trades.

Community input has played an integral part in the project since the concept was first introduced. Students, alumni, parents, staff, and community members have all shared feedback regarding this new learning facility for D38.

This opportunity (for juniors and seniors only) has been designed so that students will remain fully enrolled at their primary high school, either Lewis-Palmer High School or Palmer Ridge High School, while attending the D38 Career & Innovation Center. The center's [courses](#) are designed to fit into two consecutive class

periods of a student's block schedule, allowing them to participate without disrupting their other classes. Transportation will be provided for those who need it, ensuring a smooth transition between the center and their high school. This elective opportunity enhances students' education while maintaining their identity and enrollment at their home school, where they will complete the remainder of their courses and meet all graduation requirements.



In this most recently completed semester, there were courses in aeronautical engineering, electrical engineering, and welding. Students learn from hands on experience, Courses in civil engineering will be offered in the spring semester, and the CIC will begin offering health care training in the near future. CIC students are also building a house that will be delivered for use for Habitat For Humanity.

The Palmer Ridge High School championship robotics team, which is called Bearbotics, has a new home at the CIC. In January, the team will have their competition scenario delivered. The team will then have six weeks before their first tournament. They will have to build the robots to meet competition requirements and plan for how to compete. All their efforts are done in after school hours, with most students putting in 20-40 hours during the week and on Saturdays. They are part of an international competition, with championships being held in Houston, Texas.



For developmentally challenged students, the CIC provides an opportunity to develop service skills as they have a coffee and snack bar, called Training Grounds, in the building.

District 38 works with industry leaders to develop programs for skills that will be in demand in the future. The CIC is also working with donors to help ensure expanding opportunities. Below are ways to turn your tax bills into career opportunities.
