Our Spring Celebrate and Educate Divisionals are in full swing!

I am so looking forward to seeing all of you between now and the beginning of June! In the meantime, I wanted to give a quick update on the progress towards this year's goals.

This year we have the best opportunity in all the years of Kiwanis to increase our impact to the kids! After crunching the numbers, Michigan Kiwanians have consistently increased their service hours year over year by 10% and we are well on our way to continuing that trend!

Our Foundations still need our help. Right now, we have about 50% participation from clubs in giving to the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation and the Kiwanis Children's Fund. Traditionally, clubs donate at least \$45 per member to the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation and \$365 per club to the Kiwanis Children's Fund. I ask that clubs or individual members personally consider making a donation to our wonderful foundations.

Kiwanis members are the heartbeat of our clubs. They provide the hands to increase our impact to the kids in our communities. So far this year, we have added 203 new members to help out the kiddos. Also, we are in the process of forming a new Kiwanis Club in the north Grand Rapids area and this April four clubs will be boosting their membership during a three-day blitz. You are invited to join in and learn the techniques used in club opening or a club blitz to take back to your own club. This month, we are very excited to premiere a new tool to help clubs with membership. The two for two guide will help your club grow month by month, person by person. Two for Two Tool I am challenging you and your club to use these available resources to add at least 5 new names to your roster over the rest of this Kiwanis year!

As I have been working with the Past Governors on my journey to become the next Governor of the Michigan District of Kiwanis, I spoke with Past Governor Denny Kiroff regarding my dismay in trying to find Kiwanis members who are eager to step up to serve in the position of Lt. Governor in their Division.

With a few edits and his permission, here is Denny Kiroff's perspective on our current challenges!

Observations and Solutions for the Future of Kiwanis

I have been a Kiwanian for almost four decades when I started out with an invite for dinner with people of like mind and cause. From that point, I progressed to Secretary, newsletter editor, Treasurer, President, Lt. Governor (not once, but twice - 10 years apart), followed by becoming Governor-elect and on to Governor.

I also was the Executive Director of the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation to which I am forever grateful for the opportunity to serve.

Of course my time with Kiwanis did not just end there. For I was asked to be on the International Kiwanis staff for building clubs and membership United States wide by former International Presidents with whom I rubbed shoulders in our work to help the children of the world. To that end, I really enjoyed working with many different Kiwanians from around the world.

In all that time, I never met a Kiwanian that did not want to serve in a leadership role and make a mark, District wide and Internationally, that meant something to them and the ones who followed them.

These current times, with Covid-19 and isolation at home and office, have put a significant dent in the work of Kiwanians, as we lead and help people with lesser gains than we have to better their lives.

We, as an organization, have thought that Zoom, along with other methods of distance communication, is the way to go to make ourselves heard and understood. This is not true. The truth of the matter is that it has helped, but we have taken it to the other end and become dependent on it to communicate. It has lengthened the distances between us, so we do not meet on a regular basis and interact even less.

So here we are, at this juncture, in a time where our present Governor-elect Victoria "Vicki" Okuniewski is unable to fulfill her commitment as incoming Governor to have a full class of Lt. Governors to work with and to assist in making headway in each respective Division of the Michigan District, and building and growing the District and the projects that we perform for others.

What are we to do about this dilemma, sit back and watch it falter because of the lack of enthusiasm on our part, or are we going to step up and go for the win?

It is time for each one of us to fill the gaps and produce a District wide altering result to the Kiwanians that have worked so hard to accomplish over the years, and not let it falter!

We are counting on you to do the right thing and be noticed while enjoying your accomplishments in the role as the next Lt. Governor of the Michigan District in your respective Division.



I hope these books will help you on your journey in life and Kiwanis. Of course, other books may provide the inspiration you are looking for and I encourage you to utilize them as well.

The first book is the The War of Art

by Steven Pressfield

This book talks about a resistance out there that keeps us from doing things. We all live two lives. One is the life we live and more resistance we feel toward pursuing it. Procrastination is the most common manifestation of resistance. However, resistance can be beaten. This book tells us ways to do it. It describes the process to go from an amateur in something to a professional and what that means. We can discover forces that are our allies in overcoming resistance. What's stopping you from pursuing and accomplishing your dreams?



The second book is Developing the Leader Within You

by John Maxwell

Leadership is influence. He who thinks he is leading and has no followers is only taking a walk. There are 5 levels of leadership:

- 1. Position (Rights) This is related to a title and the rights associated with that title. People follow you because they have to.
- 2. Permission (Relationship) People follow because they want to.
- 3. Production (Results) People follow because of what you have done for the organization.
- 4. People Development (Reproduction) People follow because of what you have done for them.
- 5. Personhood (Respect) People follow because of who are and what you represent.

Recognizing these different levels and moving through them can get you to a place where you can start to develop other leaders so you won't have to be the President of your club for the next 5 years or you can't find a

This book presents a principle-centered, character-based, inside-out approach to personal and interpersonal effectiveness. It talks about private and public victories to help achieve these aims.

Private victories are:


- Be proactive
- Begin with the end in mind
- Put first things first


Public victories are:

- Think win/win
- Seek first to understand and then to be understood
- Synergize

Finally, sharpen the saw which means keep working on all of the above. By achieving the first 3 you can go from dependence to independence. After the second 3 are achieved, you go from independence to interdependence.

There is a difference between personality ethic and character ethic. Your personality ethic consists of your public image, attitudes, behaviors, skills and techniques. Your character ethic consists of integrity, humility, fidelity, temperance, courage, justice, patience, industry, simplicity, modesty and the Golden Rule. We want to be focused on our character ethic.

Chinook Sponsor — \$5,000 Three boats holding up to 18 participants.

Coho Sponsor — \$2,000 One boat holding up to 6 participants.

Pink Salmon Sponsor — \$1,000 Up to 3 participants; no boat choice.

Happy 100th Birthday, Herb!



Our good Kiwanis member, Herb Elfring, turns 100 on March

29th. Herb has beaten all the odds - survived the Great Depression, World War II, and just lately COVID. Imagine 1922 when there were no televisions, computers, cell phones, microwaves, electric cars, or even movies in color – you would not miss these things if you never had them but witnessing the technology explosion of the last 100 years must be an experience that very few of us can relate to. For many of us, all these conveniences have always been there!

We need to recognize the grit shown by the sacrifices and hardships endured by the greatest generation. Most of us know that Herb served in the Army and was stationed in Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, when the Japanese attacked the island and that a line of bullets missed him by just a few feet. While well trained, he will tell you he was one of the fortunate ones to survive the attack. He saw our fleet of battleships destroyed and over 2400 fellow service men killed. He certainly did not give up but rather fought all the harder for the duration of the war.

At the end of WWII, Herb enrolled in the University of Michigan where he graduated in 1950 and met his wife, Ruth. Their 57-year marriage produced five children, eight grandchildren, and seven greatgrandchildren.

Herb worked at Consumers Power Company in Jackson until his retirement in 1985.

He joined Kiwanis in 1994 and immediately took an active role as chairman of our wheelchair ramp building team. Herb has worked on many of our projects over the years including rebuilding a lodge at the Girl Scout Camp, planting, and harvesting flags, Michigan International Speedway race tram ambassador, Racing for Dollars, Halloween Party, Interclub visits, Travel-Adventure Series, Newspaper Sale, Salvation Army Bell Ringing, Michigan Theatre host, Any Soldier Project, and our annual Winter Chili Golf Project.

Herb is not one to sit still and has traveled to Egypt, England, Scotland, New Zealand, Australia, and all over the U.S. and Europe and returns annually to Pearl Harbor where this last year commemorated the 80th anniversary of the attack. You can always pick Herb in a picture of the Pearl Harbor survivors as he is the only one not in a wheelchair!

Our member, Denny DaPra, sums it up best. "He is still sharp as a tack at 99 years old. As an active Kiwanian he continues to support the Jackson Community and he is very engaging in conversation during our morning breakfast get-togethers. I call him a "super senior" because he skis out West, bikes in Europe, dances 3 times a week and is very knowledgeable about current events. He is one of the best".

After the Holiday Season and a new year, we had our first Aktion Club meeting. It was an experience to witness!! Constant suggestions and ideas as topics were discussed. Seems like everyone had an idea to help meet the needs in our community. For fundraisers a chili cook-off took place on Valentine Day and a Pasty Drive is in the works. Our summer schedule includes a baseball game in Traverse City, a Bowl-a-Thon and the Aktion Club Convention.

Over my 36 years in EWI, I served in all Detroit-Windsor Chapter board and committee positions, including President (twice). I was also elected to the International Board of Directors, overseeing all chapters throughout the United States, Canada, and Europe.

EWI afforded me the chance to work with a number of strong, accomplished women who mentored me on leadership, organization, listening, public speaking, effective communications and accountability. In turn, I mentored young women who would become future leaders.

My legacy, or signature project, from those years was the literacy program I developed for impoverished Southwest Detroit schools. Children were mentored, given free books to take home, and inspired to read avidly through friendly competition and rewards.

When joining Kiwanis, I was excited to be able to continue to collaborate with clubs on literacy for children. After several months in the Dearborn Club, I additionally accepted the role of the Big Goober (peanut) chair. During my two years as the Big Goober, we raised over \$60,000 in peanut sales.

When a Kiwanis friend suggested to Greg Smith that I would be a suitable candidate for the newly created Partnership Chair, I began my leadership path in the Kiwanis District of Michigan. I went on to serve as Michigan District Fundraising Chair for two years and Dearborn Club President for 17 months, succeeding to Lt. Governor for two terms.

As you can tell by my path, my number one passion is literacy and education. During my first few months in Dearborn Kiwanis, Edsel Ford High School students approached our club to be their sponsor - and my love for students made that an easy decision for all. I became - and remain - their Key Club Advisor. When we merged with Dearborn Outer Drive Kiwanis, we welcomed the Key Clubs for Annapolis and Melvindale High Schools, and I became their Advisor as well. Then Crestwood High School approached me to be Advisor for their renewed club. I am now the Advisor for four Key Clubs and the U of M Dearborn Circle K. We sponsor six Key Clubs!

In terms of my greatest achievement with our Key Club students, I would have to say it was working with them to develop the PROJECT K.I.D.S. event at DCON 2020. And my greatest surprise and honor was to receive the Distinguished Lt. Governor Award during Spring Divisional from Fran Babbage.

In closing, I want to be your Governor in 2023-2024 because I believe. I believe that I can continue to make a difference with students and communities. I believe we can help clubs embrace the many programs that Kiwanis International offers. 
