(a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of September 30, 2018 and 2017, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS September 30, 2018 and 2017

NOTE A - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

The Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation, Inc., assists in the financing of recreation and rehabilitation programs for patients under the supervision of hospitals and other institutions that are located within the Michigan District of Kiwanis International. To achieve their mission, the Foundation relies substantially on the contributions from individual clubs of the Michigan District of Kiwanis International.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles as applied to certain non-profit organizations.

A summary of the Foundation's significant accounting policies consistently applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements follows.

1. Basis of Accounting

The records are maintained and these financial statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting.

2. Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as highly liquid investments with maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

3. Contributions

Contributions are recorded at fair value when received and recognized as revenue concurrently.

4. <u>Use of Estimates</u>

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, which require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

5. Basis of Presentation

Net assets of the Foundation are classified as permanently restricted or unrestricted depending on the presence and characteristics of donor-imposed restrictions limiting the Foundation's ability to use or dispose of contributed assets or the economic benefit embodied in those assets. Permanently restricted net assets result from donor-imposed restrictions that limit the use of net assets in perpetuity. Earnings, gains and losses on restricted net assets are classified as unrestricted unless specifically restricted by the donor or by applicable state law.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS September 30, 2018 and 2017

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

6. Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met (either by passage of time or by use) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

7. Subsequent Events

The Foundation has evaluated subsequent events through December 29, 2018, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE C - INCOME TAXES

The Foundation is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Foundation has obtained a favorable tax determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service, and the Board of Directors believes that the Foundation continues to qualify and to operate in accordance with applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Foundation's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require management to evaluate tax positions taken and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the organization has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Foundation is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The trustees believe it is no longer subject to tax examinations for years prior to 2015.

NOTE D - INVESTMENTS

The Foundation's balance of investments during 2018 and 2017 were designated permanently restricted and unrestricted. Investments that represent 5% or more of the Foundation's net assets are separately identified.

NOTE E - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurement and Disclosures, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described below:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Foundation has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quote prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS September 30, 2018 and 2017

NOTE E - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS - Continued

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2018 and 2017.

Mutual funds: Valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the plan at year end.
