This month, I want to touch briefly on three areas where we can accomplish that goal.

- 1. Invite new folks to join your club. New hands bring fresh ideas and energy to help with current service projects and dream up new ways to help out the kids. (Keep a watch on your emails and magazine from Kiwanis International for a new toolkit on recruiting new members next month.)
- 2. Donate to the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation or to the Kiwanis Children's Fund. Funds donated to these two organizations go to helping out the kids–sometimes immediately.
- 3. Send members to Club Leadership Education. You don't have to be an officer to attend and this year it's combined with Spring Divisional—ideas and partnerships abound when we chat with our friends from nearby clubs.

Vicki Okuniewski 2021-22 Governor-Elect Michigan District Governor-Elect@mikiwanis.org In our Jan/Feb 2022 issue of the Kiwanis Magazine, our Kiwanis International President Peter Mancuso reminded us about his priorities of focus for this Kiwanis year. His third priority is to "Expand the Kiwanis Youth Programs to make a positive impact on more young people around the world and to develop leaders."

What is your club currently doing to help the young school aged children?

Some clubs sponsor a simple Bringing Up Grades (BUG) program at one of their local schools. Some clubs go a bit further to support and sponsor a K-Kids Club or a Builders Club. Are you doing this currently?

Reach out to your local school principal and let them know about our SLP's – Service Leadership Programs for elementary students. Plant the seed now with your conversations to show what the benefits for the students and teachers would be. When students return to school in the Fall, your local schools may be ready and willing to start a new program!

What other student projects does your club support?

My home club of Kalamazoo recently delivered dictionaries to all the third and fourth grade students in Kalamazoo Public Schools. We were not able to deliver to the 2020 third graders because of Covid-19. This year we made the commitment to dedicate \$7,400 to the Dictionary Project for our local public school children.

Some clubs support a weekend food backpack program at their local school. Some clubs regularly add books to the school library through various donations or awards. Some clubs provide iPads to classrooms.

What do you do personally to help your local preschool or elementary school?

One well known Kiwanis member, Cathy Szymanski from the State of Pennsylvania recently crafted handwritten cards for children at her local elementary school. She asked that the cards be given to students who needed a lift after having difficult day or needed some appreciation to let the children know someone is thinking about them. How simple is this?

> Are there children on the edge of the free and reduced lunch program? Maybe you could anonymously pay off some of those lunch bills at your local school!

Even small gestures of kindness and thoughtful gifts can give a child and their teacher an uplifting day! Again, make an appointment with your local school principal to ask how you and your club can help a classroom or a group of students.

As I follow in the footsteps of Governor Fran Babbage and Governor Rosemary Robinson, I hope to expand on our Kiwanis involvement within our local schools! We Serve the Children of the World!

The last couple of years have been very challenging for service clubs in Michigan and Kiwanis is no exception. Covid 19 has forced clubs to stop meeting, cancel their service projects, and fund raising activities. All of this has led to the loss of many Kiwanis clubs that have served the children of their communities for years. The desire of Kiwanians to improve the lives of children is strong, in spite of the challenges that have been put before us, the successes of the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation is proof.

Founded in 1922 by the Ann Arbor Club to provide non-medical support for children to help them heal, **this year marks the 100th anniversary of YOUR Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation**. What started as one hospital (now Motts Children's Hospital) the list has grown to include Mary Freebed Rehabilitation Hospital, Grand Rapids, McLaren Northern in Petoskey, and Detroit Children's Hospital. These 4 hospitals serve about 18,000 inpatients and 196,000 outpatients annually, birth through 19 years of age. These services are truly serving the children of Michigan and their families.

The main source for funding is the \$45 per member that our clubs pay to the Foundation. The loss of clubs and members mean that some of the funding also diminishes, so it is important that every member pays their \$45 to support the programs of family need at the hospitals. Your trustees have worked hard to supplement income for the hospitals. One source is the Oliver Holiday Greeting program that appears in the Decembers "Builder Magazine". Members make a donation to the Foundation and they have a greeting placed in the Builder. Last year set a new record, \$17,000 was collected. An additional example was last year's "Vacation Cash Raffle", that benefited the Foundation and the District, set a new record of \$27,000. Despite all the setbacks last year Kiwanis rallied to help support the Foundation and the Hospitals. For all of you that rose to the need, THANK YOU!.

In November the Foundation Board voted to assume the "Earl Obrian Memorial Fishing Derby", started by the Tri-Cities Kiwanis Club of Grand Haven. The proceeds will benefit our four hospitals as well as Devos Children's Hospital, which works closely with Mary Freebed .

The Foundation is continually looking for new sources of funding such as Facebook Campaigns, and donations to the Endowment fund will build income for the future. There are numerous awards to present to members of your club or community members that help to build income for the Foundation. See your Division Trustee to explain holding a Facebook Campaign, selecting awards, additional information, or a presentation.

Watch for a special event coming soon to celebrate 100 years (yep 100!) of Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation serving hospitalized children through Child Life Programs.

As we welcome a new year and are a full quarter into the Kiwanis year, you may have found that your club is in need of some extra guidance in a particular area. Whether it's fundraising, service, governance, even handling personality conflict, Kiwanis International has invested in developing its club coach program the past few years. Kiwanians around the world have recently been certified through an invite-only training program and are available immediately to help your club and its leadership with both identifying and working through whatever challenges it may be facing.

Each District has a team of coaches at the ready to assist and are capable of doing so either in-person or remotely. There's even a team of super coaches in North America Area 1 that are standing by to help coach clubs through very specific matters. That Club Excellence team is comprised of Brenda Leigh Johnson (NY), Delores Lewis (EC&C), Lori Stillwell (MI), Matt Wise (PA), Jason Miller (OH), and Jim Janosik (OH).

To address the elephant in the room, let's just take a moment to clarify what club coaching is, and is not, along with what types of clubs that coaching is suitable for.

First, having a coach help your club is not a long-term commitment. It can be if that is needed, desired, and agreeable by all parties though. Second, a coach isn't there to tell your club what to do. Their purpose is to listen, connect to resources, brainstorm, and generally help you work through issues while sharing their personal knowledge and experience. Third, club coaching is not just about membership. Clubs may have a strong membership but lack relevant service or adequate fundraising, and a coach can help with those areas as well.

Finally, club coaching is for ANY club. Any size, any location, any age, any demographic. Even the largest clubs in Kiwanis can face an issue that they might need some outside counsel on. Fresh eyes to look at a challenge can benefit a club even if they are already running on all cylinders. We can always do better!
