

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#### governor-elect || time: the most expensive gift

# The Most Expensive Gift

This past month I attended four funerals. The deceased ranged in age from 30 to 90. It got me to thinking. None of us knows how much time we have, but we do know it's limited and therefore precious.

Our time is said to be our own, but you can't do two things at once. If we give to Kiwanis, we take from family, friends, travel, leisure, etc. There is a corresponding saying 'that no dying person ever said I wish I had spent more time at work.' But Kiwanis is more than work.

I say this all the time but it's true. Kiwanis saves lives, Kiwanis changes lives and Kiwanis can help change communities. That is a noble cause. Something worth making a sacrifice for.

When we give time to Kiwanis, we are making our world a better place. We all want to be part of something that is bigger than ourselves and an organization in 80 countries with 400,000+ members I believe qualifies. In fact, we are also the oldest of the three largest service organizations.

We are an organization started by generous wealthy businessmen which has evolved from a check writing institution to a multifaceted service organization focused on children. But as its reach has broadened, it now requires volunteers from many walks of life.

As our membership has decreased, by nearly 50% since the 1950s, the number of service hours required per member has to go up just to offer the same amount of service.

This is very similar to a corporation reducing staff by say 10%. The amount of work is the same, but the workload increases for everyone else.

Remember when I said, in an earlier article, we operate under a franchise model. The Michigan District supports local clubs, and its 3200 members because we are the master franchisor for Michigan. We provide the license that allows local clubs to call themselves Kiwanis. The District operates with paid staff of 1.5 FTE's. (At one-time Detroit No.1, of which I was President, alone with 350 members had its own paid secretary).



Today we have nearly 130 Clubs, not to mention the Service Leadership Programs spread over 40,175 square miles. The remaining District leadership of 35 Lt. Governors and Committee Chairs is completely volunteer. That is quite the sacrifice we are asking of them.

I know you have heard this before, but it is true, this is unsustainable.

It is imperative we increase our membership. If for no other reason than succession. Succession will allow us to continue serving the children in our communities. But to do this will require more time and more money. I will not ask more of you than I ask of myself. I am asking each member to commit to giving 1 hour per month to recruiting a new member. I will unveil my comprehensive plan May19th in Lansing at the LTG training.

Lieutenant Governors have NOT had an increase in their expense accounts (this includes mileage) in years and not every Club even contributes the annual suggested \$50 support fee (which by my estimates should really be around \$200). They need your support.

My 99 year-old mother frets over all the things she has that hold so many memories for her. She directs me to make sure someone in the family, who will cherish each item, as much as she, becomes its next steward. I promise to try. That is the same promise I make to you regarding Kiwanis, I will try.

#### Will you make that promise for me?

I recently found out from KI that only 30% of Clubs have a Membership Chair. That means those duties, in the remaining 70%, fall to the Club President. Among those 70% many are not even trying to cultivate new members, because the President is likely overburdened.

Over the years we have done a great job encouraging members to provide service but we did not do a good job of explaining what might happen if one day there were no other members to provide that service.

I have actually heard foundation board members at several clubs say well then we'll just write checks until the money runs out and I'll be long gone by then anyway. Doesn't that seem both cavalier and egocentric. Hardly the ideals of Kiwanis.

Many of our Clubs are also composed mainly of older members (not that surprising when the average age of a Kiwanian is 63) who like to continue to meet, have lunch or dinner, maybe do their traditional fundraiser or service project and call it a day. I am not pointing a finger at anyone because the reality is once a Club reaches a certain average age it is hard to recruit working-age adults. Maybe the answer is that these clubs should recharter as a GoldenK Club and allow a new Kiwanis Club to take root in their shadow. Either way we must bring in new members or start discussing winding down the entire organization and who we are going to leave our stuff too. But that's years away, right? Funny how time just creeps right up on you.

To my mother I am still her 12 year-old son. But the man staring back at me in the mirror belies that viewpoint. As Chaucer pointed out, 'Time waits for no man.' Let's make the most of ours.

## Bringing Value to your Kiwanis Club or Division or District

Congratulations, new members are joining Michigan Kiwanis. They are excited about helping you make a positive impact with youth in your community. How can you help to keep them engaged and continue to belong and contribute? How can you help ensure that they continue to think and feel that belonging to Kiwanis is a valuable use of their time and money?

Here are some thoughts and ideas about this. Many of these are from the book Grow by Michael McFall Co-CEO of BIGGBY Coffee. I believe they are beneficial to all types of businesses and organizations, not just for-profit ones.

The first step is based on the following premise about your outlook and culture. Let's take a look at the quote by Charles Darwin.

Many of these ideas are tips for leaders to be more effective, but they can apply to all your members. They will help you retain your members by building value into your member's Kiwanis experience.

How do we market to existing members? Ask them "How can I be helpful?" Members may not believe that you care about them, so we need to overcome that. People look for a safe environment where they can feel free to express their ideas and opinions. Up to 80% of people are not engaged because they are spending time trying to make their environment safe. We need to work on transferring them from disengaged to engaged. Create that environment so

to work on transferring them from disengaged to engaged. Create that environment so their time can be focused on our various missions whether it's the club, division or district. Unlock your members' potential. Help bring value to each member. Use the Stone Soup example: each person brings one ingredient to contribute. Give your members a quest. They need to know what all of this is for.

Specifically for all leaders:

- Cede control of the team.
- Shut Up (you are not smarter than the group).
- Focus on building trust.
- Show up for your members how your members need you to be.
- Never waste people's time. Be organized. If it can take 5 minutes, don't take more.

Work on building that whole team so the old "80/20" rule doesn't apply anymore. We need everyone to help make a difference. Let's set this up for all of Michigan Kiwanis so everyone will want to participate and are valued.

### Woodhaven Kiwanians Distribute Dictionaries

The Kiwanis Club of Woodhaven recently purchased 576 third grade dictionaries. Enough dictionaries to provide a dictionary for every third grader at Anderson, Bates, Erving, Gudith, Hedke, Wegienka and Yake Elementary Schools. Kiwanians spent an evening labeling the dictionaries and followed through delivering the dictionaries to the seven elementary schools.

The idea for The Dictionary Project began in 1992 when Annie Plummer of Savannah, Georgia, gave 50 dictionaries to children who attended a school close to her home. Each year, she continued to give this gift, raising money to help give more and more books so that in her lifetime she raised enough money to buy 17,000 dictionaries for children in Savannah. From this humble beginning, local organizations, such as Kiwanis, have purchased and distributed 31 million dictionaries to schools all over the United States. Woodhaven Kiwanis President, Bob McCoy, reports the Club is proud to be part of the Dictionary Project for the last fourteen years.

The goal of the Dictionary Project is to assist all students in becoming good writers, active readers, creative thinkers, and resourceful learners by providing them with their own personal dictionary. The dictionaries are a gift to each student to use at school and at home for years to come.

Club President, Bob McCoy, says this dictionary contains all the elements of an excellent dictionary for students. It also includes over 150 pages of supplemental information in the back. Key features include the Constitution of the United States, the Declaration of Independence, brief biographies of all of the U.S. presidents, world maps, and information about all 50 states, countries of the world. The dictionary also has the planets in our solar system, sign language, braille and the longest word in the English language. If you are not sure of the longest word, check with a third grader.

## Fighting Food Insecurity

#### Feeding Families around the World...and around the Corner

Saturday, March 9th, the Woodhaven Brownstown Community came together to fight world-wide food insecurity. 232 students in third through ninth grade, the Woodhaven High School Hockey team, Woodhaven-Brownstown School District staff, parents and Kiwanians came together and packed 19,123 meals. Meals will be distributed through eight local food pantries and served around the world wherever the U.S. Armed Forces fly humanitarian aid.

Students prepare a packet of white long-grain rice, vitamin-fortified, crushed soy, a dehydrated blend of six vegetables, as well as a vitamin and mineral powder. Each packet feeds six people.

Students packed the meals in ten assembly lines under the leadership of Woodhaven High School Hockey Team. Captain Jimmy Olbrich reports each year the hockey team looks forward to working with the community. In addition to providing meals, students learn teamwork, measurement skills and the good feeling that comes from helping others. Students and hockey players have a good feeling of comradery and accomplishment at the end of a busy morning.

Kids Coalition Against Hunger is a non-profit humanitarian organization with a mission to provide fully nutritious food to impoverished children and families around the world...and around the corner. The goal of the organization is for the meals to provide a stable nutritional base from which recipient families can move their families from starvation or food insecurity to self-sufficiency.

Woodhaven Kiwanis Membership chair, Brenden Hoy, invites interested community members 18 and older to visit a Woodhaven Kiwanis Meeting and learn more about the many community efforts of Woodhaven Kiwanians. It takes a strong Kiwanis base to raise the \$10,000°° and provide the leadership needed for Kids Coalition Against Hunger each year. Kiwanians meet on Wednesday evening at the Woodhaven Community Center. Meetings begin at 6:30 pm and last an hour.

Woodhaven Kiwanis President, Bob McCoy, thanked the schools and their staff for the outstanding support Kiwanis receives. Without them, Kids Coalition Against Hunger would not be possible. He reminds everyone next year's packing will be held on Saturday, February 8th.
