"For several months now I've been rambling on about how this is 'The Most Important Thing' and how that is 'The Most Important Thing' so how about I boil it down into a list of Eleven Most Important Things?

Understanding that your club may have other issues and that this list is not necessarily in the order that your club needs to address.

- 1.) **FUN:** If you want folks to show up, they MUST expect to have fun and there's any number of ways to generate a few laughs.
- 2.) **CLUB SURVEY:** What do the members of your Club really think about what's going on? You really need to poll them on at least an annual basis! Things like meeting date, location, meals, projects, programs, and fundraisers. There may be hidden issues here that are unknown to you that are affecting club participation simply because no one has ever asked what the membership thought!
- 3.) **MEALS:** As my Baptist friend always tell me, if you want folks to show up to meetings you have to feed them or at least give them a way to get a meal.
- 4.) **CONSISTENT LOCATION:**

Once a convenient location is found KEEP IT! Don't be moving around. Your Club Survey will tell you what you need to know about the popularity of your present location.

5.) CONSISTENT DATE & TIME:

Don't be moving your club's meeting date or time around either. With a consistent date and time members will have the ability to work your club meeting

date and time into their schedules. Again, your Club Survey will tell you what's most convenient for your members.

- 6.) **NEWSLETTER:** Without a Newsletter members will not know from one week to the next what's going on; it's that simple. And it doesn't have to be a three-page color newspaper either. A simple, consistent e-mail with important facts will do very nicely. Also include information about members, birthdays, Kiwanis Join Date Anniversaries - all available on your clubs Secretary's Dashboard - in other words show your members that you CARE about them.
- 7.) **PARTICIPATION**: Form committees that are responsible for these and other activities. Populate those committees with a few members who have an interest in specific activities. ASK members directly tell them that you need help and wouldn't they please lend a hand. Keep the tasks small so no one is overwhelmed.
- 8.) **PROJECTS:** Projects should help solve community problems or address community issues. If you're stumped on what's really needed in your community go ask the pastors in your churches, speak with the school principals or counselors, with the local police, and you'll find all sorts of issues that need to be addressed. Then poll your membership to see what your members are most interested in addressing.
- 9.) **PARTNERSHIPS:** Once your club has decided on a particular issue, or issues, look for other charities you can partner with. You'll most likely find that they have the tools to directly deal with the issues at hand and that IF you'll help them your combined efforts will make for

the most effective PROJECTS.

10.) **FUNDRAISERS:** Now we get down to where the rubber hits the road because this is where your Club is going to earn its credibility. This is what all these Nine other issues are leading up to. Your Club may have a traditional fundraiser you've been using, effectively for years, like a pancake breakfast, or participation in a community celebration where you sell bean soup and corn bread, or participating in a county fair... The list goes on and on. The point here is that you're using that Kiwanis Banner to put your Club's Name on Caring for Your Community!

11.) **MEMBERSHIP GROWTH:**

You really didn't think I was going to NOT include Membership Growth, did you? These projects are where you recruit new members. It works like this: Two, Four, or Six, members get together and come up with a list of folks they think would make good members. They make an appointment with these recruits, and go visit in groups of two, at such a time that's right in front of some sort of community project which these new recruits are invited to participate in. This way these new recruits can see for themselves what your Kiwanis club is all about. They can get involved from the start. Well, that all for now... I just want you to ask yourself, what are you doing to make your Club Stronger and More Effective in Your Community?"

WE ARE HIRING!

We will be hiring an Executive Director position. The position will be a part-time position that will be working 28 hours per week. The work schedule will be 9AM-5PM, Tuesday thru Friday.

The salary range is between \$32,000 and \$37,000 per year. The position will accrue ten vacation days per year along with ten sick days. Five of the unused sick days can rollover to the next calendar year. The following holidays will also be observed each year: July 4, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year.

The start date is July 7, 2025 as the person will be working with our current Executive Director until she retires on September 30, 2025. During that time period, the person will need to come to our Macon office. Starting on October 1, 2025, our District office will close and the new hire will be allowed to work from home.

The only residential requirements are that the person reside in the State of Georgia. Interviews for the position will be scheduled between May 1, 2025 and June 6, 2025.

JOB DESCRIPTION:

The Executive Director of the Georgia District of Kiwanis International operates as its Executive Director, Secretary and Treasurer. Below is a brief synopsis of the duties for which the Executive Director is responsible.

Qualifications:

 Member in good standing of a club in good standing of

- the Georgia District of Kiwanis International.
- Resident of the area that comprises the Georgia District of Kiwanis International.
- 3. Availability to work weekends and evenings.
- 4. Availability to travel to District and Kiwanis International events.
- 5. Submit to and pass a drug test, background check, and any bonding requirements.
- 6. Working knowledge of social media platforms (e.g., website construction and maintenance, Facebook, Instagram), and possess exemplary computer skills (e.g. Word, Power Point, Excel, QuickBooks).

Responsibilities:

A. Executive Director

- Maintain with board approval all necessary insurance policies, bonding protection, warranties and contracts necessary for the operation of the District.
- 2. Attend the following events, if held: International Convention, International District Secretary meeting, District Convention, Mid-Winter Conference, District Board meetings, District Foundation Board meetings, Lt. Governor Planning Conference, Key Club District Convention, and Circle K District Convention.
- 3. Schedule, organize and coordinate District Conventions with the District Committee chairs (Convention chair and Logistics / Site Selection chair) and all other meetings that require hotel accommodations, food service, and speakers.
- 4. Maintain the Official Master Calendar for the District.

B. Secretary

 Assist the Governor and District Board by maintaining, updating and protecting all district records, and archiving appropriate records.

- 2. Manage and timely update the District directories, newsletters and social media platforms.
- 3. Facilitate communication between Kiwanis International, the District officers and committee chairs, the clubs and their officers.
- 4. Timely file all necessary reports with Kiwanis International, and any government agencies when applicable.

C. Treasurer

- 1. Keep current financial records and account for the District, District organizations (e.g., District Foundation, Past District Officers, CKI, Key Club, and Foundation, as the District Board deems necessary, including receipts and disbursements.
- Regularly review the financial condition of the District, Circle K and Key Club, and report to the District Board at its quarterly meetings, or whenever otherwise requested by the District Board, and to the District at its annual convention.
- 3. Coordinate with the District Finance Committee in preparing a yearly prospective budget for the District, which shall be made available to the District Board prior to the August meeting.
- 4. Comply with a yearly audit by a Certified Public Accounting firm for the accounts of record as required by Kiwanis International.

As we continue our quest forward with the Possibility Project, my hope is that, by now, every club and individual in the Georgia District have a basic knowledge about the project.

Just as a refresher, at our International Convention in Denver last summer, the Kiwanis Children's Fund launched our first ever fundraiser solely supporting the Kiwanis Family and the children we serve. This project is the third time in our organization's history that we have embarked upon a global fundraising campaign. In 1994, it was the lodine Deficiency Disorder Project and in 2010 The Eliminate Project. In each of our previous undertakings, we have exceeded our goals.

For the Possibility Project, the Campaign envisions raising \$25 Million US dollars and impacting 10 Million kids globally. The campaign will end at the end of the 2027-2028 Kiwanis year.

Since funds raised by your clubs since October 1, 2022

will count toward the totals for your club, we are already well on our way to meeting our goal. To date, the Possibility Project total gifts and pledges are at \$6,880,646.27. The Georgia District's total gifts and pledges are at \$247,815.26. It should be noted that both individual and club donations are included in the totals.

Where we are hoping to make our greatest success is to challenge each club to become an Impact Club. With a commitment to give a per member average of \$500.00 or more over five years, your club becomes an Impact Club. The recognition your club receives for this extraordinary commitment will hopefully be an inspiration for other clubs and Kiwanians to emulate. There is no greater feeling of joy than to know that you have made a difference in the life of a child or improved the condition in a community.

Indeed, this is the time for your club to act. Children around the world are waiting for you to insure that their possibilities are made a reality. I appreciate everyone who needs the Kiwanis Background Check staying current. As you know, the \$35 Kiwanis Background Check is good for two years. Only 19 background checks need to be renewed in Feb, Mar, and Apr. If you look at your page on the Kiwanis Connect site, you can see when your approved background check is set to expire.

ers, through example and action, against bullying in their schools and communities, and work with trusted adults to bring about an end to this enduring problem.

Hazing



SHINING STAR STUDENTS AND TEACHERS CELEBRATED BY KIWANIS CLUB OF SAVANNAH

Savannah Classical Academy senior Danilo Saenz De Viteri copied a peer's essay when he was in eighth grade. His teacher, Venecia Whyte-Foster caught him.

"Honestly, when I look back, I should not have been up on this podium," he said Tuesday at the Professional Association of Georgia Educators (PAGE) Student Teacher Achievement Recognition (STAR) program luncheon for Savannah area schools. Whyte-Foste gracefully allowed him to redo the essay on a tight deadline and gave him a lesson that forever changed the course of his essay-writing abilities.

De Viteri was one of 21 students who were honored at this year's event hosted by Jordan B. Davis, president of the Kiwanis Club of Savannah, which held the luncheon at the Scottish Rite Freemasons Hall, 3001 Chatham Center Drive, Savannah. PAGE and the PAGE Foundation sponsored, administered and promoted the event. The statewide program was created by the Georgia Chamber of Commerce in 1958 and has been overseen by PAGE since the mid-1990s.

Since it's founding, STAR has honored over 30,000 students

and teachers. According to the event's press release, nominated students consist of "graduating high school seniors (who) must have the highest score on a single test date [through the November test date] on the SAT and must be in the top 10 percent or top 10 students of their class based on grade point average." The selected students also choose the teacher that most influenced their academic achievements to honor alongside them on the stage.

Past Kiwanis president Bill Edwards provided the invocation for the event. Before the prayer, he shared one of his favorite sayings, "Good teachers cost more, bad teachers cost most." The saying is a slight variation on a quote that is often attributed to Michigan journalist Bob Talbert.

Keynote address focuses on community

Tuesday's event was underwritten by the Kiwanis Club's corporate sponsor Kinder Morgan. Allen Fore, Kinder Morgan vice president gave the keynote address. He led by explaining that while his company's name might not be well-known, it has "invested billions of dollars here in Chatham County on facilities" and fuels the likes of Parker's Kitchen stores with gasoline and helps

electricity flow through the fuel Kinder Morgan supplies for energy generation.

He also summarized his personal background in government and the corporate sector before acknowledging his service in Kiwanis. He was president-elect for the Rockford, Illinois Kiwanis Club but never served in the role because he moved. "I'll never get my presidential pin," he joked.

He shared the example, though, to underscore a point to the students in the room about the need to join service organizations to support their communities.

"It's not going to be easy to volunteer and to contribute...but, boy, do we need you more than ever," he said. He congratulated students on their achievements and then encouraged future involvement in government, board or commission roles, confident they will go on to achieve even more.

What's next for the shooting STARs?

Students shared their plans. Most listed University of Georgia and Georgia Tech as their college's of choice. Desired degree paths ranged from biomedical engineering to computer sci-

ence. Woodville-Tompkins High School senior Faith Agbehonou announced she had been accepted to and has chosen to attend Brown University where she will pursue a double major in Public Health and Psychology.

Savannah-Chatham E-Learning Academy senior Isabella Frazier has her sights set on Georgia Southern University to study Communications and minor in Entrepreneurship and Innovation. She came prepared with a written speech to acknowledge her STAR Teacher Eunju Jung, a Korean language educator. Frazier thanked Jung for crafting, "a thriving environment of discovery, encouragement, empowerment and exploration." She then expressed her gratitude in Korean.

The overall STAR student award went to Sierra Abbasi of St. Andrew's School. Abbasi chose Kristin Peney, an environmental science teacher, as her STAR Teacher.

"We struggled together for four years with our underwater robotics team," Abbasi said. She noted how Peney has been there for her students inside and outside of the classroom as she cheers them

on and pushes them to do better.

Peney's eyes teared and her voice broke as she said, "As you heard, I've been with her [Abbasi] since middle school...I always knew she could do great things like this, and this is just the first step, so I'm super, super proud."

Abbasi, unlike most of the other students, had not yet decided where she wanted to attend college. "But I know I'm going to major in political science," she said.

Many of the students' parents, additional teachers, counselors and principals attended the event in support. As did Savannah-Chatham School Board Members, Roger Moss, Tonia Howad-Hall, Cornelia Hall, Smith, Dionne Hoskins-Brown, Stephanie Campbell and Denise Grabowski.

Davis had led with remarks acknowledging the students' commitment to excellence even in the face of challenges and barriers. As the seniors prepare for the world beyond high school, he shared the words of George Washington Carver: "Education is the key to unlock the golden door of freedom to our people."
