Tips for Success

Always remember that your behavior as a leader influences how others will accept you. You will not succeed as a leader if you act like a know-it-all or get on an ego trip. For example, saying "I really need your help," wins more support than "Do this."

- Find a role model. Choose someone you believe has good leadership skills, whether from inside or outside the club. If you are in an officer position, or Lt. Governor opportunity, there are many significant role models to reach
- Volunteer for projects. Working as a team member will help you observe how others lead. Consider how you like to be treated as a team member and remember that when you oversee a project or committee. Kiwanis has lots of opportunities for you to volunteer.
- **Be humble**. Just because you are the leader, does not mean you know all the answers. Reach out to past members of your club to help you.
- **Demonstrate Loyalty.** Do not try to outshine anyone. Avoid backstabbing and gossip. Your purpose as a leader is to ensure a smooth operation – not to make a name for yourself.
- Be professional. Follow proper guidelines in your dress, speech, and conduct. Remember first impressions cannot be taken back.
- Think of every project as a learning opportunity. When you assume a leadership role, go into it expecting to be successful. Our Kiwanians will help you be successful.
- Be flexible. Realize that situations may occur that you were not prepared for, but that you, as a leader, will have to manage. Flexibility will help you better manage unforeseen problems.
- **Listen.** Seek input from team members, and really listen to their suggestions and feedback. This encourages everyone to stay involved.
- **Delegate.** Leaders have the responsibility of dividing work into tasks that can be assigned to team members. Learn from your team what their strengths are and utilize them. Yes, sometimes it is easier to do it yourself... but we need to get others involved.
- **Read and observe.** The more in tune you are with what is happening in Kiwanis, the better prepared you are to lead people, and the more likely you will be chosen as a leader. Learn about what is going on at International also.
- **Show appreciation.** Thank your team members for work well done. Create certificates, send complimentary cards, or send them a Thank you via email.

Remember, leadership is not an invitation to put on a one-person show. Successful leaders have mastered the art of diplomacy. I look forward to working with ALL of you, as you are Volunteer Leaders, who know how to Lead.

As we noted in the last edition of the Builder, 100 years ago, in 1922, the Kiwanis Club of Ann Arbor teamed up with the University of Michigan Hospital to create what is now Child and Family Life Services at hospitals around the country! Through the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation, Michigan Kiwanians have supported these programs in four Michigan hospitals, Children's Hospital of Michigan in Detroit, C.S. Mott Hospital in Ann Arbor, McLaren Northern Michigan Hospital in Petoskey and Mary Free Bed Hospital in Kalamazoo. With the addition of the Earl O'Brien Fishing Tournament, we have also been able to add a donation to the Helen DeVos Children's Hospital in Grand Rapids.

We had a birthday party at convention, complete with cake and cupcakes... and kazoos! To help the Foundation continue this partnership for the next 100 years, we asked for donations of \$100 to the Foundation's Endowment Fund to celebrate the 100 years of service to sick and hospitalized children. This campaign will continue through the end of 2022.

We recognized early donors in the last Builder and will continue to do so through the end of December. Individual donors will receive a lapel pin and clubs will receive a banner patch at 2023 Spring Divisionals.

Earl O'Brian Memorial Fishing Derby

Earl O'Brien spent his life creating opportunities for kids to enjoy sports and life, even if disadvantaged, disabled, of suffering from catastrophic disease. In 2005 Earl launched an offshore fishing tournament benefiting St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. Over the years, In honor of Earl, we keep fishing for kids – all proceeds support Child Life programs in Michigan hospitals.

Sponsors are assigned to professional charter boats for a morning of exciting salmon fishing on Lake Michigan. Each boat holds up to six participants, and sponsors can invite family, friends, employees, or customers to fish on their boat. Or, sponsors can choose to donate their boat to young "Patient VIP'" from our beneficiary hospitals. Grand prizes are awarded for the largest fish in Sponsor and Patient VIP categories. Additional prizes are awarded by drawing, and a fun prize is awarded to the smallest fish of the day.

Earl was supported by the Tri-Cities Kiwanis club for 12 years. When Tri-Cities were no longer able to sponsor the event the Kiwanis of Michigan Foundation was asked to continue the event with the help of the dedicated volunteers that had organized and caried out the event. With the help of these volunteers and Earl's family, two events were held in 2022, May and July. A total of 9 charter boats fished the 2 days with great smiles, excitement for 15 VIP patients, and a great number of salmon.
