

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
NOTES FROM DISTRICT SECRETARY JUDY

PAST FIRST LADY JEN GIVES!





Each Kiwanis year, the Governor's significant other selects a charity to support. During Governor Eli's term (2023-24) First Lady Jen chose the Children's Hospital at Dartmouth (CHAD) for pediatric ophthalmology care. First Lady Jen retired as an ophthalmic nurse at Dartmouth Hitchcock after 35 years and knew the need for funds to support some of the pediatric ophthalmic care for children. During the NEBD conference and convention. clubs and members donate items for a silent auction, with the money raised going to the First Lady's charity. A total of \$6177 was raised, which was matched by the Kiwanis Foundation of New England, for a total of \$12,354.

On Wednesday, Oct 16, 2024, First Lady Jen and Immediate Past Governor Eli Rivera, along with Lt Governor Jeff Coburn, traveled to CHAD to present the Pediatric Ophthalmology Department with the donation. We met with Polly Anton, Director of Development for Child Health Initiative, and Drs Janine Eagle and Erin Salcone, who were all excited by the donation, being that this was the first time their department had ever received a donation earmarked for children's ophthalmic care.

We look forward to continuing the mission of the Kiwanis to improve the world one child and one community at a time.


